TWO CATHEDRALS

In two successive weeks the bells of two English Cathedrals, after being recast, have been dedicated. At Wakefield a ring of 12 with a supplementary bell to permit of a light eight being rung has been provided, and at Lichfield ten bells. That two of our Cathedrals should have been so enriched within the space of eight days is unprecedented in the history of ringing.

Both rings of bells have for many years required attention. Wakefield's bells have been silent since 1936, the frames having been condemned because of the oscillation. But even before that date the bells had not given satisfaction, as the trebles which were added in 1892 for calibre and tone failed to blend with the other ten. In consequence Wakefield has not the reputation of being a ringing centre. Ringers from Ossett helped substantially at the dedication festival, although the event created widespread interest. Wakefield have before them the task of training a new company, and we feel sure that the helping hand will be forthcoming from Yorkshire towers within easy reach, so that this skilled example of the founder's art will be truly used to the glory of God and for His service.

The story of Lichfield is in some respects similar. Here a Cathedral with beauties in architecture that, on first viewing, almost takes one's breath away with its magnificence, had as poor a specimen of English bells as one could find. Noisy and jarring to the nerves of those living in the vicinity, they had none of the mellowness that might be expected from a cathedral of such antiquity. Very little appears to have been done to these bells since the days of Waterloo, although endeavours had been made, without success, to tune the trebles. The gift of the recast bells from the Freemasons of Staffordshire is munificent and timely. There is a dignity about the new tenors that is pleasing to the ear, and the Exercise hopes to have the pleasure of recording the first peal on these bells on the occasion of the wedding of Princess Elizabeth. While Lichfield will have to train more ringers, they have the nucleus of a young band in the Beresford family, and if other young people can capture their enthusiasm, then Mr. G. E. Oliver and Mr.

A. F. Sedgwick will have a company to be proud of, and

there will be an added glory to the Cathedral of St. Chad of bells well and truly struck.

While there were four first pealers at Stalybridge on October 14th, the ringers in question learnt to ring in 1925 and 1927 respectively. Mr. F. Hodge, the conductor, who has been ringing since 1919, has two peals to his credit. While the 'go' of these bells is excellent, they are very noisy, being 13 or 14 feet above the ringers with only a 9in. floor between.

Another procession was formed by the Mayor and members of the Corporation of Lichfield, escorted by a detachment of the Special Constraints.

SERVICE RELAYED.

The service opened with the singing of the National Anthem and the hymn, 'Before th' eternal Father's throne.' The dedication followed the first lesson, read by Canon J. E. W. Wallis. In the spacious belfry were assembled the Bishop of Stafford, the Dean, Precentor and singers, together with the Provincial Grand Master and his officers, and the ceremony of dedication was relayed by loud speakers to all cation was relayed by loud speakers to all parts of the Cathedral.

In making the offer of the recast bells on behalf of the Freemasons of Staffordshire, the Earl of Dartmouth asked the Dean's acceptance of the gift "to the greater glory of God and for the enrichment of our Cathedral Church."

The Dean (the Very Rev. F. A. Iremonger), in accepting the bells with due thankfulness, added, 'It shall be our endeavour to see that this gift is preserved for the purpose for which it has been offered. He asked the Bishop to dedicate the ring of bells 'that it may thereby be set apart from all worldly and profane purposes and may be used in the worship and service of Almighty God in this church.'

The Bishop then hallowed and dedicated The Bisnop then nanowed and declicated the bells, and the prayers he offered included one for bellringers—that they 'may be filled with reverence and godly fear, and mindful of the sacredness of Thy house, may put away from them all idle thoughts and light behaviour.'

The singing during the service was of great beauty. It included two anthems, S. S. Wesley's 'Lead me, Lord, lead me in righteousness' and 'Let their celestial concerts all unite' (Handel). The Te Deum was to Stanford's setting in B flat.

THE MUSIC OF THE STEEPLE

The Dean in his address said 'You, whose generosity has made this gift possible, must surely feel a thrill of pride and joy when you reflect that for generations to come the bells of Lichfield Cathedral—now recast and more tuneful than any of us can remember—will ring out, as of old, over the Staffordshire countryside.

The nine smallest bells also bear Taylor's shield with 'Recast 1947' below. The tenor bell weighs 31 cwt. 2 qr. 9 lb. and sounds note D natural.

HISTORY OF THE BELLS

The early history of the Cathedral bel's is purely conjectural, but in 1477 Dean Heywode gave a great hell called Jesus. which bore the following inscription:—

I am the Bell of Jesus, and Edward

is our King, Sir Thomas Heywode first caused me

Sir Thomas Heywode first caused me to ring.

