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COLLABORATION

A WORD that gained a somewhat sinister meaning during the war—'Collaboration'—was taken by the Vicar of Bray (the Rev. E. C. S. Lomas) for his sermon, preached at the annual festival of the Oxford Diocesan Guild on Saturday. The true meaning of the word, he pointed out, was not only working together but holding together; not only contact but cohesion.

We do not desire to traverse his admirable argument of ringers being collaborators with the Church in its work, each in his or her respective sphere giving the best possible service, but rather to apply his thoughts on collaboration to the general dayto-day life of the Exercise.

In the past few months the Exercise has been passing through one of those periodic difficult phases that befall all organisations. It is a resurgence of an old theme—the creation of antagonism to the art of peal ringing. Indirect methods of approach have been employed, the chief among them being a neglect of Sunday service ringing on the part of peal ringers and general accusations of irreligious conduct on the part of ringers, so familiar with the Victorian idea of a ringer—a tradition that dies hard.

Typical of the campaign of disruption is the utilisation of other than the Ringing Press for soliciting the aid of the public. One of the leaders of English ringing, who this year has had the unique experience of shepherding some 170 ringers either through their first peal or first in a method, has been subjected to attacks on his peal-ringing proclivities. He is a man who has been honoured by the Church in a unique way, but he is very conscious that English ringing will not retain its pre-eminent position without the incentive of the peal.

What the Exercise has to combat is the attitude of mind that a ringer who performs regularly the same set call of 120 Grandsire Doubles on a Sunday morning and evening is doing all that is expected of him, either by his Guild or Church. The Rev. C. Elliot Wigg, Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild, was a member of a band of five who last year endeavoured to widen the conception of Doubles by a series of peals in country churches where they were visiting ringers. From 21 methods they increased the number to 42 by successive stages. They set an example to towers with a low number of bells.

The gulf between the peal ringer and the non-peal ringer has to be bridged. There must be true collaboration between the two. Generally speaking there is ever available for the keen young ringer a readiness to shepherd him through his first peal. In no sense are peal ringers an exclusive body; they are the backbone of most of the Guilds and Associations and are among the legislators of English ringing on the Central Council.

OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD FESTIVAL

'Non-Ringing Bob' Quoted in Sermon A Progressive Year Help from Bell RESTORATION FUND 199 NEW MEMBERS HONOUR FOR MR. F. SHARPE

IN true accord with the tradition of the past was the 68th annual festival of the Oxford Diocesan Guild held at Oxford last Saturday. The event was well supported, and the reports presented denoted a year, of progress with 199 new members, activities with bell restorations and the maintenance of advance in the matter of peal ringing.

Proceedings commenced with the Guild's service held at the Cathedral. Singing was led by a choir of ringers arranged by Mr. F. Sharpe. The Master (the Rev. C. Elliot Wigg) conducted the service and the address was given by the Rev. E. C. S. Lomas (Vicar of Bray) on the subject of collaboration. In church work, he pointed out, it was not the position they occupied but how they filled that position; it was not the work they did that position; it was not the work they did that counted.

The particular work prominent in their minds was the ringing of balls in their

God that counted.

The particular work prominent in their minds was the ringing of bells in their churches. Every man and woman, boy or irl, who was worthy of the name of ringer ad at heart the perfection of his or her work and a real endeavour for good striking. They were naturally anxious that the Exercise should be progressive and that there should bea sustained interest for all by means of change ringing. Their basic motive was a particular job of work for God, to do it faithfully and well. It was so important that they should keep in their minds the answer to the question, 'Why and for whom were they ringing?' they ringing?'
In his particular branch of the Guild they

were always sure of a very frank criticism of were always sure of a very trank criticism of their ringing at branch meetings or in at-tempts for a peal in the person of that well-known non-ringing member known as 'Non-Ringing Bob.' But in their regular service ringing there was One above Who knew whether they were endeavouring to do their job faithfully and well.

THE BUSINESS MEETING.

THE BUSINESS MEETING.

The business meeting was held in the Chapter House, the Rev. C. Elliot Wigg presiding, supported by Capt. A. R. Poyntz (Deputy Master), Mr. A. D. Barker (hon. treasurer), Mr. W. Hibbert (hon. secretary) and Miss M. R. Cross (hon. librarian).

Among the apologies were those of Mr. J. Wilkins, aged 87, of High Wycombe, and Canon G. F. Coleridge, aged 93, who was in Devonshire

Devonshire.

The Master's report stated that he was able to attend most of the branch annual meetings. He had inspected the bells and given advice at Ashbury, and was glad to hear that the work on these bells was shortly to be put

advice at Ashbury, and was glad to near that the work on these bells was shortly to be put in hand. A notable piece of augmentation was the addition of two trebles at Shrivenham, and a memorable occasion was the dedication of the recast tenor at East Ilsley, in memoriam R. T. Hibbert. The standard of ringing appeared to be have been well maintained during the year, and new records had been set up in the spheres of Spliced Surprise Major and Doubles ringing.

