HENRY JOHNSON REUNION

MUCH of the reading space in this week's issue is devoted to the Henry Johnson commemoration dinner, and young ringers will find in the admirable summary of the life of this worthy, given by Mr. Thomas H. Reeves in his speech from the chair, inspiration and encouragement. And it is no little tribute that nearly 60 years after his death there should be such a large concourse of ringers from all parts of the country present to pay their tribute to this great ringer. Many found their way to Aston churchyard to his grave and to read the inscription over his gravestone: 'This stone is erected by the ringers of England in grateful memory of Henry Johnson, to whose ability and perseverance the art of change ringing is widely indebted.' Below is the text, 'Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might.'

The phrase that is particularly impressive is 'the ringers of England.' It was not only in his death that Henry Johnson received national recognition; there were banquets in his honour given on his 77th and 80th birthdays attended by the leading ringers of England. The commemoration dinners year by year have more and more assumed the proportion of national gatherings. An attendance of 246 from all parts of the country was counted on March 5th at Birmingham; there would have been at least another 100 if more dining accommodation had been possible. They were drawn together by that magnetism of friendship which is the great feature of our Exercise. The snow and unpleasant climatic conditions were forgotten in the warmth of good

comradeship.

The spirit of Henry Johnson remains in Birmingham to-day, carefully nurtured and preserved by St. Martin's Guild of this generation. During his lifetime he rang 139 peals, of which 88 were composed by himself, and it was in the realm of composition that his lasting contribution has been made. To emulate the standard of Henry Johnson has always been an aim of the Guild, and had he heard the report of Mr. Albert Walker on the achievements of 1948, particularly the non-conducted peal of Stedman Cinques, he would have been proud of the present generation. While the standard of accomplishment to-day is good, the high tradition of service is something better. A characteristic of St. Martin's is that the office-bearers are also the peal ringers. Individual pleasure of peal ringing is accompanied by a sense of obligation and service to the general body of ringers. Thus we find that Mr. Thomas H. Reeves, at the conclusion of 20 years' service as Guild secretary, is being succeeded by Mr. Henry E. Fearn, who last year participated in 108 peals. A feature of the Guild is also a desire of service to the community at large. A former secretary of 20 years' standing, Cclr. A. Paddon-Smith, enters vigorously into the political and civic life of the city. The service, however, which was very dear to the Editor's heart was the formation of a panel of lecturers from among younger men who have visited various church organisations and other bodies and in simple non-technical language told the fascinating story of bells and the art of change ringing. This is, indeed, valuable propaganda, and is likely to give its dividend in due season. The more the love of bells and the purpose of ringing can be inculcated into the community the more staple and permanent will be the foundation of ringing, and as the dust of Henry Johnson mingles with that of Aston the message will not cease to ring forth from the neighbouring steeple.

'HENRY JOHNSON' COMMEMORATION DINNER

RECORD ATTENDANCE HONOURS SECOND 20-YEAR SECRETARY St. MARTIN'S GUILD REPORT FLOURISHING YEAR

CENTRAL figure at the 'Henry Johnson' Commemoration Dinner at Birmingham on Mar. 5th was Mr. T. H. Reeves, who presided, This year he retired after 20 years of faithful service as secretary of St. Martin's Guild, and there was a record attendance of 246 present from all parts of the country to pay tribute to his selfless work for the promotion of ringing. A cheque was presented to him during the evening, Mr. Albert Walker, the retiring Master, being chosen to hand over the gift with the love and affection of the Guild.

Organisation of the event fell upon the shoulders of Mr. George E. Fearn, the new secretary. To seat the company two dining halls were necessary, and there were about another 100 ringers who applied too late for tickets. The presence of the B.B.C. recording apparatus was another new feature. Birmingham ringers were unsparing in their efforts.

He disagreed with those who said that the Church had no influence. They had evidence in Eastern Europe of the concern of evidence in Eastern Europe of the concern of the State for the influence of the Church.

The Archdeacon of Birmingham, in reply, said the relationship of Church and State was debated recently in the Church Assembly. The Church of England was anxious for certain

Church of England was anxious for certain privileges which many thought were important to its life, but they were all concerned that any difference between the Church and State would be disastrous. It would mean a repudiation of religion by the State and they had seen something of the results of such a policy in other countries.

In a word of thanks to ringers for their services to the Church, the Archdeacon said they represented something to the outside world that their human voice could not do; when they rang Sunday by Sunday they reached the hearts of a great many people who never darken the doors of the Church and reminded them that men and women were praying for them and there was a God in heaven.

HENRY JOHNSON'S LIFE.

The toast of the memory of the late Henry Johnson was submitted from the chair. Mr. Reeves said that until a few years ago this toast was always entrusted to someone who knew Henry Johnson well and they had with them that night two who knew him. He supposed that the always how Lohnson well osed that high two who knew him. He sup-losed that the only person knew Johnson well was Tom Miller, who was now in his 92nd year. His father was a personal friend of theory Johnson and rang several peals with him.

Henry Johnson was born at Lichfield on ruary 28th, 1809, and moved to Birmingham his early boyhood to settle in the Aston district. He started work in his father's business, but later he was employed by a firm of

timber merchants and in the course of time became general manager. He received his first instruction in ringing from the sexton of Aston Church, a man named R. Roberts, who was only a rounds ringer. Later he became acquainted with Joshua Short, a well-known character.