This bell was destroyed during the partial destruction of the Cathedral during the Civil Wars. A Bodleian MS. says: 'One Pickens, a pewterer, on July 26th, 1653, knokt in pieces the fair bell called Jesus at Lichfield, he being the cheif officer appointed for demolishing that Cathedral.' In 1670 Bishop Hacket who restored the Cathedral, contracted for 'six bell's becoming a cathedral.' When Bishop Hacket died on October 26th, 1670, three of the bells had been cast, but only the tenor fixed. On hearing this bell for the 11rst time the good Bishop observed that it would be his passing bell and died shortly afterwards. In 1687, the Hacket bells having become 'bad and useless,' a subscription was raised to

'bad and useless,' a subscription was raised to replace them with a new peal of ten, and the replace them with a new peal of ten, and the contract was placed with Henry Bagley, of Ecton, Northants. This peal was completed in 1688. A fire occurred in the belfry in 1758, and the intense heat cracked the ninth; this was recast by Abel Rudhall. The treble was 'recast by Thomas Rudhall in 1764.'

The three smallest and also the sixth hell had been very badly chipped away on their edges, and still they were flat in relation to the tone of the other bells; the musical quality of the peal as a whole was very poor indeed, especially for such a magnificent Cathedral.

800 Peals

MR. T. GROOMBRIDGE, SEN.'s RECORD.

Many congratulations have been extended to Mr. T. Groombridge, sen., who rang his 800th peal on his 80th birthday. His ringing career seemed to peter out with his accident in July, 1939, and after his 794th on October 9th. 1941, Mr. Groombridge announced that he would not attempt another peal.

This held good until last year, when he rang a peal of Kent Minor at Stapleford and Grand-sire Caters at St. Peter's, Nottingham.

A few attempts which failed followed at intervals, but recently the suggestion was made to complete the 800 on his 80th birthday, and he just succeeded, as No. 799 was rung two nights before. To keep in practice, a quarterpeal of Stedman in hand was started for on the remaining evening, but it was not taken too seriously.

One of his most cherished memories is deleted from the 800, the record peal of Cinques at Southwark, which turned out to be false, but he often cites this as some of the best ringing

he ever took part in

He had handled the tenors at Bow, Southark, Manchester Town Hall, Cornhill, etc., but was equally proud of managing Foots Cray treble of 1 cwt. plus a few pounds to a peal of Stedman Doubles. His record is as follows:

HODNET BELLS

Both the new bells are inscribed, 'Thanksgiving for victory, 1939-1945,' on the waist, and round the shoulder, 'John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1947.' The treble weighs 4 cwt. 2 qr. 27 lb., and the second 5 cwt. 2 lb. They blend perfectly with the old bells (Rudhall, 1769), which were retuned at Loughborough in 1931 and rehung in a 'low side' iron frame for eight.

Everyone was delighted with the peal, and the founders are to be congratulated on making such an excellent 'splice.' The Hodnet people now possess one of the best eights in the country.

INITIATING A NEW BAND

Dear Sir,-Your leaders often give rise to interesting questions. One is: Has the best way to initiate a new band into change ringing way to initiate a new paid into charge been discovered, published and adopted as standard practice? Not that I am aware of; but of the various possibilities, one must be the easiest for learners and therefore the quickest. Which is it?

In my experience the propagandist is very liable to be faced by two obstacles, either of which singly, would make matters very diffi-cult. When both are in evidence at the same cult. When both are in evilutime, the position is hopeless.

In my last opportunity I undertook the task In my last opportunity I undertook the task at the invitation of vicar and curate. After the usual war-time difficulties had been overcome, a strictly local band of novices reached the stage of being able to ring the 14 hunting lines on seven bel's (tenor covering) in preparation for Grandsire Triples. This success proved that I was working on the right lines; it only remained to bring the striking up to a satisfactory standard, and they were ready to tackle the Plain Course. tackle the Plain Course.

In the meantime, unfortunately, the sympathetic vicar had died, and his successor took the opposite view. Then the captain left the town, and the remnant (instead of making an intensive effort to replace losses) allowed themselves to be inoculated by some unknown coun sellor with the opinion that the right approach to change ringing is by way of Grandsire Doubles. As it was known that in an eighthell tower, surrounded by thousands of people, I do not approve of changes on five bells received no further requests to be helpful. Later, at the next branch meeting, there were handed in nine local names for associate membership; so why was there any need to give up eight-bell ringing?

It is now over two years since I was last in the tower as an invited guest, and (to the best of my knowledge) no local six have succeeded in ringing any Doubles. On the last three occasions that I have happened to pass during the working the working were time for service ringing, the worshippers were being invited to attend by means of (1) one

bell; (2) and (3), chiming on eight bells.

If the blame for the failure rests on me, where did I go wrong?

Dear Sir,-In your issue of August 1st, which has just come to hand, is a letter from Mr. Edgar Knott, captain of St. Paul's bellringers, Melbourne. Some of his statements are incorrect

Mr. Knott states that he wrote to the Bishop in regard to a visiting team. The Bishop wrote and told him that Mr. Joyner was making all arrangements. Mr. Knott did not write to Mr. Joyner. The matter was a personal one between the Bishop of Adelaide and Mr. Joyner and had nothing to do with the N.S.W.

Association.

As he had no reply, no doubt he assumed that St. Paul's had changed their mind. I fail to see how Mr. Knott can say that the Sydney ringers were unsportsmanlike.