The secretary in his report wrote that the year had been most successful. The increase of the annual subscription to 2s. 6d. should not prove a hardship to any individual; it was a remarkably low subscription for the privileges and pleasures of Guild membership. The publication of a comprehensive report after 10 years of absence meant starting from scratch. Miss Cross had proved herself a real worker in checking branch reports and typing them to specification for the printers.

They had had a slight increase in the number of peals, and again the Guild was well

to the forefront of the Exercise. It was gratifying to notice the firsts in methods and conducting. He could not help mentioning the names of W. F. Judge, A. R. Pink and G. Gilbert, but he would like to congratulate the conductor of the peal of St. Clement's Triples, which competent conductors would admit was a first-class performance.

The treasurer's report stated that the general funds of the Guild amounted to £558 19s. 4d., of which £500 12s. 2d. was in the Restoration Fund. During the year £15 3s. was contribuated to the latter fund by Parochial Church Councils.

Mr. A. D. Cullum moved, and Mr. Corderoy seconded, the adoption of the reports.

OFFICERS RE-ELECTED

Acknowledging the fact that no other name had been put forward for the position of Master, the Rev. C. Elliot Wigg said he was always willing to make room for a worthy successor, although he had the interest of the Guild at heart.

RESTORATION FUND GRANTS.

The committee recommended a grant of £30 to Hook Norton. The Rev. E. H. Nind said the work would cost at least £2,000, and within 18 months they had raised over £1,300.

A similar grant was made to Burford after hearing a report from Mr. Nicholls. He said it was found that bells three and four would have to be recast, and this work was not anticipated.

Towards Lewknor bells the branch had voted four guineas. Mr. Badger reported that the cost was £150; the band was very keen and the condition left much to be desired.

and the condition left much to be desired. The sum of £10 was voted.

Mr. C. Corderoy, reporting on Blewbury bells, towards which the branch was contributing £5, said the ringers had promised to raise £50, and the work had been started. A contribution of £10 was agreed to.

Mr. A. R. Pink moved that unless a grant from the Restoration Fund was claimed within three years of being voted, it should become void and a fresh application made if a grant was still needed. He said it was the common policy of the Diocesan Board of Finance to cancel grants if they had not been applied for after three years.

The secretary seconded, and this was agreed to.

A notice of motion was submitted by Miss Cross, asking the committee to consider re-drafting a section of Rule 5 dealing with the position of resident ringing members leaving the district and subscriptions after the first complete year's subscription being considered as part payment of the life composition of a non-resident member. She said she would like to see a five years' time limit of membership imposed.

Mr. A. D. Barker seconded and the motion

was agreed to.

THE LATE MR. R. T. HIBBERT.

A recommendation of the general committee was submitted by Mr. A. D. Barker that a tablet be placed in East Hsley Church to record the recasting of the tenor bell in memory of R. T. Hibbert, any moneys remaining in the fund to be transferred to the general fund.

Mr. Barker said that the tablet which was

on view was cut by Mr. Lock.

Seconding, Mr. F. Sharpe commented: 'A very worthy memorial to a very worthy man.'

A GUILD BADGE.

Mr. T. J. Fowler said at the last committee meeting he suggested that the Guild should have a badge, and he was asked to submit a design. He obtained a design from the front page of 'The Ringing World,' which had been suitably engraved. The design had been seen by the officers of the Guild and his branch and they had approved of it. He had given an order for 200, and the die was being made. The cost of a badge or brooch was 2s. plus postage. It had a silver-oxydised finish.

The secretary thanked Mr. Fowler for his work and moved that the badge be accepted.

The Rev. Shelwood urged that there should be some qualification before a ringer should be allowed to purchase a badge—some degree

of proficiency.

Mr. Fowler said the same principle should apply to the issue of Guild certificates.

The Master stated that he would like to see

ringers have to earn their badges and certificates. It was eventually agreed that the issue of badges should be left to the discre-

The attention of the meeting was called to the fact that Mr. O. Francis had given 15 years' service as hon. auditor. The officers were empowered to make a suitable gift to

GUILD SERVICE.

The Rev. C. G. Seymour-Metford raised the question of the Guild's service, and said some of them felt they would like a change in the form of service. Something should be done to get it into a more liturgical form.

Mr. Cullum supported and thought it should be left in the hands of the minister. The matter was referred to the general committee.

MR. F. SHARPE.

A resolution was submitted from the Bicester Branch 'that in appreciation of the work done for the Guild in particular and ringing in general Mr. F. Sharpe be made a vice-presi-dent of the Guild.' The resolution was carried with acclamation.

The secretary reported that the Guild had made 199 new members during the year.

Their election was confirmed.

A letter from Mr. Alan Pink stated that it was proposed to make a 'Campanology Corner' in the 'Oxford Diocesan Gazette.' It was decided to ask branch secretaries to send items of interest to Mr. Pink.

