#### A ROYAL COMING-OF-AGE

Collected in this issue of 'The Ringing World' are the peals and quarter-peals rung in honour of the coming-of-age of Princess Elizabeth. Bells perhaps more than any other method express the felicitations of the people, and ringing on April 21st was widespread—far more extensive than indicated by the peals and quarter-peals recorded. Of the 25 peals, these were distributed over 18 counties, extending from Devonshire to Lancashire and from Cardiganshire to Norfolk.

Naturally the civic authorities took an interest in the ringing. At Norwich the Lord Mayor ascended to the ringing chamber of St. Giles-on-the-Hill, accompanied by the Vicar (the Rev. D. E. Rae), to greet the ringers, and they remained in the ringing chamber during the opening courses of the peal—Superlative Surprise Major.

Another peal of Superlative was rung in the adjoining county, at Spalding, and this was the first peal in the method by all except the conductor. The spirit of venturing on something new was also displayed at Southport, where a peal of Spliced Kent and Oxford Treble Bob was rung, which was the first peal in the method by all the band.

The finest achievement of the day was in the Cardiganshire village of Llanbadarn Fawr, near Aberystwyth, where four of the band were ringing their first peal. One hour from the end the oil lamp in the ringing chamber went out—not from a lack of oil but from a short wick, Towards the end each ringer saw of the rest of the band as little more than shadows. Many a company would have abandoned the peal under such conditions. Llanbadarn Fawr were worthy representatives of the Principality.

An event of this character is an occasion for veterans. The oldest was Mr. A. H. Snow, who at Littleham, Devon, rang the tenor to a peal of Grandsire Triples on his 81st birthday. The stamina of many of our elderly ringers is amazing. To ring for 2 hours and 50 minutes continuously at the age of 81, while in no sense a record, is a feat in which any individual can take a just pride. Of all the bells that were rung, those most familiar to Her Royal Highness were at Windsor Parish Church. Here the peal was on the following Saturday, and was earmarked for a dual purpose—the 24th anniversary of the King and Queen's wedding day and the 21st birthday of Princess Elizabeth.

At Newport, I. of W., at the completion of the quarterpeal, the bells were fired 21 times. Good wishes and every happiness are extended to Her Royal Highness from the many belfries of the land.

Then to Sherborne (which heavy be'l ringers will be surprised to hear possesses, not England's heaviest eight, but a mere pleasant six by Rudhall, 1716, tenor 11 cwt. in G!), afterwards to Great Barrington, with a nice six rehung by Taylor im 1935, 202 years after Rudhall put them there. At Taynton, the nave of the church seemed higher than it is long—a feature noticeable in some other Cotswold churches. noticeable in some other Cotswold churche-A nice little six here, some young ringers, and a new Vicar coming on the morrow.

On Wednesday we tempted providence by visiting Clanfield, where two clerical peal visiting Clanfield, where two certail peat attempts came to grief some years ago owing to broken ropes. Bob Major came to grief this time owing to a broken train of thought in the conductor's mind. Others rang at Brize Norton and Bampton Aston, then we all met at the fine church of Bampton, where Double

Norwich, etc., went well on a grand eight.

Braving the gale, we went on to Lechlade, where we found a nice six, then to the glorious church of Fairford, where the ringers stand amongst the pews beneath the central tower. Why couldn't other great churches have been left in peace to keep their glass, choir stalls, brasses, as Fairford has done? What a palace of beauty would have existed in parish after parish if this had been the case! The day concluded at Shipton-under-Wychwood, where we could well have spent longer on a fine eight. Small wonder if he was exhausted—and yet he had recovered sufficiently by the next day to call a peal of Stedman Caters at Taunton, and to turn in the 27½ cwt. at Bridgwater to a peal of Superlative, while the day after that he rang the 25 cwt. tenor at Martock to New Cambridge, and the 7th to a 27½ cwt. tenor to Stedman Triples.

It is no disrespect to those bands who have subsequently taken part in peals at Exeter to say that this peal at the Cathedral, coming as merely one of twelve rung during a week's tour, was thus perhaps the greatest performance of them all—excepting, of course, the peal of Cambridge Maximus.—Yours faithfully,

#### Preservation of MSS.

Dear Sir,-Your leading article of April 18th dealing with composers' manuscripts prompts me to question whether the machinery sug-gested for their preservation should be considered adequate.

The establishment of repositories for manuscripts might prevent their wanton destruction, but would hardly preserve them from oblivion, since they would be geographically inaccessible to most people and not readily available to anyone but the custodian. A wider dissemination of technical literature would seem essential if the present generation of composers is to be relieved from the recessity of repeating for themselves the work done by their predecessors.

In your leader you cite existing restrictions as a bar to publication of such information, though even when rationing ends, it is doubtful whether prospective readers will be sufficiently numerous to support printed editions of advanced text books. There are, however, several methods of reproduction, employing stencils or lithographic plates, which are cheaper than letterpress printing and eminently suitable for runs of a few hundred

copies.

I suggest that data at present lying dormant could usefully be duplicated by one of these processes for distribution to subscribers, and I will, if interest is shown in the idea, undertake a detailed investigation into the

practical and financial aspects.

To this end I would be obliged if everyone interested would communicate with me, indi-
