## RINGING TOURS

TRADITIONAL from the days of the late Rev. F. E. Robinson has been the arranging of ringing tours. Primarily organised for the enjoyment of the participants, these ringing holidays undoubtedly serve a useful form of propaganda. In a recent issue Mr. L. A. Wilson, of Wootton Bassett, told how his ambition was fired after a visit by the Rev. F. E. Robinson. It seemed absolutely outside his grasp to reach their standard, but he won through and rang peals with the mighty. There must be many others who have received similar encouragement.

This year the number of tours has been quite equal to previous years. Some have contained elements of missionary enterprise as in Yorkshire and Ireland. The latter tour, led by Mr. Harold J. Poole, limited peal ringing to not more than one a day, the evenings being spent in social engagements, at which local ringers frequently joined the party. Knowing the gift of Leicester ringers to stage a party that will appeal to ringers, we feel sure that their visit provided an encouraging fillip to Irish ringing.

What has impressed us is the way the local press has co-operated to feature some of these tours. When the Universities Association visited Tiverton, a five-column picture appeared in the 'Devon and Somerset News.' There are critics who regard ringers as having 'one-track' minds, and to read that the visitors included 'Doctors of Science and Literature,' M.A.'s and B.A.'s and students of the arts and sciences' is indeed refreshing. The ringing family embraces all classes who love bells and ringing. Inside the belfry there is a common denominator, the ability of the individual to strike his bell true and to be the master of the method. All other honours count as nought.

Many of the tourists are young people. Perhaps a striking example of youthful enterprise is the Society of Roving Ringers, who for three years have carried out an extensive programme on cycles, spending nights at youth hostels. Their programmes were designed not for peal ringing but the privilege of adding to their list of towers. It was interesting to observe that in their second week a 12-bell tower was visited each day. The experience gained was invaluable, and there is no question that each returned to his home tower with added knowledge of the art.

Some of this year's tours have a particularly meritorious list of peals. The finest list was that of Mr. J. E. Cawser's party, who toured Suffolk and Norfolk, ringing 20 Surprise peals in a week without a futile attempt. Their Somerset tour of last year is still fresh in mind. Conducting on this tour was shared by Dr. J. C. E. Simpson, Messrs. Leslie W. G. Morris, John Worth, John E. Bibby, C. Kenneth Lewis and J. Edward Cawser. Another higher method tour was that arranged by Mr. Philip A. Corby in Devon and Cornwall with eleven Surprise peals brought home.

It has invariably been the custom on ringing tour for peals to be credited to the Association or Guild in which the peals were rung. An exception to this unwritten rule was provided by the recent Leicestershire tour, when not one peal was rung for the Leicester Diocesan Guild. While our attention has not been drawn to what might be regarded as an act of discourtesy to the Guild in question, we feel certain that others have noted this departure from what is generally regarded as a fundamental principle when ringing in a Guild's territory, unless there are exceptional circumstances. No explanation has been given for the departure, but we hope in future that those organising tours will give dus acknowledgment to the area in which they ring.

#### IRISH TOUR LEICESTER RINGERS' MEMORABLE

#### A Cordial Welcome

FOR the first time in history a party of ringers from the Midlands have toured Southern Ireland. The tour was organised by Harold Poole and the party consisted mainly of members of the service band at Leicester Cathedral. Arrangements in Ireland were made by Fred E. Dukes, secretary of the Irish Association Association.

This was not the generally accepted peal tour of two or three peals each day. Only one peal each day had been arranged and sufficient time allowed for meeting and spend-ing some time socially with the local ringers.

Carter, Percy Carter, Redvers Elkington, Herrick Bowley, Harry Wayne, Alan Jacques, Tom Francis and Fredk. Dukes.

