THE STATISTICS OF PEAL RINGING

Perhaps the most disappointing thing about the peals rung in the year 1934, as revealed by the tables published last week, is the continued growth in the number of peals of Minor rung in one method only, and that method Plain Bob. In 1933 the number was 88; in 1934 it was 114; and in something like the same proportion peals in one method of Doubles also rose. Granted that the ringers who take part in these peals have little opportunity to extend their practice to a higher number of bells, we feel that there is a lack of enterprise shown by these figures. All kinds of argument may be put forward, not only to justify the large number of one-method peals rung on five and six bells, but also, maybe, to endeavour to show that these peals are actually as good as any other peals that are rung. We agree that there are conditions under which a peal of Bob Minor may be as meritorious as a peal in seven Surprise methods, and when it may be even more useful in the development of a band, but we cannot believe that, given the will to progress, it is the limit of attainment of any company. There are, we feel sure, instances where the ringers are just content to ring this one thing, and seem to have no ambition to rise to greater heights. To paraphrase a well-known quotation: 'It is better to have tried and lost than never to have tried at all.' It is often better to lose a peal in a higher class than to ring one in a lower category which requires little or no effort. The material at the disposal of a band to-day is so extensive and progress can be made by such easy stages that there is no real excuse for marking time by a company that have once rung a one-method peal.

The number of ringers who rang their first peal was about the same proportion as in the peals of the preceding year, so that, although the actual number was smaller, there was no falling off in the percentage of 'first pealers.' While this may not be entirely satisfactory in the view of some people, it is a check upon what appears to have been a downward tendency in past years, and we hope it may mark a turning of the tide by which the interest and keenness of a greater number of ringers may be stirred, for there are few things which act as an incentive to ringers to a greater degree than the ringing of one's first peal. In addition to the fall in the 'first pealers,' there is also a drop—again, more or less proportionate—in the number who rang their first peal in a new method or in a method on a different number of bells. The figures under this head, interesting though they are, are not a very reliable guide to progress or otherwise. It does not follow that, because a man rings a peal in

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some method in which he has not rung a peal before, he is doing something better than he has previously accomplished. There are not infrequent instances of men who have rung a considerable number of Surprise peals coming back to ring a peal in something much simpler. But while these details provide no exact indication of progress, there is a certain amount of general value in the comparative figures, for there is no doubt, on balance, statistics of this kind average themselves out and, taken over a period of years, show how far peal ringers are maintaining a desire to ring more methods.

In the peal of Minor rung at East Peckham, Kent, on April 20th, Oxford Bob and not Oxford Treble Bob was rung.

Mr. F. E. Dawe thanks the many ringing friends for their congratulations. Incidentally it is interesting to note that among the cathedrals at which he has yet to ring a peal are York Minster, where 52 years ago a peal of Grandsire Cinques was lost half-way owing to the 11th going very badly, and Exeter, where a peal of Grandsire Cinques failed eight years ago after ringing 3½ hours.

We regret that we are compelled to hold over a number of peal reports and reports of meetings.

SUSSEX ASSOCIATION'S JUBILEE.

TO-MORROW'S CELEBRATION AT BRIGHTON.

This year the Sussex County Association joins the ranks of those territorial ringing organisations which have been established half a century, and to-morrow the jubilee is to be celebrated at Brighton, where the association was first brought into being.

Sussex is a big county with many towers and there has from the outset been a large membership of the association, which figured conspicuously in its early days, when Surprise ringing was a rarity, as a pioneer in exploiting advanced methods.

To-morrow's programme includes the annual meeting, a festival service at St. Peter's Church and a dinner in the evening. The Bishop of Chichester, who is president, is taking a share in the celebration of the auspicious event.

NORTH LONDON SOCIETY REVIVED.

OLD AND NEW MEMBERS JOIN UP AT HOLLOWAY.

Many older London ringers will be glad to know that a revival has been effected at St. Mary Magdalene's, Holloway. Before the war this tower was well known as a training ground for many North London ringers and would-be ringers. For some considerable time prior to the beginning of this year, it was often difficult to get sufficient ringers even to get the bells 'up' on a Sunday morning.