In 1830, Henry Johnson rang his first peal, Grandsire Triples at Aston, conducted by Thomas Day. In February, 1832, he conducted a muffled peal in memory of his old friend, Joshua Short. The next incident was one that influenced him very much in his study of composition and proof scale. On October 1st, 1841, when he conducted his first peal of Stedman Caters at Aston, he had previously submitted the figures to Thurstans, who said it was quite a good peal and true. It later turned out to be false. He immediately set out to master the principles of proof, and it was recognised that as far as standard methods were concerned he could tell at a glance whether a peal was true or false.

In 1844 he became the recognised leader of St. Martin's Youths, and his reputation extended throughout the country. He composed peals in all the recognised methods of that time. His last peal was rung in 1887—Stedman Caters at Aston. influenced him very much in his study of com-

Caters at Aston.

At a dinner in honour of his 77th birthday he was presented with his portrait and an illuminated address subscribed to by the ringers of England. The great event, however, was on his 80th birthday, when invitations were sent out by Sir Arthur Heywood to a banquet in honour of the old man. Henry Johnson died on January 7th: 1890, and was buried at Aston. The headstone in Aston Churchyard that marks his resting place was subscribed by the ringers of England. Birmingham had produced many great ringers, but Henry Johnson was the most famous of the lot.

Two ringers who remembered Henry Johnson were asked to stand and received an ovation from the assembly. They were Messrs. Charles Williams and George Mitchison.

Mr. Albert Walker, as retiring Master, proposed 'Continued prosperity to St. Martin's Guild,' and extended a very hearty welcome to the guests. Reviewing the past year, he said fortunately they had had only one loss by death, and that was a serious loss, in Mr. George F. Swann. and only a fortnight before his death he took part in a non-conducted peal of Stedman

They had had a very successful year. Practices had been well attended and Sunday ringtices had been well attended and Sunday ringing in the city was regular. Another feature was their lectures; two or three of their younger members had given lectures with excellent results. As a result of Mr. George Fearn's lecture at Tanworth-in-Arden, the bells there were being made into a ring of eight. At Yardley the ring of six was to be recast into a new ring of eight. At the Cathedral two additional trebles were added through the generosity of Mr. Frank B. Yates, and they were now a splendid 12.

During the year 80 peals were rung, but Mr. George Fearn was not satisfied; he rang another 28 on top of that! Three of their peals were outstanding. One was the non-conducted

other 28 on top of that! Three of their peals were outstanding. One was the non-conducted peal of Stedman Cinques, another was Lincolnshire Surprise Maximus at Walsall, rung without any previous practice, and the last the peal of Rutland Surprise Royal.

Another feature of the year was that they had changed their officers and they were loath to change. Mr. Reeves had given up the secretaryship and had been succeeded by Mr. George E. Fearn, who had been sentenced to 20 years's service straight away. Mr. Edgar Shepherd was the new Ringing Master in place of Mr. Fearn. He was a talented composer and conductor. Mr. J. F. Harvey had been appointed librarian in place of the late Mr. Swann.

Swann. Mr. George E. Fearn, who replied, expressed his pleasure at the splice of the two new trebles at the Cathedral. 'I am perfectly satisfied,' he said, 'and if I am satisfied it is a good job.' They all regretted that Mr. Yates was unable to be present through illness.

'PRINCE AMONG SECRETARIES.' Mr. Walker then made a presentation to Mr Mr. Walker then made a presentation to Mr. Reeves. In his long experience of the Guild they had had only three secretaries. The first was Mr. W. H. Godden, who resigned 40 years ago. In January, 1909, his friend, Mr. Paddon Smith, was elected secretary, and for 20 years he carried out his duties with the greatest efficiency. Mr. Reeves was appointed his successor, and the St. Martin's Guild nover did a better job of work when they appointed Mr. Reeves. He was a prince among secretaries—one any Guild might be proud of.

A Remedy?

Dear Sir,-There is another way of saving your space in addition to that mentioned by Mr. Cannon, and that is to refrain from publishing letters as pointless as his. We have, during the last nine or ten years, become accustomed to the rationing of most of our pleasures, but to suggest peal rationing seems to me quite ridiculous. Why 25 a year? Why not 10 or even one? How many unsuccessful attenute would be allow? attempts would be allow?

If Mr. Cannon had ever been attached to one tower for any length of time he would have realised that, on the whole, the more ringing that takes place in a tower the fewer the complaints. People become accustomed to consistent ringing, but an isolated peal at many towers provokes an absolute uproar. Perhaps Mr. Cannon can call to mind one such tower!

It is, of course, customary for ringers to criticise theoretical articles which they are unable to understand-and as far as the recent series on London Royal is concerned, Mr. Cannon has my sympathy—but he will probably admit that without such articles the Exercise would never have advanced far beyond the stage when the summit of a conductor's ambition was to call Holt's Original.

With regard to his suggestion that a vote be taken among peal ringers only before the style of peal reporting is changed, this is an insult to those readers who are not peal ringers, but have an equal right to express their views on matters concerning 'The Ringing World.'—
