RESOLUTIONS

Most of us are familiar with the saying that good resolutions serve as paving stones on the road to hell. A New Year is sometimes more than an adjustment of the calendar. To many it is symbolic of a fresh start, and it is in the planning of this new beginning that the old adage becomes operative. Don't believe the satanic reference. Even the striving after checking a particular weakness has merit. We ringers have our own weaknesses; we are a peculiar people in the eyes of the world. Exercise or entertainment with a ball is understandable by the public at large, but with a rope and a bell ten thousand times no.

The first resolution on my list is walking circumspectly in the eyes of the public. In the midst of our enthusiasm for ringing is there not a danger of over keennsss? The Church and the world do not revolve around ringing. Ringing has to be dovetailed into the scheme of things. Each tower situated in a centre of population should be examined as to the effectiveness of its louvres and whether the bells are likely to give offence to the non-bigot. (There is a section of the public who will attack bells and anything connected with the Church, whatever the circumstances, and it is impossible to cater for these people.)

When ringing a peal where the bells are heard by a large number of people there should be some purpose for the peal, and it is useful propaganda if this reason, provided it is a good one, could be published, even after the event. It should not be difficult to compile an appropriate list on a sufficiently broad basis to be understandable by the non-ringing public. With a purpose, ringing then becomes to them an understandable thing.

Another difficulty is over practices. These should be held on a regular evening each week with a limitation of time. People living around would know when to expect the bells and arrange their own recreations accordingly. We heard recently of a musical appreciation class which met to listen to gramophone records at the same time as the bells of the Parish Church were being practised on. The class could not be held. A meeting between representatives of the ringers and the class has resulted in an understanding being reached.

The fact that a practice is being held is no excuse for an absence of disregard for those who might hear the bells. The conductor should not hesitate to call 'stand' if the ringing degenerates into a type that is likely to give offence to the outside public, rather than give a display of his own consummate skill in unravelling ringing tangles. Two things are invariable at the bottom of such ringing-lack of knowledge of the method, or as someone remarked, 'absence of pencil and paper,' and lack of confidence as displayed in the inability of the individual to master his bell. There is a quotation of John Selden that runs, 'Never tell your resolutions beforehand,' but then it is the exception that proves the rule!

THE BEDFORDSHIRE ASSOCIATION

Bedfordshire is a county with a long tradi-tion of change ringing. The first record of change ringing dates back to 1655 as testified by a manuscript preserved in the Bodleian Library at Oxford and written about that date. The enthusiasm of John Bunyan as a date. The enthusiasm of John Bunyan as a ringer at Elstow is additional evidence of the popularity of ringing in those early days. In his book, 'Grace Abounding,' Bunyan's conscience pricked him on the matter of ringing, for he wrote:-

'I thought that such practice was but vain and therefore forced myself to leave it; yet my mind hankered; wherefore I would go to the steeple-house, and look on, though I durst not ring.'

The association was formed at a meeting in Bedford on March 13th, 1882, when the following officers were elected:

Patron: The Lord Bishop of Ely.

President: The Ven. Archdeacon of Bedford. Vice-presidents: The Rev. R. E R. Watts (Vicar of St. Paul's, Bedford), Mr. C. L. Higgins, of Turvey Abbey, and Mr. T. Bagnall, of Milton-Ernest.

Hon. Treasurer: Mr. L. G. Elger, of Bedford. Hon. Secretary: Mr. C. Herbert, of Woburn. The committee consisted of eight members of whom four shall be performing members.'
The first rule reads: That the society be

called the Bedfordshire Association of Change Ringers. That it have for its objects the pro-motion of beifry reform, and the cultivation of scientific change ringing, and shall consist of honorary and performing members.

In the first year there were 19 honorary and 29 performing members. The highest membership was achieved in 1931 with a total of 241, namely, 18 honorary and 223 performing. Subsequent presidents were:—



The number of peals rung by the association totals 1,050. The longest is a peal of 10,176 Kent Treble Bob Major in 1894. A 10,080 of Minor was rung in 1923. There is no twelvebell tower in the county, but a twelve-bell peal was rung by the association on handbells in 1903, consisting of 5,016 of Bob Maximus. The first peal by the association was a 5,040 of Bob Minor in 1884. Other 'firsts' were Grandsire Triples 1885, Bob Triples 1886, Bob Major and Kent Treble Bob Major '1887, Stedman Triples 1894, Double Norwich 1895, Oxford Treble Bob Major 1890, Grandsire Caters 1896.

Trebie Bob Major 1890, Grandsire Caters 1896. Kent Trebie Bob Royal 1897, Superlative Sur-rise Major 1897, Stedman Caters 1902. Cam-ridge Major 1913, Bristol 1925. London Major 1927, Little Bob Major 1929, Little Bob Royal on handbells 1931.