On the first day of the New Year, however, 'The St. Mary Magdalene's Society of Change Ringers' came into existence with 17 ringing members and five beginners. These latter have now been elected to membership, having passed the prescribed test.

Mr. Bert Turner, who is well known in the Exercise, is the Ringing Master of the new society. He has been ringing at Holloway for something like 30 odd years. Others of an equally mature vintage include Messrs. George and Reuben Charge.

The main point of this announcement is to let London (and more particularly North London) ringers know that they will be very welcome at St. Mary Magdalene's if they care to come along. Ringing takes place on Tuesday evenings from 7.30.

It is very gratifying to the learners (of whom the writer is one) to see the scheme outlined in the 'Beginners' Page' of 'The Ringing World' of April 26th. It should help to get over a difficulty which is more real than would at first appear. It is this. When a learner puts a question to the 'older hands,' he is answered at some length and with every intention of helpfulness. But—and this is the snag—very few ringers can explain *without using ringing terms*. These, from long use, trip off their tongues (sometimes as a mere jumble of sound), and the poor beginner, from sheer embarrassment, says, 'Ye-es,' and hopes for the best. Admittedly it is impossible not to use one or two terms, but it would be a great help if (a) everyday language is used whenever possible, and (b) indispensable technical terms were themselves carefully explained and perhaps illustrated by an example.

Well, there we are. St. Mary Magdalene's Society is once again on the way to being in the news as often as before. The society can still do with some help and looks forward to seeing some of those who, it may be, remember the tower in the years before 1914.

The president of the society is the Vicar (the Rev. Thomas C. Ralph), the treasurer Mr. J. W. C. Johnson (one of the churchwardens), and the secretary Mr. A. E. Williams, who will be pleased to hear from any who would like to come along. A letter addressed to the church will find him.

ASTON TO HAVE TWELVE BELLS. TREBLES AS JUBILEE THANKOFFERING.

It has now been definitely decided to increase the bells at Aston Parish Church to a ring of twelve.

The work of recasting and rehanging the peal of ten has been in the hands of Messrs. J. Taylor and Co., and the addition of the two extra bells will complete a great restoration scheme. The new trebles are being hung as a thanksgiving for King George's Silver Jubilee, and the dedication will take place on St. Peter's Day, Saturday, June 29th.

Aston has many interesting associations for ringers and particularly for Birmingham ringers. It was here that Henry Johnson learned to ring and in the churchyard he lies buried. The stone which marks the grave was erected by the ringers of England in grateful memory of a man 'to whose ability and perseverance the art of change ringing is widely indebted.'

Among famous peals which have been rung at Aston have been 15,360 Bob Major in 1793 and 10,047 Stedman Caters in 1859, while in addition there have been such performances as peals of Treble Bob Caters and Grand sire and Stedman Royal rung there.

Aston will make the 53rd ring of twelve bells in England, and in addition there are twelve at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, and St. Paul's Cathedral, Melbourne.

GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION. ALTERATIONS OF RULES.

The annual meeting of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association was held at Swindon on Saturday. Service was held in the Parish Church, conducted by the Rev. J. Gilbert, assisted by the organist and choir. Tea was arranged in the Parish Hall, which the Bishop of Malmesbury visited. He welcomed the association to Swindon.

At the subsequent business meeting the following were elected vice-presidents: The Rev. E. Saleby, the Rev. N. Hope, Messrs. C. H. Gordon, W. Hale, J. Gould, S. Romans and the Rev. E. J. Phillips.

All the officials were re-elected, and Mr. A. E. Reeves was elected hon. peal secretary.

Interesting reports from Central Council representatives were given, and Mr. Austin thought that the motion concerning first peal ringers was very applicable to the association.

Mr. E. Guise spoke of the motions down for Whitsuntide meeting, and expressed a hope that if the hon. members' list was augmented to 20, care should be taken to see that the Standing Committee did not contain too many hon. members. He considered that the committee should be composed pro rata.

It was agreed that the association should alter its rules concerning fees from clergy, inasmuch as in future they would pay as much as they felt they could afford.