APPEAL TO PAROCHIAL COUNCILS.

The Deputy Master said in 1942 an appeal was made to Church Councils to make an annual subscription of 2s. a bell in their tower to the Bell Rectoration Fund. The appeal was then very successful, but had of late decreased, only 15 parishes subscribing. The redrafting of the appeal was approved, the matter being left in the hands of Captain Powntz

A collection for the Bell Restoration Fund was taken and amounted to £6.

THE LUNCHEON

A company of 160 attended the luncheon in Christ Church Hall, at which the Master presided. The toast of 'The Visitors' was proposed by Mr. F. Sharpe and responded to by T. W. White, who proposed the health of 'The Oxford Diocesan Guild.' Ringing followed at various towers.

Dedication TANWORTH-IN-ARDEN.

For many years before the late war it was known that the six bells (tenor 12 cwt.) in the tower of the Parish Church of St. Mary Magdalene, Tanworth, were in need of attention, but it was not until the return of enthusiastic young ringers from the Forces that in 1947 it was decided to call for expert advice. was decided to call for expert advice. As a result the Whitechapel Foundry was invited to retune and rehang the bells, five of which had been cast in 1707 by Richard Sanders, of Broms-

been cast in 1707 by Richard Sanders, of Bromsgrove, and the tenor in 1733 by Joseph Smith, of Edgbaston.

When the bells were taken from the tower in January, 1949, it was possible to check old records stating that in 1552 there were 'nij belles a saunce bel' in the tower, for the original timber foundations of these were still in position under the later wooden framework, though much weathered and woomesten.

though much weathered and worm-eaten.
Our plans had to be modified when the
foundry reported the bells were too thin to
return satisfactorily, and as the cost of the
original estimate had already been found by private subscriptions a further appeal was launched, and the foundry was requested to recast all the bells and rehang them from iron headstocks on ball bearings in a new steel

On the suggestion of the captain of the Stratford-on-Avon band of ringers, we also asked for two pits for additional trebles to be included in the framework so that we might eventually complete the octave. Almost imme-diately following upon this we were offered the new bells as memorials to two former local residents, and by these generous gifts have been able to combine future with present plans. Within five months all this work had been completed, and local ringers and friends enjoyed a trip to London to watch some of the

be is recast on May 4th.

Some misgiving was felt at a break with tradition when we were advised that our ringing should be removed from the ground floor of the tower into the room above owing to the long draught making the new 4 cwt. trebles difficult to handle. However, we tackled this development in the same spirit with which we had met other problems (for with which we had met other problems (for example, the bricking up of the tower windows, the removal of a ceiling above the bell chamber and the lowering of the bell chamber floor, as advised in the Central Council's 'Hints'), so that, thanks to a donation from the St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birmingham, visiting ringers at the dedication service on July 9th were able to comment on the new neatly panelled walls and other furnishings of the converted junk-room, which inings of the converted junk-room, which included fluorescent lighting to give shadowless

illumination of the ropes.

The eight bells are now hung in two contrarotating lines of four swinging east and west and so roped that there is minimal thrust exerted against the tower, and we confidently feel that the whole effect gives us one of the neatest and nicest eights in Warwickshire.

At the dedication service by the Lord Bishop of Birmingham, tributes were paid to Messrs. Mears and Stainbank for the expeditious and thorough work carried out in under six months and to the captain of the local band, Mr. John H. Jones, who has been the prime mover of the efforts in Tanworth to raise the money required and to ensure that we attained all we set out to achieve.

Rounds were rung during the service by members of the local band, and the opening touch (504 Stedman Triples) after the service was rung by members of the St. Martin's Guild, to whose guidance and encouragement we owe so much. Over 60 ringers attended from Birmingham and the neighbouring dioceses, so Tanworth was regaled until after 8 o'clock with touches in all the standard methods. It is many a day since we had such a gathering in our small village, and in truth it was a day we and our friends will long remember with pleasure.

DEATH OF CANON F. B. MACNUTT

On July 17th the death occurred suddenly of Canon F. B. Macnutt, former Provost of Leicester Cathedral and Archdeacon of Leicester. He was formerly Vicar of St. Martin's Church, Leicester (now the Cathedral), from 1918 to 1938. It was owing to his great enthusiasm and untiring efforts that the bells at the Cathedral were increased from a ring of ten in 1937 to the present set of 13 bells. Later in the evening a half-muffled peal of Stedman Cinques was rung at the Leicester Cathedral.

By the size and sound of the bell this would seem to be and sound of the bell this would seem to be about right, although there are many bells of twice the weight which go much better. Perhaps the heavier weight quoted by Mr. Stote is a due allowance for the extensive activities of the pigeons! Hatfield tenor, a D bell, must be more than 17½ or 18 cwt. It is usually given as 26 cwt., which is probably about right, although a recent peal report gave it as 23 cwt.
