IMITATION, BUT . . .

TROM Australia House we have received information this week of how the news of the birth of the Royal Prince was heralded at Melbourne by an electronic carillon operating from Melbourne Town Hall. This was relayed by Radio Australia, and the so-called 'peals' were recorded by the B.B.C. and later rebroadcast from London. Without hesitation we state that we are appalled at the prostitution of one of the characteristic English arts. Immediately mechanisation steps in the individual skill departs and the public is led to believe that the imitation provided is the real thing.

Here are some of the details of the Melbourne electronic carillon: Patriotic and popular melodies were played on the bells by Professor B. Heinze, Ormond Professor of Music at the University, and were clearly audible for a distance of nine miles. A similar instrument was also in use in other Australian capitals to spread the news of the Royal birth and replace the conventional ring of bells. Its musically-exact notes render it suitable for playing tunes in addition to performing change ringing. The musical range covered is one and a half octaves (C to F, including half-tones), enabling most pieces of music to be played. Volume is completely under control at all times and can be varied to compensate for differing conditions of wind and weather.

The 18-note tubular-bell console was invented by Mr. J. E. Benson, an engineer of Sydney, and was made by Amalgamated Wireless (Australasia), Ltd., from Australian materials. Its height is framed by that of its longest tube, 5ft. 3in., and it has an elevated stool to permit the player to reach the keyboard comfortably.

Main features of the tubular-bell apparatus, writes Charles Lynch, are hammer handles of §in. hardwood, roller rod bearings of cast metal, adjustable buffer pads, hammer heads, suspended tubular bells, damper bar and microphone for amplifying effects. An interesting feature is the design of the striking mallets which are constructed of laminated cowhide for the special purpose for which they are required in the instrument. The 18 mallets in the console strike the bells; the sound is picked up by the microphone, and the usual apparatus amplifies the melody.

These carillons have already been installed in several Australian churches, including St. John's Church of England, Launceston and Hoskins Presbyterian Church, Lithgow, New South Wales. So far we have not noticed in 'The Ringing Towers,' the magazine of the New South Wales Association, any reference to this serious threat to change ringing in that State. There is no question that real progress in the art of change ringing is being made at St. Jude's, Randwick, All Saints', Parramatta, and St. James', Turramurra. A vigorous ringing society exists at Holy Trinity, Hobart, and St. Peter's, Adelaide, have been strengthened by the return of one of their ringers, Robin Groove, from England, where he gained experience in many English towers. Change ringers cannot but regard the electronic carillon as a threat to ringing as we know it. The English ringers who toured Australia rang a number of peals including one at Melbourne Cathedral.

The East Grinstead and District Guild

DURING the early 1920's, ringing in northern Sussex was in a very poor state. At that time the County Association was divided into three, i.e., Eastern, Central and Western Divisions, and ringing was centred round the more populous districts near the coast. In the Central Division, Brighton was the 'Mecca' of Surprise ringers and meetings were rarely held north of Uckfield, and consequently ringers and local bands around East Grinstead had little chance of improving themselves.

selves.

In 1927, Mr. N. E. Hope and Mr. G. Lambert, of East Grinstead, sent out invitations to towers within ten miles of that town for representatives to meet at Placelands, East Grinstead, the home of Mr. Hope, with the object of forming a ringing guild. On June 4th the meeting was held and the guild was formed, the following officers being elected: Master, Mr. O. Sippetts; treasurer, Mr. N. E. Hope; secretary, Mr. G. Lambert; committee, Messrs. E. J. Oliver, A. L. Ryman, D. Divall, W. Poole and G. Brackpool: This committee met again on June 22nd, and the first meeting was held at East Grinstead on July 30th, 1927. held at East Grinstead on July 30th, 1927.

rota of practices, at the rate of two per A rota of practices, at the rate of two per week, was drawn up and were fairly successful, but in 1928 the Guild settled down to a meeting once per month, the difficulty being to avoid clashing with the meetings of the three county associations over whose territory the Guild operated. This was overcome by holding the meetings regularly on the second Saturday of each month.

