SUCCESSFUL ASSOCIATIONS.

Three, at least, of the principal associations that met for their annual meetings on Easter Monday were able to show increased membership during last year. They were the Kent, Worcestershire and Norwich Associations, and it is a satisfactory indication that, despite the 'slump under which some associations seem to be suffering, there are others that have every reason to be satisfied with the numerical progress they are making. It was revealed at the Worcestershire meeting that the present member-ship is the highest on record. The gratification at this result must be the reward of those whose efforts have made it possible, but those responsible deserve congratulations. There will always be ups and downs in the progress of associations, but the case of Worcestershire goes to prove that consistent endeavour will, in the end, compensate for the disappointing periods which, from time to time, must necessarily be faced. Wisely, however, the Worcestershire Association emphasises that the effort to maintain membership must not be slackened, even at this high tide level. It is easier to slip back than to go forward, and not only must endeavours continue to be made to bring in those ringers who still remain outside the association, but individual towers must be unremitting in their endeavour to maintain their ranks. this applies, of course, not alone in Worcestershire, but

In addition to its increased membership the Kent County Association is also very happily placed in regard to its financial position. Its monetary affairs have been extremely well managed in the past and in its various funds the association, which, be it remembered, contributes liberally to the expenses of members attending meetings, has accumulated nearly a thousand pounds. If, at the moment, the association in one respect is not so happy as it might be, its steady progress shows that at the core it is sound. The members at their annual meeting faced a delicate problem, and it is to be hoped that the negotiations at which the honorary secretary hinted will culminate satisfactorily. It would be a thousand pities if a 'canker' developed in the very district which is richer in the promise of youth than almost any other district in any association in England and were to lead to decay. But the Men of Kent and the Kentish Men have in the nearly sixty years of the association's history shown themselves capable administrators and are not likely, we imagine, to let personal feelings disintegrate such a splendid structure as that which they have built up with so much care and labour. In the meantime the association has the numerical and financial scope to (Continued on page 246.)

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. N. SPINDLOW.

RINGER AT DUCKLINGTON FOR FIFTY YEARS.

The death occurred suddenly on Thursday, April 6th, of Mr. Nobel Spindlow, of Ducklington, Oxon, a very well-known and highly respected member of the Oxford Diocesan Guild.

Mr. Spindlow was foreman of the tower band at Ducklington, near Witney, and had been a ringer at the church for upwards of 50 years. He was also sexton there for over 30 years.

Farmer (conductor) 5, G. Harris 6.

SUSSEX RINGER'S DEATH.

The funeral of Mr. Alfred Cripps took place on Saturday last at St. Audrew's Church, Steyning, Sussex, Formerly an old Shipley, Sussex, ringer, Mr. Cripps was obliged to give up ringing some 20 years ago, owing to deafness, but remained at work until nine months

YOUNG RINGERS' SUCCESS.

To ring seven extents of Spliced Surprise Minor in 14 methods as one's first attempt for a peal is a notable achievement, to say the least of it. Two young ringers at Rock Ferry, Cheshire, did this on April 11th, when what is believed to be the first peal of Spliced Surprise Minor for the Chester Guild by a Sunday service band was rung. Of the two young ringers, James Cooke is only 15 and Alec Martin 18.

Some other youthful ringers, three of them scoring their first peal, took part in a peal of Grandsire Doubles on the front six at St. John the Divine's Church, Leicester, on the same day. These three, R. V. Hubbard (aged 18), J. Hurst (16) and S. R. Haynes (19), are all ex-choirboys, while John Hill, who had previously rung a peal on the tenor, is only 15 and still a member of the choir. They have been under the tuition of Messrs. W. H. Clarke and S. Harrison, who completed the band. John Hill and John Hurst shared the conducting. It was the first peal of Doubles on the bells. The original eight were installed in 1902 and the peal augmented to ten in 1923 by the generosity of Mr. William Willson.

LEADING CONDUCTORS-67.

THOMAS B. WORSLEY.

One of the stalwarts of the Lancashire Association is Mr. Thomas B. Worsley, of Bolton. He has served the association in various official capacities for many years, and in addition to his peal ringing activities he is known throughout the Exercise for his work as a composer. His compositions are of outstanding merit, for he has aimed at quality rather than quantity.

Mr. Worsley was born in the parish of Deane, near Bolton, on September 30th, 1886, and, while now attached to St. Mary's, Deane, began his ringing career in 1909 at the six-bell tower of St. Bartholomew's Church, Bolton. His first peal, however, was rung at Deane; Graudsire Triples on February 20th, 1911, and his first as conductor was

Triples on February 20th, 1911, and his first as conductor was also rung there, when he called a peal of Grandsire Triples on April 18th, 1913.

He has taken part in some

April 18th, 1913.