Branch rules were altered so that all accounts could be closed on December 31st of each year. It was also decided that expenses of the branches should not exceed 33 per cent. of total income.

Nowham-on-Sovereign was chosen for the next annual meeting, but, if the bells were not in good going order, the meeting would be held at Bristol on Easter Monday, 1936.

Votes of thanks to clergy, choir and organist were accorded, and mention must be made of the excellent arrangements of Mr. W. B. Kynaston and the ladies who arranged tea. Ringers attended from Gloucester, Cheltenham, Bristol, Cirencester, Wotton, Wootton Bassett and Swindon.

TO BE, OR NOT TO BE?

RINGERS DEBATE GUILD MEMBERSHIP.

A meeting of the Chertsey District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild was held at Thames Ditton on Saturday. It was characteristic of the district that there were only half a dozen resident members of the district present, and three of these were officials. Usually the meetings in this part of the diocese are made successful by visitors, but on this occasion they were few. One encouraging feature was the presence of three members of the local band, and most of the business meeting was spent in discussing the pros and cons of membership of the Guild. The Vicar (the Rev. J. Blackburn) was keen about the company joining, and himself became an honorary member, but the local ringers adjourned a decision until the rest of the band could be consulted. The officials are hoping for a happy outcome of the discussion.

The hon. secretary was authorised to go forward with arrangements for a joint meeting with the Middlesex Association and Oxford Guild at Staines and Egham on September 28th, and with the Surrey Association at East Molesey on September 7th.

Prior to the meeting, service had been held in the interesting church, famous for some early Norman work (including the tower) and some ancient brasses. It was conducted by the Vicar, who formerly as a Chaplain to the Forces had seen active service in South Africa and the Great War, and who accompanied the singing on a harmonium which has been under shot and shell.

The ringing practice was of a very useful character. Plenty of Grand sire Doubles, with Bob Minor, Treble Bob, Double Court and St. Clement's thrown in.

FEWER RINGERS IN NORTH NOTTS. BUT ASSOCIATION PROGRESSES.

The opinion was expressed in the annual report presented by the hon. secretary (Mr. R. W. Stockdale) to the North Notts Association that ringers in North Notts are rather on the decline in numbers than on the increase. Nevertheless, the association's year was a successful one from many points of view.

There was an excellent attendance at the annual meeting held at East Retford on Saturday week, when the service was conducted by the Vicar (Canon A. Parkinson), and the preacher was the Rev. C. G. Walmsley (Vicar of Barlborough), who, referring to the Jubilee celebrations, remarked that our rejoicings, which had reached the pitch of national enthusiasm and unity, would have been shown of their great value if bellringers in the towns and villages in the land had not taken their part. The ringing of bells was an essential part of any sort of corporate rejoicing.

Tea was served in the Ebsworth Memorial Hall, after which the Vicar, in extending a welcome, said that this was the best attendance at an annual meeting held at Retford, and it was very gratifying to all concerned. Bellringers had shown an extraordinary spirit of loyalty and devotion in the ringing of bells, and it was a source of great joy and pleasure that in East Retford tower on the day of the Jubilee a team had succeeded in ringing a peal of 5,040 changes of Bob Royal. It had given the townspeople a great deal of satisfaction by their accomplishment. A peal on these bells by a local band had not been rung since 1911.

The report showed that eight peals had been rung during the year. The first peal of Doubles for the association was rung at North Muskham. Mr. J. Flint again introduced a new method at Sutton-on-Trent by ringing a peal of Yorkshire Surprise.

Tuxford were again welcomed into the association, and the secretary wished them success in the progress they were making. A grant of £2 2s. was made to Harworth, who had had their six bells rehung. They had rejoined the association.

YOUNG RINGERS WANTED.

'Ringers in North Notts are,' stated the secretary, 'rather on the decline in numbers than on the increase. There are several towers with a less or just the same number of ringers as there are bells in the tower. May I appeal to members to make up your band and to try to encourage young ringers? We must ask each tower to introduce change ringing into their belfry, if they have not already done so, as it is the best way to keep the young ringers interested.'

