A-HUNTING WE WILL GO

THE lot of the expert, it has often been remarked by the humble commoner and doubtless deeply felt at all times by the expert himself, is not unreservedly happy. What views he puts before the public are more open to criticism than those of lesser lights; what work of investigation or compilation he is asked to undertake will, in its finished and published form, be scrutinised keenly by friend and foe, and woe to him, despite his long and weary labours, if he fails to justify what he postulates.

This has always been so, and indeed in past days, criticism was more fierce than it is today; and it was often more crude and relentless. Among the more cultured, nevertheless, it has always been considered good form to disagree in a gentlemanly fashion, to smite the adversary, even if relentlessly, at least with soft weapons: in short, to quarrel in a very agreeable manner. The following little controversial comedy, although leading to no neat climax or portentous conclusion, has a happy humour of its own.

At the end of the year 1903 the Central Council issued its first Collection of Peals, a comprehensive (if not consistently accurate) book of compositions in what were called 'Odd-Bell Treble-Dominated Methods.' It was 'Treble-Dominated' that started the fun, and the columns of 'The Bell News,' from the rising of the sun on January 4th, 1904, to the going down of the same on April 23rd, recorded a long, rather pedantic, but by no means uninteresting discussion.

First, Mr. Herbert Drake, writing to congratulate the Central Council, objected very strongly to 'Treble-Dominated' on the grounds that the treble did not dominate the method but was dominated by the places. This view was supported in the following week by that excellent but rather verbose scholar Mr. R. A. Daniell, who pointed out that 'Treble-Dominated' was ambiguous and might mean that the treble was dominated or that the treble did the dominating. Moreover, he said: 'The notion that the hunt is the dominating influence in a method is FLATLY CONTRARY TO THE TRUTH. . . . Wherefore, let us spew out of our mouths this false term.'

As may be imagined, this stirred the committee responsible for the book, and J. A. Trollope, bowing to the storm with mock humility, requested some suggestions for a better term, so that he might, as he said, be able to be critic in his turn. Mr. Daniell now began to hedge. He was only too conscious that his technical equipment was inadequate in any tussle with Trollope over methods, and

them. But now Mr. Herbert Drake had got himself prepared to be helpful. 'Treble-Dominated' he could not and would not accept, but as some term had to be found to distinguish between methods with a hunt and methods without a hunt, he suggested that perhaps the Exercise would take kindly to one of the following: uniform, iterated, monod, monomorphous, monometric, symmetric, rhythmic, sequential, and a few more simple, easily-comprehended expressions.

Mr. Daniell and Mr. Trollope tactfully ignored this scholarly exposition and returned to the simple problem of hunting for a name for the Hunt. Daniell held strongly to the view that places dominated the treble, and not the other way about. He brushed aside Mr. Trollope's reference to correspondence with Law James, deeming this a palpable red herring; and to his support he called Mr. Dains, who both as the author of Alliance and a building expert should, he considered, know something of foundations. So he wrote:

'If Mr. Trollope instructs Mr. Dains to build him a private dwelling house, and Mr. Dains does so, will he send in his bill in this form: To building you a foundation-dominated house . . . 2s. 6d., or whatever the price may be?'

At this stage the issue was somewhat clouded by an unfortunate remark by Mr. Drake, giving the impression that Grandsire should be called Compound and Stedman Simple. This wasted a certain amount of time, but eventually both sides began to be hopeful over the use of some such term as Huntful or Huntless. But now, at this point, Mr. Dains came down heavily. Mr. Trollope withdrew from the arena. Mr. Drake made an unobtrusive exit, and Mr. Dains and Mr. Daniell started to fight it out. They began with technicalities on the function and limitations of foundations in buildings, with reference to Gothic and Classic designs, and here the building expert showed authority. Mr. Daniell was undaunted, and he raised the question of the beginning of the construction of an opera house, a project abandoned at the foundation stage to result in the building of a new Metropolitan Police headquarters. Mr. Dains knew all about this, but spoilt the

fun by insisting on getting back to method building.