The advance party left Leicester for North Wales on August 25th and were met at Bangor by Vincent Childs. A peal of Lincolnshire Surprise Major was rung at St. David's Church, Glanadda, on Thursday

evening. On Friday morning we travelled over the Menai Bridge to Anglesey and rang at Beaumaris. We rang at Beaumaris. We met once again Albert Hughes and were glad to see he was making progress from his recent illness, sufficiently so to ring in courses of Bristol and London Survival. and London Surprise. He reminded the writer and Mrs. Poole of peals to-gether some 24 years ago, and upon reflection we all began to realise how 'time marched on.'

Vincent Childs verv kindly piloted us through to Holyhead, where we met the remainder of the party (except Tom Francis) in the queue for the customs shed.

FOG STOPS PEAL.

The half-way came up in grand style and the peal appeared to be well in the bag. A seasick sweepstake had been arranged—first casualty the winner—but the proceeds were still intact upon arrival 'yon' side. (Any person found with finear down his threat was

person found with fingers down his throat was liable to fine of one dollar.)

We were met by Fred Dukes at West Row Station, Dublin, and, believe it or not, all luggage for the whole party was loaded into or on to his little Ford 8 car. It was a very

happy Fred Dukes who greeted us with 'Welcome to Ireland—this is the day we have been awaiting.'

Saturday morning found us all at St.
Patrick's National Cathedral facing the Press
photographer in the belfry. We met here Pat
Murphy and other members of St. Patrick's
band. St. Patrick's dates back to the 13th
century. There was a ring of eight bells in
the tower (by Perdue with some recast by
Murphy, Dublin) since 1670. In 1897, 10 bells
(45 cwt.) were presented by Lord Iveagh and

Cherry, Ll.D., then Attorney-General (afterwards Lord Chief Justice of Ireland) and a ringer at St. Patrick's, presented two trebles and hung the semitone for ringing. In 1923 a further treble was added—the gift of Lady Seeds-Kaye in memory of her husband, the Queen's Advocate-

SWEATED LABOUR Now for the peal of Yorkshire Surprise Maximus — tenor 25 cwt., the heaviest yet tackled by the band. Sidney Cheney reported sick and was unable to ring. An application by him for the sweepstake prize was turned down. Tom Francis had not arrived by 920 a.m. and the substitutes, Kathleen Tilley and Mrs. H. J. Poole, had tried their ropes. 'All ready,' says Kath, when a banging on the belfry door in no uncertain manner announced the arrival of Tom Francis. His boat was 2 hours late. The peal was brought in 3 hours and 41 minutes, and as this was the first experience for several members of the band on bells over 25 cwt., some of the striking was not up to the usual Leicester standard. The tenorman had some sweated labour, but as he remarked afterwards, 'A good sweat in be-tween two good meals hurts nobody.' Whilst this peal was in progress the remainder of the party were taken on a sight-seeing tour of the city.

On Saturday afternoon we journeyed by train to Drogheda, where a meeting of the

Irish Association had been arranged. The ring of eight at St. Peter's Church is in need of urgent attention and our best wishes go out to the local ringers and others in the special effort they are making to get them done. To turn in the tenor was a herculean effort, but three of our boys did it, including the baby of the party—the youth from Wood'us. An excellent tea was provided by the local ringers and their ladies, and a great welcome to the visitors was extended on behalf of the Irish Association and the local company. Fred Dukes was presented with a silver plated tankard, suitably inscribed, by the tourists in appreciation of his efforts on their behalf.

On Sunday morning some rang at St. Patrick's Cathedral and others at Christ Church (Diocesan) Cathedral on the peal of ten—tenor 43 cwt. Stedman Caters and Cambridge Surprise Royal were rung.

In the afternoon a peal of Dublin Surprise Major was rung at St. George's Church, Dublin. These are a Mears eight, dated 1828, the gift of Francis Lebeston architect of Johnston, architect of this church (who was a practical ringer, having had a ring of bells in his own back garden), and his wife. The bells were re hung in 1928 by Taylors. After the peal the tourists were entertained to tea in the parochial hall by the local ringers. In the evening a visit to Bull Wall Dolymount, a few miles from Dublin, proved in-teresting, and some of the boys and girls enjoyed a swim. FINEST SCENERY.