The membership up to the end of 1934 consists of four honorary life members, 22 vice-presidents, 87 non-resident life members, 111 performing members, and three unattached members, a total of 227.

The Rev. R. F. Wilkinson, Rector of Ordsall, commenting on the report, congratulated Mr. R. W. Stockdale, the capable and energetic hon. secretary, upon recording the information he had gleaned respecting the bells in the towers of the different churches and the weights. They were fortunate in having such an ideal secretary. He was doing a splendid work, and he did not know what the association would do without him. He offered congratulations to the Misses Grace and Katharine Burchnell, of Sutton-on-Trent, who had taken part in all but five of the 26 peals which had been accomplished during the last three years.

The officers, including the Bishop of Southwell as president; the Rev. R. F. Wilkinson, representative on the Central Council; Mr. R. W. Stockdale, East Markham, hon. treasurer and secretary; and Mr. C. R. Smith, Retford, hon. assistant secretary, were re-elected. Mr. Stockdale was congratulated upon having rung in two peals on Jubilee Day, viz., at East Retford and at East Markham, being the first member of the association to accomplish this feat.

GREAT HELP TO THE ASSOCIATION.

Mr. Stockdale acknowledged the assistance he received from the Rev. R. F. Wilkinson in the carrying out of his duties. 'As a ringing clergyman, Mr. Wilkinson is a great help to our association. He is keen on bell restoration, and travels miles in the good cause.'

Mr. G. R. Winter, Retford, was elected a vice-president of the association.

Mr. G. G. Lindoff, Brigg, and P. C. T. Anderson, Stapleford, and formerly of Retford, were made non-resident members.

Mr. J. Edwards and Mr. H. Nicholson, Barlborough, Mr. E. W. Vessey and his son, Mr. C. A. Vessey, of Barnby-in-the-Willows, Newark, were elected members.

The list of meetings for the year were fixed as under: June 8th, Norton Cuckney; July 13th, Everton; August 10th, Edwinstowe; September 14th, Misson; September 28th, Anston (Crawford Cup competition); October 12th, Sutton-on-Trent; November 9th, Worksop; December 14th, West Retford; January 10th, 1936, Ordsall; February 8th, Shireoaks; March 14th, Winthorpe; April, annual meeting at Retford.

There was some excellent ringing during the afternoon and evening on the bells of East Retford, West Retford and Ordsall Churches, some 'good striking' being prominent in the towers. The ringing at East Retford included Cambridge Royal.

THE KING'S JUBILEE JOY BELLS.

RINGING HAPPENINGS IN MANY PLACES.

We give below further paragraphs of interesting events in connection with the ringing for His Majesty's Silver Jubilee.

At Godshill, Isle of Wight, six of the local band rang their first peal on Jubilee Day. They rang Grandsire Doubles with ten callings, and it was the first peal on the bells since restoration by Messrs. Taylor and Co. The ringers are anxious to know if this is the first peal of Doubles in the Isle of Wight.

Stanley Hoare will remember his Jubilee Day peal at Woodston, Hunts. It was his fourteenth birthday and his first peal. He did well to ring the 2nd and seven 720's of Bob Minor, for he had never before attempted a peal.

A NICE JUBILEE.

The youthful hon. secretary of the Farnham District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild had a very nice Jubilee. He participated in seven peals in celebration of the event, and they included Doubles (2), Minor, Triples, Major and Caters (2). In these peals, of which he called three, eleven ringers rang their first peal.

One ringer, at least, overslept on Jubilee morning. Perhaps it was excusable, as the meeting time was 5 a.m. for a peal of Doubles. This was at Tonbridge, Kent, and as the band were one short, instead of ringing the peal with 7.4.8 behind, they left out the 2nd and rang it with 6.8 behind.

The Jubilee peal at Farnham, Surrey, on May 8th was also a wedding peal for Mr. Sidney Meadows and Miss Dora Alice White, who were married in the church earlier in the day. Mr. Meadows is the towerkeeper and a member of the local band.

Wingham, Kent, has a peal of eight bells all cast in 1720 by Richard Phelps. They have never been recast and are, therefore, probably the second oldest ring of eight in the country, all coming from the same founder. A peal of Bob Major was rung on them for the Jubilee—the first in the method in the tower for 120 years.