He has taken part in some memorable performances, including the 11,232 Superlative Surprise Major at St. Peter's, Bolton, and the 17,824 Oxford Treble Bob Major et Heptonstall, rung in 10 hours 51 minutes. Both these were conducted by Edward Jenkins. Then, too, he took part in that other great record of 15,312 Cambridge Surprise Maximus, rung in 11 hours 33 minutes, at Ashton-under-Lyne and conducted by William Pye. He rang in the first Spliced Surprise peal by the Lancashire Association. Superlative and Cambridge, at Radcliffe in 1932, and later in the same year was the first Lancashire ringer to ring a peal of Spliced Surprise in four methods. He did this under William Pye's conductorship at Romford, Essex.

Mr. Worsley's conducting has been done rather by force of circumstances than from inclination, but he has been greatly assisted by that other well-known Lancashire ringer. Titus Barlow, with whom he has rung over 180 peals, and Edward Jenkins. Of the 315 peals which Mr Worsley has rung, 282 have been for the Lancashire Association, and he has conducted 88. His peals have been rung in 60 towers in eight counties.

Mr. Worsley has been a member of the Lancashire Association Committee almost continuously since 1915, was vice-president from 1933 to 1935 and has been one of the association's representatives on the Central Council since 1936.

RECORDS BROKEN.

The annual report commented upon the very satisfactory attendances at the district meetings, in comparison with the support given during former vears. In every branch records in this direction had been broken, while a greater variety of methods had been rung, which was another healthy sign. Membership totals showed an increase of 24 over the previous year, and the annual subscribers now exceeded 400. During the year 63 members were elected—10 honorary, 8 nonresident life members, and 50 members 'of the genus labelled "performing" so delightfully in the rules'—but losses by death and the non-payment of subscriptions gave a net gain of only 24. The balance sheet showed a balance of only £1 18s. 5d., but the end of the financial crisis appeared in sight.

The association was the first to reach the extraordinary total of 5,000 peals. In the past year 103 peals were rung, a decrease of five on the record set up in 1937, but the quality of the peals had improved. Cambridge Surprise Royal and Double Norwich Court Bob Royal appeared in the list after a regrettable absence of many years, and Pudsey Surprise Major, Belgrave Surprise Major, Real Double Superlative Surprise Major, Painswick Surprise Major, a peal of Spliced Plain Bob, Double Bob, Hereward Bob and Double Oxford Bob Major, and peals of Minor in 15 methods in seven extents had been rung by the association for the first time. One hundred and eighty-four ringers and twenty-seven conductors took part in the peals.

The report concluded with thanks to the branch secretaries for

The report concluded with thanks to the branch secretaries for their successful labours, and added that 'in spite of record attendances at the several meetings, there are large numbers of ringers who do not put enough into the association and who could profit much by regular attendance. In too many instances the success of a meeting has depended on the support of a few enthusiasts whose sphere of activity is not confined to any one branch. The welfare of the association is every member's concern, and his act of membership is not concluded by a simple payment of two or five shillings. We need his support at meetings, his suggestions and constructive criticism for improving our activities in the ringing world. In particular, we want to help him, if it is in our power, to improve his striking, and thus the efficiency of his service as a churchworker. WORCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

NEW MEMBERSHIP RECORD.

Decline in Peal Ringing.

A record membership was reported at the annual meeting of the Worcestershire Association at Worcester on Easter Monday. The total has now grown to 530. There were nearly one hundred members present at the meeting in the College Hall, the president (Dean Davies) being in the chair. He surprised the members with a kindly gift. Since we met last year, the Dean said, 'I have spent some tour months away, two of them in India. While I was there my thoughts did go back to this association, because I remembered the last annual meeting and hoped to be able to attend this one. I want to ask the association to accept a small present I got while in India—which indeed reminded me of you. It is an elephant's bell. This is an orderly gathering, so that I do not suppose a bell is needed. This is the kind of bell slung over the shoulders of the elephants, one bell—bigger than this one—langing on each side.'

The Dean presented it to the secretary (Mr. J. D. Johnson) on

The Dean presented it to the secretary (Mr. J. D. Johnson) on behalf of the association, and suggested, amid laughter, that it be recorded on the minutes that if this elephant bell should become a 'white elephant' it might be sold without hurting his feelings, and anything obtained from the sale might be given to the tower fund. The members expressed their hearty appreciation of the gift. The annual report presented by the secretary, after referring to the activities of the year, said the outstanding feature of the year had been the election of the remarkable number of 106 new performing members. The report added:— allowance for lanses, removals.

members The report added:—
'Despite this number, and making allowance for lapses, removals and losses through death, our paid-up membership for 1938 does not reach the high level which seemed possible earlier in the year. For the fourth time in succession, the Western Branch records an increase—this year of 26; the Southern Branch shows an increase of 11, but the Northern Branch a decrease of 22. There are, however, in the two latter branches several hands whose subscriptions for 1938 are outstanding, but we feel confident these will be forthcoming early in 1939. The net result is a total of 510, 15 more than last year, and 14 above our previous highest number for any one year. The association records reveal the peculiar fact that each peak year has been immediately followed by a slump. May we express the hope that everyone will work together in an effort to avoid history repeating itself in 1939.