Monday morning found us astir early, and the five members of the party who had been licensed to drive in Ireland collected the five cars which had been hired. The whole of the party was assembled and we left Dublin in convoy with all six cars duly labelled. We travelled via Kingstown, Dalkev and Killwav- Ireland's

Bay of Naples—and into Bray, where the bells of Christ Church were put to good use for about half an hour. When this church was completed the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone happened to be staying with the Earl of Neath nearby in the late 1870's and admired the tower and spire of this fine church. He expected to learn that there was a ring of bells there, and on learning to the a ring of beils there, and on learning to the contrary at once gave a cheque of £50 to start a fund for a ring of bells. The subscription list soon mounted up, which enabled Taylor's to put in a ring of eight bells (tenor 28 cw'.). They have been ringing ever since (1880) and dry rot has now necessitated a rehanging job for which a subscription list has been red. for which a subscription list has been opened. The bells are expected to be taken down

The finest scenery in Ireland was passed The linest scenery in Ireland was passed through on leaving Bray. The six cars went by the Rocky Valley, which is situated between Sugar Loaf and Douce Mountains, both the highest in the North Wicklow hills. Passing around Sugar Loaf, we passed through Roundwood, the site of the Dublin City water reservoirs. From here the scenery became entrancing with hills weeping down to the valleys. ing, with hills sweeping down to the valleys, forests on the hills and rivers rippling over (Continued on next page)

the rocks as they made their way down to the sea. We turned at Laragh, up to Glendalough, where the remains of the seven churches, St. Kirins Kitchen, the Ancient Cross and Round Tower were seen. Leaving Glendalough, we Tower were seen. Leaving Glendalough, we travelled by the Vale of Laragh and Vale of Cara to the Meeting of Waters, and saw Tom Cara to the Meeting of Warers, and saw form Moore's Tree, under which, tradition says, this famous poet sat when he wrote the 'Meeting of the Waters.' County Wicklow has every reason to claim the title of the 'Garden of Ireland.' We arrived in Arklow on time-for lunch.

A good peal of London Surprise Major was rung at St. Saviour's Church (tenor 22 cwt.), and was Fred Duke's first peal in the method. This peal was rung for the Leicester Diocesan This peal was rung for the Leicester Diocesan Guild and was the 50th anniversary of the first peal on the bells, which was rung by a band from Loughborough, Leics. The church was built by Lord Carysfort, who also presented the bells. During this peal other visitors went to the Arklow Pottery, which

proved to be very interesting. In the evening the whole party paid a visit to Beatrice, Countess of Wicklow's residence to see Titania's Palace. This is a model fairy queen's palace, the furnishings being in miniature, and was built by the Countess of Wicklow's first husband, Sir Neville Wilkinson. The miniature belfry contains a ring of 12 handbells by Mears, and tunes are played mechanically on them. Fred Dukes had his handbells with him and tunes and change ringing proved of great and tunes and change ringing proved of great interest to the Countess. The journey back to Arklow on the pot-hole pitted by-roads proved too much for 'Gaffer's' car. The exhaust pipe became detached and for safety had to be removed. It was in this capacity that Mechanic Wayne and Blacksmith Milner proved their worth

their worth.

## THE UNIVERSITIES ASSOCIATION

EXETER WEEK, AUGUST 12th-20th, 1949.

The Universities Association fifth summer ringing week was centred at Exeter (head-quarters, Thomas Hall), where early on Friday afternoon the company of nearly 40 started to arrive, representatives of nine universities: Bristol, Cambridge, Edinburgh, Liverpool, London. Nottingham, Oxford, Reading and Wales. Another Taylor eight of similar weight rewarded various Saturday morning exertions at St. Peter's, Tiverton, where we received a great welcome, complete with photographer and reporter. In the afternoon two peal attempts were made, successfully in three Minor methods at Ide, unsuccessfully at Alphington, where Cambridge Major was the method Non-pealers enjoyed the recently augmented eight (tenor 18 cwt.) at Exminster and the six at Kenn.