OPPOSITION FROM SUSSEX.

OPPOSITION FROM SUSSEX.

Despite the opposition of the Sussex County Association, the Guild was an immediate success and membership soon topped the 100 mark. With the opposition some of the early meetings were rather lively affairs, but the attendances soon showed the need for such a guild, who, at the outset, made it clear that its sole object was to help struggling bands and ringers to attain good striking in the standard methods and so improve Sunday service ringing. The Guild encouraged members to join their County Association, and did everything to promote good feeling towards the county, being content to remain as a nursery Learners were always sure of a ring at the meetings and most of the time is devoted to them. It was not until late years that Surprise methods were practised, as these could be had at county meetings. had at county meetings.

At the request of ringers outside the 10 mile Init, the area was extended to a radius of 15 miles in 1932, but in 1948, owing to lack of support and difficulties of operation, the western boundary was withdrawn to about eight miles west of East Grinstead, and now contains one ring of 10, 23 of 8, 15 of 6, and one of 5 bells.

To ensure an even distribution of meetings the Guild's area has now been divided into four and each division is visited in turn.

At the first annual meeting in 1928, the Rev. H. W. Layng, Rector of Withyham, was elected president and the Guild lost a great friend when he died in 1936. He was succeeded by the present president, the Rev. Dr. Golding-Bird, D.D., Vicar of East Grinstead, whose witty remarks are a feature of every annual meeting. meeting.

In 1929, following an objection by the Sussex County, the office of master was altered to that of chairman, Mr. E. J. Oliver being elected, subsequent chairmen being A. L. Ryman, 1936. B. Collison, 1945, and E. J. Ladd, 1947 to date. Mr. G. Lambert remained as secretary until 1937, followed by B. Saunders till 1941, then C. A. Bassett to date. The feature of Mr. Saunders' term of office was that he did all the Guild's printing, and produced the annual reports for 1937 and 1938 in

book form. The war put an end to this, but he continued printing in austerity form until 1946.

The first treasurer, Mr. N. E. Hope, remained in office until 1930, when he was ordained to the ministry and went to live near Cheltenham, later to become the present Master of the Gloucester and Bristol Association. Other treasurers have been E. J. Ladd to 1935, R. D. Divall to 1942, and E. J. Oliver to date.

AFFILIATION SECURED.

In 1932 it was proposed to affiliate to the Central Council, but this was opposed on the grounds that all members were represented by their county associations. In 1939 the opposition was overcome and the Guild was affiliated, with the election of Mr. A. Relfe, who still

In 1932 the Guild presented Withyham Parish Church with rope guides for the eight bells, and followed this in 1934 with a similar gift to Hartfield Parish Church.

The first peal for the Guild was one of Double Norwich at Coleman's Hatch in 1928, conducted by Mr. O. Sippetts, but as most members belong to the county associations, practically all the peals in the area are recorded for the respective county, and so only 40 peals have been credited to the Guild. 40 peals have been credited to the Guild. These include the first performance of a composition of Cambridge Major by C. H. Kippin and conducted by him at Coleman's Hatch on July 28th, 1937, and the first 'in hand' for the Guild, one of Bob Minor by the West Grinstead band in 1939. To celebrate the 21st birthday of the Guild, the eight officers rang a peal of Kent Treble Bob Major at East Grinstead on June 19th, 1948.

During the ban 13 meetings were held and were well attended. Some members became quite proficient on handbells and have continued this interest at each meeting to date.

Mathematics of Peal Ringing

DR. RANKIN'S THEORY.

On December 3rd, Dr. Rankin addressed the Cambridge Mathematical Society known as the New Pythagoreans, in Girton College, on 'The Mathematics of Change Ringing,' choosing as his subject Grandsire Triples. Readers will remember the editorial on his previous research earlier this year.

Dr. Rankin heard and watched change ringing for the first time when four mem-bers of the University Guild rang a course of Grandsire Triples before and a touch of Bob

Minor after the lecture.