The editor of 'The Bell News' now suggested that the matter was closed, but Mr. Daniell had one more last word. On April 23rd he wrote: 'I agree with Mr. Dains that there is no necessity to make any statement about the dominating factor at all'; which will be seen to be both magnanimous and a worthy termination to a grand

Twelfth Annual Meeting at Repton

FOR the beginning of Repton's history one must go back to very early times, when the Saxons became converts to the Christian faith. It was for a time the ancient capital of the Saxon kingdom of Mercia. Most of the Repton Church, dedicated to St. Wystan, an early Christian martyr, was rebuilt about 1340, but the chancel of the old building was retained. Beneath this is a unique Saxon crypt that was discovered in the 18th century; a remarkable example of ancient Saxon work Just as Repton's ancient history is connected

with its church, so its modern history centres on the school, where the present Archbishop of Canterbury and his predecessor, Dr. Temple, were at one time headmasters. The Archway, Pears Hall and the School Chapel are very fine

Pears Hall and the School Chapel are very fine buildings of a more recent period.

It was at the beautiful Church of St. Wystan that the Guild held its 12th annual meeting, when upwards of 50 ringers and friends were present from a wide area during the afternoon or evening. The Vicar (the Rev. G. Harcombe) conducted Evensong and gave an inspiring address on the history of Repton bells.

An excellent tea followed in the Court Room, prepared by the lady ringers. Following tea, the annual business meeting was held at which the chairman, Mr. W. H. Curson (in the unavoidable absence of the president, the Ven H. E. FitzHerbert), presided.

FIRST PEAL FOR 45 YEARS AND FIFTH ON THE BELLS

There has been some discussion in Bristol as to which ring of eight is the roughest. Extensive comparison was made of a light eight tensive comparison was made of a light eight on the outskirts of the city with another weightier ring more centrally positioned. The outcome of this argument was not resolved, but the whole question was raised prior to a proposed peal attempt at St. Thomas', Bristol. The bells here have a tenor of 29 cwt., with a melodic note of D, and cast by Llewellin and James in 1894. The other bells are older and include some Bilbie products. All were hung in 1894 on a wooden frame and have had no attention from bellhangers since, with

had no attention from bellhangers since, with the exception of very necessary renewal of headstock bolts on the tenor bell in recent

At least two of the peal band were prepared to lay wagers that the peal would not be successful. In spite of the fact that these bells are not 'ladies' bells' by any means, and also that some doubts had been cast about necessales. Sary stamina involved, a peal of Grandsire Triples was rung. This was the first for 45 years, and the first with only one tenor finger. The secret of success was a mixture of two unpleasant substances. COLLEGE OF CAMPANOLOGY

LIVERPOOL PARISH CHURCH SAYS FAREWELL TO ITS RECTOR

When the Rev. Robert Nelson became Rector of Liverpool, in 1949, the foundation stone of the new Parish Church of Our Lady and St. Nicholas had been laid and there was a small but devoted congregation, but that was all. The old ring of 12 bells was still at the Loughborough foundry and there were no definite plans for its future. Last Saturday Father Nelson was consecrated Bishop Suffragan of Middleton (in the diocese of Manchester) in

During the past eight years Father Nelson has seen a new church completed and consecrated, and has built up a large and flourishsecrated, and has built up a large and flourishing congregation. Also, as most ringers will know, the old bells have been recast into a magnificent ring of 12. Much of Father Nelson's incumbency has been overshadowed by financial worries over the rebuilding; indeed, at one time the parish was in debt to the tune of nearly £20,000. If, therefore, the financial position had not happened to look relatively hopeful in 1951, the order to recast the bells might not then have been given. In this case the bells certainly would have been one of the luxury items which were cut out a year later when things looked black, and all unnecessary expenditure was being eliminated. However, by then the bells were safely in the tower. Through all this anxious period of the rebuilding, Father Nelson was most sympathetic. tower. Through all this anxious period of the rebuilding, Father Nelson was most sympathetic to the idea of having bells, and this was at a time when he knew nothing about ringing or ringers. His elder son, John, has become a valued member of the band and has about a dozen peals to his credit.

The peal of London Surprise at Maulden on December 30th was the 100th peal on the bells, and thus this tower becomes the first in Bedfordshire to achieve that total.