As is our custom, on Sunday we divided into two groups for service ringing: in the city at St. David's (8), St. Thomas' (8) and Heavitree, and further afield at Alphington and Newton St. Cyres (6). Of three quarterpeal attempts, only one came round, Double Norwich at Heavitree, this being greatly enjoyed, even if slightly hurried in 49 minutes to finish by service time. Our guest at supper was Preb. E. V. Cox, president of the Devonshire Guild, and a U.A. member, and for coffee afterwards we were joined by E. J. Taylor and A. Payne, from Tiverton.

#### THE HARDEST DAY.

Monday proved to be the hardest and longest day of the tour, especially for the cyclists, with a choice selection of Devon hills and lanes in reaching Dunsford and Cheriton Bishop, both sixes. Crediton was reached by lunch time (sandwiches and cider), and re-galed we climbed to the spacious ringing chamber of the Church of the Holy Cross for an hour on the glorious bells (tenor 27 cwt.). Two more eights followed at Thorverton and Silverton, the latter being quite musical, with 16 cwt. tenor of noticeable richness. 6.30 p.m., we were back at the Cathedral for the long-anticipated ring on these famous bells, tenored by 72½ cwt. 'Grandison.' The Thomas eight was rung up in peal, and when all was ready a well-struck bobbed course of Stedman Cinques was achieved, this bringing words of admiration from two members of the Cathedral band. Then followed Grandsire and Stedman Cinques, and three leads of Treble Twelve. The visitors' book duly signed, noting the names of the recent Cambridge Maximus peal hand (to which, incidentally, we heard several tributes paid), we descended to the nave with a feeling of having experienced an occasion which would not quickly fade from the memory. At 9.30 p.m. we embarked on a lecture, given by Mr. A. Yorke-Bramble, on 'Grid Analysis,' illustrated with over twenty carefully-prepared lantern slides. But for the lateness of he hour, an exciting discussion would have ensued.

Tuesday, by contrast, was easy, spent southwards towards Exmouth, first call being at Topsham (6), and second at Woodbury (8). At East Budleigh (6) we were met by enthusiastic Brian Pidgeon, who rang with us a course of London Minor, and told us of his keen local band. Before tea, we rang on the eight at Littleham, afterwards on the fine octave at Withycombe Raleigh (tenor 142 cwt.), and to complete the day's bag on the ix bells at Lympstone. In the evening the committee met, their deliberations coinciding exactly with a handbell peal tapped round in 115 minutes.

The next morning we attended a corporate Communion service at the Cathedral, and after breakfast divided up for peal attempts, Grandsire Caters being scored on the lovely ring of 10 at Cullompton (except for St. Anring of 10 at Cullompton (except for St. Andrew's, Plymouth, the only one still ringable in Devon) and Double Norwich at Clyst Honiton. Non-pealers were well entertained at Stoke Canon (6), where the Vicar, the Rev. H. W. Gardiner, provided refreshments, and on the beautiful bells of St. John-the-Baptist, Broadclyst, where Brigadier Penrose was equally hospitable. The afternoon towers were Clyst Hydon (6) and Braduinch (8), and, homeward hound a call was made at St. homeward bound, a call was made at St. Michael's, Pinhoe (6). Wednesday ended with a general meeting of the Association, at which it was agreed to accept an invitation to hold the 1950 week at Nottingham.

Thursday may justifiably claim to have been the peak day of the whole tour, when cars, motor bikes, tandems and cycles were forsaken, and all piled into a coach. First ring was at Chudleigh (8), then to Bovey Tracey (8), when, after a quick 'touch,' about a dozen of us were taken on to ring for the wedding of Philip Gray (London) and Joan Houldsworth (Oxford) at Wolborough Church '(8), the wedding 'touch' being spliced Lon-don and Oxford. ## OBITUARY OF THE WEEK

MR. W. R. MELVILLE.