Mr. James George rang a Jubilee peal at Oakham. It was his 13th peal since his 81st birthday last November, and brings his total to 1,237. It is interesting to note that his Jubilee peal was rung at the county town of the smallest county in England.

FAILURES AND SUCCESSES.

Among the large number of peals attempted and lost during Jubilee week was one at Hereford Cathedral, where Grandsire Caters was lost after ringing 3 hours and 20 minutes, when only three courses from the end, on Wednesday, May 8th.

On Jubilee Day a peal of Stedman Caters was lost at Cardiff after ringing 1½ hours.

On Friday, May 10th, Grandsire Triples went the same way at Usk, Monmouthshire, after 1½ hours' ringing.

Mr. John W. Jones, hon. secretary of the Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association, shared in all three of these disappointments, but he had the satisfaction of taking part in a peal of Stedman Triples at Cardiff on the occasion of the Prince of Wales' Jubilee visit on Saturday.

Prior to a thanksgiving service at 9.30 a.m. at St. Mary's, Rickmansworth, Herts, 240 Grandsire Doubles, with 7.6.8 covering, after which the bells were 'fired' several times, breaking out alternately into rounds and 'Queens' change. This was followed by 168 Grandsire Triples: E. Nobbs, C. Lord, J. Foster, F. W. Elliott, W. A. Howlett, A. E. Millett, E. Hookham (conductor), T. Gander. At the conclusion of the town procession and the ceremony of 'breaking the flag' on the playing fields, the same band rang several short touches of Grandsire Triples, conducted by A. E. Millett.

Her sister, Miss R. Redpath, took part in the peal at Crayford and the quarter-peal at Woolwich.

J. A. C. Abson scored his 'first as conductor' with the Crayford peal and formed one of the band at Woolwich. G. V. Murphy rang in the Crayford peal in the morning, and was successful in ringing his first peal of Double Norwich in the evening at Erith, while E. A. Barnett rang three peals: Bob Major at Crayford, Cambridge at Northfleet, and Double Norwich at Erith, thus probably creating another record for youthful performances.

CHURCH BELL CONSULTANTS.

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A peal on his Parish Church bells for the Jubilee celebration was rung the next day.

It was intended to ring a Jubilee peal of Caters at Pontefract, but Triples had to be substituted after meeting short.

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER.

The Metropolitan Police, whose strenuous duties kept them fully employed during Jubilee week, have not failed to mark the national celebrations with a peal, but they were unable to do so until Tuesday of last week.

The first clerical peal of Grandsire Triples ever rung, which was accomplished at East Hagbourne, Berks, on Wednesday week, while several of the ringing parsons were having a week's relaxation, was a Silver Jubilee event.

Four ringers for their Majesties' Coronation 25 years ago rang for the Jubilee celebrations at Harwich. They were C. J. Ellis, B. Elmer, J. Alderton and G. Thompson. Others who took part in the Jubilee ringing were F. Chaplin, E. Scarfe, A. Alderton, S. Jennings, G. House, F. Ramplin and B. Good. Attempts for a peal of Grandsire Triples came to grief, but altogether 3,500 changes were rung, and at noon the bells were 'fired' 25 times.

At Barnwood, Gloucestershire, the day's rejoicings were opened by the 'firing' of a royal salute on the bells of the Parish Church at 9 a.m. Afterwards an attempt for a peal of Grandsire Triples by the local band unfortunately failed after two hours' ringing. After further ringing another royal salute was 'fired,' and the bells were then 'lowered in peal.' A 'Jubilee' peal has since been successful.

There are only three bells at Caversfield, Oxfordshire, but they were rung on Jubilee Day, when three enthusiasts rang 720 of Stedman Singles in 35 minutes: F. Sharpe 1, J. Evans 2, E. Kitch 3.

As part of the Jubilee celebrations, short touches were rung at Bicester, Ambrosden, Piddington, Islip, Kirtlington, Bletchington and Lower Heyford in the Deanery of Bicester. COLLEGE YOUTHS' MASTER'S BEREAVEMENT.