The first recorded peal in the county

The first recorded peal in the county was a 5,040 of Bob Major at Dunstable in 1776 by the College Youths. The College Youths also rang a peal of Grandsire Triples at Leighton Buzzard in 1801. The greatest number of peals rung in any one year was in 1937, namely, 45. In 1882 there were eight rings of eight bells in the county, 13 of six, 47 of five, 18 of four, 18 of three and eight of two, total 112. At the present time there are two rings of ten, 12 of eight, 32 of six, 26 of five, 14 of four, 18 of three, and 8 of two, total 112. It will thus be seen that considerable augmentations

have taken place during the 64 years of the association's existence. The most ancient bell in the county is the sanctus bell at Dunstable, traditionally reputed to have been cast about the end of the eleventh century.

When the Ely Diocesan Association was formed in 1882 the committee of the Bedfordshire Association placed before their annual meeting 'certain resolutions providing that for neeting 'certain resolutions providing that for the future the society shall exist as the Bed-ford Archidiaconal Branch of the Ely Diocesan Society.' There apparently the matter ended as there is no further reference to the subject in subsequent minutes. The Bedfordshire Association is now in the St. Albans Diocese, of which there is no Diocesan Association, although tentative suggestions have been made from time to time to this end. In 1932 the association celebrated its jubilee by a luncheon in Bedford and an officers' peal at Biddenham, where the first peal was rung. where the first peal was rung.

OUTSTANDING PERSONALITIES

Of outstanding personalities, Mr. Charles Herbert naturally takes pride of place. He may truthfully be described as the 'father' of change ringing in Bedfordshire, and with the help of Canon (then Mr.) W. W. C. Baker, Mr. Edwin Ranson and Mr. Isaac Hills, started the association on its successful career, from which it has never looked back. In the pre-face of North's 'Church Bells of Bedford-shire' he receives an acknow'edgment of his he receives an acknowledgment of his help towards the completion of that work, and amongst other of his activities in his endeavour amongst other of his activities in his endeavour to further the science of change ringing and belfry reform to the fore, he wrote out the full peal of 40.320 of Bob Major in order to convince a sceptic. This manuscript is now in the possession of the Central Council Library. Mr. Herbert died in 1923 in his 80th year.

In another sphere the name of Mr. Charles W. C'arke stends out as easily that of the leading peal ringer and conductor. He joined the association in 1883 and soon came to the

front as a conductor and applied all his energy and spare time to teaching young bands, starting from scratch in every case. He rang altogether more than 700 peals, of which he conducted over 430. His death took place in January, 1942, at the age of 77 years.

The Bedfordshire Association enjoys the unique distinction, for the first time in its history, of having a lady as its president in the person of Miss Steel, who was elected at the annual meeting on Easter Monday in the place of Canon Rust, who resigned on account of failing health. Miss Steel, as is well known, is also president of the Ladies' Guild, an honour of which the Bedfordshire Association feels justifiably proud. Miss Steel scored many peals during the years between the wars, especially in a great variety of Minor methods, and probably holds a record in this respect. The Bedfordshire Association enjoys the

The association suffered a severe blow by the untimely death in the 1914-1918 war of John William Barker, of Bedford, who would undoubtedly have made a great name for himself had he lived, both as a conductor and composer. He had already a number of meri-

torious compositions to his credit.

Of other leading conductors during various periods the following deserve honorable mention: Mr. Alfred King, senior vice-president, Mr. L. A. Goodenough, both of the Luton tower; Mr. A. E. Sharman, vice-president, Dunstable; the late Mr. C. Herbert, of Woburn, both hand and tower; and Mr. E. J. Hobbs, of Husband Crawley.

The other vice-presidents are Mr. J. Nicholls, of Leighton Buzzard, Mr. E. Herbert, of Woburn, Mr. W. Stapleton, of Bedford, and Mr. G. W. He'ey, of Dunstable, The completion of 25 years' service by Mr. C. J. Ba'l as local secretary of the Biggleswade District is rectavorthy.

The association, which is divided into three districts, suffered a slump during the war years, but is now almost back to its pre-war strength, thanks to an influx of young recruits. A local secretary is appointed for each district, who undertakes to arrange a meeting once a month. The annual meeting takes place on Easter Monday in Bedford, and a summer festival is held annually, usually on the first Saturday in July, in various suitables centres in the county.

Having rung there many times and also having listened to them from various points in the town, I am afraid I am inclined to agree with the complainants; the bells are very noisy in the immediate vicinity. To remedy this would it not be possible to brick up the louvres? I should imagine that this would kill the harshness, and as the tower would kill the harshness, and as the tower has a stone spire with several openings higher up, these would only allow a moderate amount of noise in the locality and perhaps give the bells a chance to sound further away.

I really do think that the matter of noisy bells will have to be looked into or, as Mr. Birmingham remarks, the bells will only be

rung subject to by-laws.

I really don't see how we can compare aero-planes, motor horns and pneumatic drills with bells, as the former are really a necessity in our modern life and are thought of as such by the local population, whereas bells are considered an unnecessary noise (unless quietened) by the vast majority.—Yours faithfully,