Mr. William R. Melville, whose sudden death at Kingsworthy, near Winchester, on September 7th, at the age of 77 years, was recorded in our last issue, was one of those stalwarts who form the backbone of English ringing. The message of the bells was very real to him; it was part of his churchman-The message of the bells was very ship, and he brought a strong Christian character to bear in all he undertook.

Mr. Melville started ringing at Wooburn, Bucks, at the age of 14, where his father was also a ringer. For a number of years he was a stoney ringer, and it was not until the advent of 'The Ringing World,' when he was living at Tring, Herts, that he decided, at the age of 40, to take up change ringing.

In 1916 he moved to Guildford and joined the hand of Hely Tringty Church.

the band of Holy Trinity Church. Here, under the leadership of Mr. A. H. Pulling, and in the company of the rest of the band, he made progress and rang a number of peals, including many in Surprise methods. His longest peal was one of Guildford Surprise, 6,144 changes, on December 31st, 1930, at Holy Trinity, Guildford. In this tower he was steeplekeeper for a number of years, be-stowing a loving care on the bells and the ringing chamber. He also held the office of Ringing Master for the Guildford District.

In 1937 he retired from his employment at In 1937 he retired from his employment at Dennis Bros., and moved to Hampshire. Here he settled at Kingsworthy, near Winchester, and joined the band at Wonston. He rang frequently at Winchester Cathedral, and formed many new friendships, ringing more peals, many with Mr. George Williams.

The interment took place at Kingsworthy or Seattmeer 19th. In addition to his wife.

on September 12th. In addition to his wife, daughters, son-in-law and close relatives, there were a number of ringers present. These included Messrs. A. Goulding, H. T. Cook, R. Paine, G. MR. E. WILLIAMS.

He had rung only six peals of Doubles but his recruits to bellringing were many. He was in his 77th year.

MR. JAMES MORGAN.

Within the shadow of the tower where he first handled a bell, rang and called his first 720 of Minor and his first peal, James Morgan was laid to rest on September 7th, aged 80. In this parish of Pulford, which out towards the hills and mountains of Wales, he had lived all his life and had served the Eaton Estate as apprentice, joiner and later as clerk of works for well over sixty years. He began his ringing career in the 80's when the church, but a few years rebuilt,

possessed a light ring of six bells. Fired by his enthusiasm and with the encouragement and help of the schoolmaster, an energetic young band were soon ringing extents of Minor, and they scored their first peal of seven different callings of Bob Minor in December, 1887. This was followed on Christmas Day with a peal of Treble Bob.

In November, 1887, James Morgan was among those present in the Refectory of Chester Cathedral when the Diocesan Guild was formed and he rang his first peal for the

was formed, and he rang his first peal for the newly-formed Guild early the following year when he called 5,056 of Kent Major at St. Mary's, Handbridge. The succeeding years brought concentration on Minor ringing at Pulford, and he conducted a number of peals in a variety of methods. This was naturally followed by an interest in Major, and he regularly made the six-mile walk to Chester for practice. In later years he often spoke of these walks on pitch black nights with roads inches deep in mud, but his enthusiasm remained undaunted.

In 1903 the keenness of the Pulford ringers came to the notice of the Duke of Westminster, who showed his appreciation by presenting the church with two trebles. It was J. M. who made the frame, and it still stands as a fine piece of work for all to see. From that time onwards his peal book, kept with meticulous care, indicates the extent of his activities. Many methods from Maximus to Doubles are recorded in it, the compositions, many of which are his own, always noted. Many famous names in ringing are found in its pages, and the great variety of methods noints plainly to his ability and interest. Turning over the pages the eye is caught by a footnote beneath a peal of Bob Minor rung in December, 1937: 'The calling of this peal.' he writes, 'was the same as No. 1 rung 50 years ago.' The peal was arranged by way of celebration, and one other member of the original hand stood in the band, the late Mr. Walter Thomas.

MR. EDGAR WHITELEY.

The local company at Queensbury have suffered a sad loss through the sudden death, at the home of his nephew at Darlington, of their oldest member, Mr. Edger Whitelev. He was the last remaining link with the old six-bell tower.