The first peal on the bells was one of Minor in seven methods, on September 28th, 1912, and then follows a long silence until 1936, when, as the outcome of a chance visit Eddie Jeffries paid to the tower, the local band were persuaded to try their hand at method ringing (call change ringing having hitherto been the order of the day) and a peal of Bob Minor was their first success, on April 22nd of that

From then until the war, activity was vigorous, 14 peals being rung before the ban, all multi-method Minor peals, one in 12 methods being a record for the county. After a height.

After a brief silence the tower was re-opened with its eight bells, and then follows a spate of remarkable activity, no less than 54 spate of remarkable activity, no less than 54 peals on the eight and two on the six having been rung since November, 1950. This tower was clearly marked out for the headquarters of the Surprise Major band, built up over the last three years to London Surprise standard through the unflagging efforts and ability of Eddia Leffries and beging two of the most Eddie Jeffries, and having two of the most constant performers, Andrew Sinfield and Ron Sharp, living on the spot, besides holding an almost central position in the county. new Surprise methods have been rung here for the first time in the county. In all, 20 dif-

ferent Surprise Major methods have been rung to peals in the tower.

Among the conducters, Eddie Jeffries holds pride of place, with a total of no less than 46 peals. Others connected with the tower in that capacity include Lewis H. Bywaters, and, of course, C. Henry Harding, a much-loved figure whose early pioneer efforts contributed. figure whose early pioneer efforts contributed so much to the prosperous state of peal ring-ing in Bedfordshire at the present day. Coning in Bedfordshire at the present day. Conductors of the younger generation include Dennis Knox, also the writer, who is very proud of his association with Maulden tower, and fully realises the debt of younger ringers in Bedfordshire to those who laid such firm foundations. Perhaps he may here be allowed to register his gratitude to Eddie, Ron and Andrew, in particular, for the opportunities he has been given, and to make mention of Maurice Lockey and the rest of the Sunday service band, the most gratifying feature of the tower, and of memories of pleasant social occasions with them. The peat of London was a fitting landmark, and we shall all remember the immaculate beauty of the closing courses for a long time. Long may Maulden tower enjoy prosperity.

PEAL PUBLICITY

Dear Sir,-Your excellent article in 'The Ringing Ringing World' on the relation between peal and Sunday service ringing prompts me

peat and Sunday service iniging prompts to follow it up with two pertinent thoughts about peal ringing generally.

Is it the policy in any of our Associations, or do individuals for that matter, when fixing the Vicar if he will up a peal attempt, ask the Vicar if he will announce the fact in church prior to the attempt? As ringers we have a duty to the public, and if the facts are faced, few people living near the tower enjoy the prospect of a three-hour peal, however good the striking. Even a crack band who ring, shall we say, a peal of Spliced Surprise on an unmusical eight will never convince nearby residents that their achievement renders complaints unjustified. When no warning of a peal is given, people who might have made some other arrangements endure it with an ill grace, and their attitude towards ringers generally becomes soured. These people are bad ambassadors, who can

do us much harm, because they carry this attitude with them into their own circles for which they can hardly be blamed.

However, if an attempt is publicised, those who dislike bells can go out anyway, but those who can't, instead of complaining to the Viscon chaut the salighness of people viscon. those who can't, instead of complaining to the Vicar about the selfishness of people ring-ing for their own gratification, might thank him and for his thought in advertising the attempt, and

tolerate it without ill will.

Secondly, how often do tower captains ask the Vicar to publish details of peals and quarter peals in the parish magazine in detail? How many lay people know of the existence of a Central Council or of the Diocesan Associations? I am convinced that this sort of publicity would not only open the eyes of lay churchmen to the part played by ringers in the church, but it would show how we are united as a network of Associations under a Central Council whose declared aim is the promotion of Sunday service ringing, and not just a race apart from other church workers.

Finally, if our achievements are put in print for all to see, isn't it possible that some readers would be curious enough to inquire further into the art, and thus present the tower with a potential recruit? The tower captain today is often heard to blame the lack of recruits as a reason for many silent towers. These suggestions might help a little in finding

a solution.

SUNDAY SERVICE RINGING

Dear Sir,-I am afraid I cannot agree with the front page statement on January 10th, which says 'Spliced ringing is not service ringing.' Up till a few months ago we were ringing Spliced Surprise Major regularly twice on Sundays until we tired of it, so have now given it a rest.