DEATH OF MRS. E. P. DUFFIELD.

Mr. E. P. Duffield, who holds the two important offices of Master of the College Youths and Master of the Essex Association, has sustained a great bereavement by the death of his wife, Mrs. Martha Ann Duffield, who succumbed in a nursing home last Friday after undergoing two operations for appendicitis and peritonitis. Her illness was only of about twelve days' duration, and in this tragically sad loss of a devoted wife Mr. Duffield will have the sincere sympathy of ringers throughout the country.

Mrs. Duffield, who was only 36 years of age, will be much missed in Loxdon, Colchester, where they lived, for she was always willing to assist in any good work.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, the officiating minister being the Rev. D. W. Langridge, M.A., of Union Church, Brighton, a personal friend, and until recently minister at Lion Walk Congregational Church, Colchester, which Mr. and Mrs. Duffield attended.

FOR BEGINNERS.

HOW TO RING STEDMAN.

There are probably many ringers, beginners or otherwise, who can ring Grandsire and Plain Bob, but who have not yet 'got hold' of Stedman. There are a few people (no less an authority than Canon Coleridge among them, if we are not mistaken) who argue that Stedman should be the first method taught to a beginner in change ringing. Be that as it may, Stedman should be learned early. It is one of the oldest and most interesting of the odd-bell methods, and is not so extraordinarily difficult to ring if properly understood.

The method is based upon the production of the changes on three bells. These, as readers well know, are six in number, and Stedman is divided into 'sixes.' When three bells come together on the front they ring all the possible six changes before parting company, and while they are doing this the bells above them are double dodging in pairs. There are two ways in which the six changes can be rung, one the reverse of the other:—

At the end of each 'six,' one bell goes away into the dodging in 4-5 up and another comes from the dodging in 4-5 down to take its place. Thus all the bells in turn share in the work of the 'sixes' in front.

The two ways of ringing the sixes shown above are rung alternately—not, of course, on the same three bells, as one goes away at the end of the first six and another takes its place in the second. This alternate work results in one bell remaining in front only for the six changes, before going off again into the dodging. It hunts straight to lead from the completed dodging in 4-5 down, leads a whole pull 'right,' that is, at hand stroke and back stroke, and then goes straight out to double dodge in 4-5 up. This is called a 'quick-hell.'

The bell that comes next into the work of the 'six' is called a 'slow bell,' for the reason that its work keeps it on the front for five consecutive sixes, and it is this slow work which requires careful memorising.

It is divided into two 'whole turns' (first and last) and two 'half-turns' (first and last), the latter two coming between the two former while between each third's place (a whole pull) is made.

A 'whole turn' consists of two whole pulls at lead with one blow in second's place between; and a 'half-turn' consists of one blow at lead, made while the whole turn bell is doing its one blow in second's place.

The beginner, therefore, must carefully learn the order in which these pieces of work come. The 'slow' work begins and ends with 3rd's place and can be memorised as follows:—

Make 3rd's: FIRST WHOLE TURN, which means: Lead a whole pull wrong (back and hand), strike one blow in 2nd's, and lead a whole pull right (hand and back).

Make 3rd's: FIRST HALF TURN, which means: Lead one blow at hand stroke.

Make 3rd's: LAST HALF TURN, which means: Lead one blow at back stroke.

Make 3rd's: LAST WHOLE TURN, which means: Lead a whole pull right (hand and back), strike one blow in 2nd's, and lead a whole pull wrong (back and hand).

Make 3rd's (and go up into 4-5 dodging).

It does not matter how many bells Stedman is rung on, whether 5, 7, 9 or 11, the quick and slow work is the same. In a plain course each bell does it alternately—if you were a quick bell last time you will be slow next, and vice versa.

The double dodging which comes between hardly needs detailed description. You step back twice in each dodging place before going on to the next, and when you are behind, having dodged in 4-5 up in Doubles or 6-7 up in Triples, you turn round, by lying a whole pull, and begin to dodge down.

THOMAS HEARNE.**BICENTENARY OF THE DIARIST.**