'The General Fund shows a credit balance on the year's work of

'The General Fund shows a credit balance on the year's work of £5 10s. 3d., and no calls having been made on the Belfry Repairs Fund, its value has been increased by £11 4s. The total worth of our funds is now £94 8s. 2d.'

The committee reported that grants of £5 each had been approved towards the restoration of the bells at Hanbury and Wollaston, and that it had been decided to advance the cost of twelve copies of the Central Council's publication, 'The Collection of Surprise Major Methods.'

FALLING OFF IN PEALS.

FALLING OFF IN PEALS.

The peals analysis and points table, compiled by Mr. J. Pigott, described 1938 as rather disappointing so far as the number of peals was concerned, only 48 being rung and being one of the leanest of recent years. This compared very unfavourably with a year or two ago when they nearly topped the century, and they could not but feel that it is some measure reacted on their efficiency. They would like to see all towers in union making an effort to secure at least one peal during the year, and thought this could be done in most instances, even if it necessitated calling in a little neighbourly assistance.

The number of members taking part in peals was 132, of which nine rang their first peal and 70 accomplished something they had not previously done. The conductors numbered 16, among whom there was only one new one, while it was regretted that no handbell peal was recorded over the year.

The peals, which were made up with 13 on six bells, 32 on eight and three on 10, were distributed as follows: Northern 16, Western 15, South 7, and Mixed 10, and the order of merit was as under: Claines, 1,167 points; Brierley Hill, 1,072; Upton-on-Severn, 739; Wollaston, 613; Selly Oak, 593; Hinton, 574; Worcester Cathedral, 556; Clent, 415; Kinderminster, 413; Crowle, 336; Hartlebury, 330; King's Norton, 222; Suckley, 203; independents, 1,174. Twenty-two towers scored less than 200 points, their total being 1,812, and making the grand total 7,407 points, this showing over last year a drop of nearly half, which was not too encouraging.

The balance sheet for the year showed receipts £73 15s., which included £8 12s. brought forward, and a credit balance of £9 2s. 3d., with £5 deposited in the savings back at the end of the year.

Receipts on the Belfry Revairs Fund account totalled £50 17s. 4d.

The members stood in silence as a mark of respect for members who had passed away during the year, and a vote of sympathy was similarly expressed with the Rev. J. F. Hastings, of Martley (a vice-president and former clerical secretary), on the loss of his wife, and to Mr. E. P. Thomas, of Claines (vice-president), on the death of his mother. Both Mrs. Thomas and her son have been the generous donors of new bells to several towers in the diocese.

A STRIKING ADDRESS.

A STRIKING ADDRESS.

The members attended choral evensong in the Cathedral, at which the preacher was the Rev. J. R. Bamber, Vicar of Wollaston. In the course of his address he said he very much appreciated the honour of being invited to preach at that service, but he had no special qualifications to do so, other than his love of bells and gratitude to the men who rang for service and spent their leisure hours in practice. On such an occasion a non-ringer could do one of two things; he could preach a general sermon with a passing reference to bells, or he could take his courage in both bands and from his slight knowledge of ringing draw a few simple lessons applicable to everyday life, and this he proposed to do. Taking his text from Psalm 150, 'Praise Him upon the well tuned cymbals; praise Him upon the loud cymbals,' the preacher said this was the nearest reference he could find to bells in the Bible. From the cymbals of the Bible, two cruds plates clashed together by hand, they had progressed to the carefully cast, carefully tuned and carefully hung bells demanded by modern change ringing. And in the ringing chamber was a band of ringers working together in a carefully arranged plan. Not every one of the band knew the whole of the plan, but depended on the calls made by the leader. There would be pandemonium if no one took any notice and each decided to please himself. If there was one place on earth where co-operation was required, and where the leader should expect obedience, that place was in a ringing chamber. Was that not the parable of the world at large? The change from the cymbals was similar to the change in mode of life. There was need for more co-operation between man and man need of life. Jesus Christ was the only Leader for the world, but before He could lead we must allow Him to take us into His foundry and to tune us until our hum notes were in harmony and sympathy with our strike notes.

N. T. Gardner). He preached from the text, 'Go ye, therefore, and tell my disciples,' and said that was the commission the ringers carried with them as they climbed the steps of their helfices and court the with them as they climbed the steps of their belfries and rang the bells for divine service. He also feelingly referred to the death of Mr. George Gray, of Hertford, who, he said, had done an immensely valuable work for bellringing in Hertford.

The business meeting was presided over by the retiring president, Mr. A. E. Cooke, of King's Langley, who recorded his pleasure derived from his presidency for the past year, and expressed the hope that the meeting would have far-reaching success.

The Benevolent Fund showed a credit balance of £25 18s. 3d., but £2 of this was paid out during the previous week to a necessitous member. The sum of £8 13s. 5d. stood to the credit of the Voluntary Bell Fund, and it was agreed to grant three guineas from this to the cost of the restoration of the bells of St. Mary's, Hitchin. The treasurer expressed the hope that next year the accounts would be very easy, for with the increased subscription and a good set of officers this was possible.