As we have a young band, only two of us ring our 20 cwt. tenor, but apart from that we take any bell, and we have four conductors, and I give a nod to one of these whilst rounds are being rung so no one knows the method beforehand. It may be anything from Bob Triples to London. By this practice one must know the starts of every method in our repertoire, and knowing your place bell at the lead-end is all that is required to ring spliced, and to further assist every lead-end is based on Bob Major.

All our ringers live within walking distance

of the tower and six of our best team were taught here, so we are a real local band. I suppose someone will say, 'What about their striking?' To this I can only answer that we treat this as of foremost importance, but teenagers and, in fact, some of the older ones suffer with nerves when critics, etc., are in the tower.

To say that not half a dozen towers in the country ring Spliced Surprise for service is, to my mind, a conflicting statement, and the purpose behind this letter is to find out the real state of the Exercise because, I suspect, many more than half a dozen.—Yours sin-

GAINSBOROUGH SURPRISE MAJOR

Dear Sir,-In reply to Mr. Arthur Pearson's Dear Sir.—In reply to Mr. Arthur Pearson's query which appeared on page 27 of 'The Ringing World' of January 10th regarding the composition of the peal of Gainsborough Surprise Major, which I conducted at Sherfield English last December, I can assure him that it was Arthur Craven's 3-part 5,088 frequently called to Yorkshire, and less frequently to Pudsey.

My initial information on Gainsborough

My initial information on Gainsborough, which I obtained from one of our leading young composers, led me to believe that any Yorkshire composition was suitable for this method, i.e., that only one false course-end method, i.e., that only one false course-end applied (24365) and I pursued the point no further until reading Mr. Pearson's letter. However, since this cast some doubt on the validity of my initial information on Gainsborough, I requested a member of the Methods borough. I requested a member of the Methods Committee to work out the false course-ends, after giving him the method's places, viz., x 38 x 14 x 58 x 16 x 14 x 58 x 1236 x 7. The reply to my inquiry was that the only false course-end is 24365, thus confirming the fact that any Yorkshire composition is suitable.

Since the figures for Gainsborough were not published in 'The Ringing World' when the method was first rung, would someone please identify the above method, which was that rung at Sherfield English? If it is, in fact, Gainsborough, I fancy Mr. Pearson is 'barking up the wrong tree.' If it is not Gainsborough the band concerned will have another method to add to their collection.—Yours faithfully.

SYSTEMATIC COMPOSITION

Sir,—The letter by D. R. Carlisle on November 29th last should have been answered by someone in an official capacity. A definite charge is made that information is being withcharge is made that information is being with held, and then the suggestion is made that 'The Ringing World' should supply this in-formation in the form of articles. A few years ago the Editor laid it down that 'The Ringing World' is not a text book, but is primarily a ringer's newspaper. This does not exclude technical articles occasionally, but text books have nearly always been efforts by priyate inhave nearly always been efforts by private individuals. I am afraid D. R. C. does not know of the bitter wrangles about composition in the old 'Bell News' and in 'The Ringing World' up to about 1935. You could say that almost all of the composers of that period gained their knowledge from the study of Treble Bob (Part Ore). As a rule this knowledge was not shared with anyone else, any system which these composers discovered they kept to themselves.

The late Mr. G. Lindoff invented a cardboard cylinder for producing 5,056 of London on the In and 5ths plan. It was in the possession of Mr. E. Jennings, who now lives in Essex. A fair question to D. R. C. would be, 'Who is going to write the articles he suggests?' He mentions two successful composers, but they are not in any way compelled to give away the knowledge they have gained to give away the knowledge they have gained by their own efforts. So, in conclusion, I think Mr. Carlisle is on the wrong track by demanding that the Central Council should publish highly technical articles in 'The Ringing World.' The stringing of courses together, as he puts it, is, therefore, an individual matter. I hope he will be successful in producing peals, though I am afraid that methods like Superlative have been almost worked out. I have in my possession a 5,952 by A. Knights that is capable of 21 variations.—Yours truly, E. R. MARTIN.