After briefly explaining the notation used in group theory and considering the permutations of the three-bell hunt, three being in course and three out of course, Dr. Rankin proceeded to a more detailed explanation of Grandsire Triples.

He considered two permutations, P and B, corresponding to Plain and Bobbed leads respectively, such that $P^s\!=\!I$, where I denoted the permutation rounds, and B³=I. Then, having defined symmetric and alternating groups, he proceeded to state the fundamental rules of composition, i.e.:-

(i) That each row may be produced from the preceding row only by changing neighbouring pairs of bells.
(ii) That no change shall occur twice.
(iii) That the changes occur in sets of fourteen called leads.

He then showed that, ignoring singles, any change is uniquely determined by the leadchange is uniquely determined by the lead-end owing to the nature of the rows (in and out of course alternately) and the path of the treble. The problem to produce the 5,040 changes was then resolved into the production of the 360 treble leads. With reference to the work of John Holt and W. H. Thompson, the lecturer then turned to the idea of the Q-set, the discovery of the latter.

The remainder of the lecture was devoted

The remainder of the lecture was devoted to a fairly exhaustive consideration of Q-sets and their implications, culminating in a proof of the impossibility of obtaining a peal of Grandsire Triples using bobs alone. Briefly, his reasoning was that, since a Q-set consists of five lead-ends in a P structure, giving 72 Q-sets, or three lead-ends in a B structure, giving 120 Q-sets, and these Q-sets cannot all be bobbed or plained, all 360 leads cannot be produced. produced.

He showed that in a round block consisting of an even number of Q-sets, if one Q-set is bobbed instead (or plained, as the case may be) three round blocks are produced. In general, if we have a round block of 'plained' Q-sets and then decide to 'bob' some of them, we can only produce an odd number of round blocks, and hence we must use an odd number of Q-set originally. But we must have an even number of Q-sets (i.e., 72 or 120) for a peal, hence the peal is not possible by bobs alone.

Dr. Rankin concluded with a few general remarks on ringing and lengths of peals.

A SOMERSET PROTEST.

Some outspoken remarks were made at the annual meeting of the Dunster Deanery Branch of the Bath and Wells Diocesan As-sociation at Minehead on December 11th concerning the treatment of change ringing by the B.B.C.

The question was ventilated by Mr. A. Madeley, who said the poor acknowledgment given to church bell ringing by the B.B.C. was a matter of great interest to all ringers. It was 'an absolute disgrace' that an old art like ringing, which was English to the back-bone and, except in a few instances in the Dominions, was practised only in these islands, should be so neglected that 'they give us a paltry two or three minutes at the most before a service.

Mr. Madeley went on to say they were told that on November 15th they would hear the Westminster bells ringing for the Royal birth. What did they get? In the one o'clock news they had only a few seconds from the Society of College Youths, who were ringing a beautiful peal so far as striking, rhythm and time were concerned. It was a treat to hear the open-hand leads so well given and that was heing broadcast to yet, from a peal that was being broadcast to the whole world, they had only a few seconds.

Mr. Madeley suggested all Ringing Associations should endeavour to use the Central Council to get the B.B.C. to give ringing better treatment. As a further instance of the B.B.C. outlook on the art, he recalled that a few years ago he listened to a recording of Dickens' 'Christmas Carol,' during which a record of church bell ringing was introduced—ringing a muffled peal. 'That is troduced—ringing a muffled peal. 'That is the sort of treatment handed out to an old and grand art,' Mr. Madeley concluded, amid applause.

The Rev. T. S. Dawson, who presided, said he felt particularly sore about it because his own ringers did not have two minutes the last time a broadcast was made from his church (Carhampton).

The Rev. D. J. Cockle said he could not see the B.B.C. giving more time to religious broadcasting, but if something was done to instruct the vast listening public by way of an introduction to methods, with illustrations, he thought they might be getting somewhere.

The meeting decided to ask members to write individually to the Rev. Martin Wilson at the West Regional headquarters, Bristol, asking that more attention be given to ring-
