NEW RECRUITS

IT was about nine weeks ago that Fred Snowball was called up for National Service in the Army. He was rather disappointed, as he was getting on so well at learning to conduct Doubles at his home tower, and then having to leave knowing full well that he would be unable to do much ringing during the next few months. There was one consolation that maintained his interest; he loved to prick out changes on paper and invent new methods without worrying whether they were false or not, and this could be done anywhere.

He did it sitting on his bed in the Barrack Room during the evenings and there were about twenty of his comrades milling around all the time. They all seemed interested in what he was doing, but that was about all and went away thinking that he was a bit of a 'crank.' He did not say, however, that it was anything to do with bell ringing, but just said that he was playing around with figures and seeing how many combinations he could get out of a certain number of figures. There was one person who seemed more interested in it than the rest. He was Claude Dumas.

Claude asked him to explain what he was doing, so that evening Fred showed him how one got all the combinations of four numbers and then went on to explain the variations. The inevitable question had to be asked some time: How did you learn all this and what has it got to do with?

Fred had to start his explaining all over again, but this time on the art of campanology and the connection which it had with permutations. Claude became more interested in the subject and he even asked if he could take up the art, but it was explained to him that he had better leave it until he was demobbed as he would be shifted from one place to another and so pass through too many instructors to be of any use.

This put the damper on him a bit as he did not like the thought of having to wait nearly two years before being let into a belfry. An opportune moment was when Fred received his new set of handbells from the founders. Claude could be taught to ring them without having to worry about bell management and bell control. There was one drawback, however. Would they be posted together at the end of their training and so continue in the good work? This they could do nothing about, but, nevertheless, they started ringing Minimus and soon were able to ring all the methods that were printed in a past issue of 'The Ringing World.'

The time came all too soon when their training was at an end and they were to be posted. All their company were paraded and the postings were read out. Claude, being near the beginning in the alphabet, was read out first and was told that he was going to Hong Kong. His heart sank. All the other names were read out and practically every place in the world was mentioned, and then it came. Claude could not believe his ears at first, but yes — Fred Snowball had been given the same posting.

The next few days passed very quickly and they soon found themselves in Hong Kong with, of course, their beloved handbells. They realised that they would have to find a third person before they could do any serious ringing, and as luck would have it they found John Peters, who had done a little change ringing, but knew no methods at all, as he came from Devon.

John was asked if he would like to take up handbell ringing and of course he accepted with glee. The three of them quickly got down to some serious practising and were soon able to ring plain courses of Bob Doubles. Now that Fred had taught the other two to ring the plain courses from scratch he now had to teach himself to conduct, and with the little experience he had before he was called up he soon had the other two ringing the full extent. To get them ringing Minor was quite easy and they found no real difficulty except for Fred, who had to learn the new callings and the different ways to get the various extents.

One day Claude had nothing much to do so he started pricking the changes of Bob Minor and, experimenting with them, found that he could reverse the method. Also he found that he could put the two methods together and still come out at rounds after the five leads. He showed his discovery to Fred, who was extremely pleased with what he had done and pointed out to him that these were recognised methods.

At the next practice night they had a go at these two new methods. They found it difficult at first, but they were soon ringing short touches. At the end of one of these practices Fred brought up the subject of ringing a peal in the methods. They were a bit taken aback at the idea of it at first, but they thought that they would be able to do it if they could get used to ringing for long periods at a time.

A few months later there appeared in the peal columns of 'The Ringing World' a peal of Minor 'in hand' in three methods and it had the following footnotes:—

First peal 'in hand' for all the band;

First peal as conductor.

The ringer of 1-2 (i.e., Claude) has never rung a tower bell and the ringer of 2-3 (John) has never rung methods on tower bells. Believed to be the first peal in Hong Kong, China.

Their next peal was in the middle of the Indian Ocean during their voyage home and this had the peculiar footnote as being rung while travelling between Longtitude 70° and 80° East along the Equator.

Mr. J. T. Dyke's Retirement

SERVICE RINGING IN LEICESTERSHIRE

Dear Sir,-May I be allowed to comment on a statement from the front page of the 'R.W.'
by M. R. P., of December 6th, who writes:
'I do not know if all bells in Leicester are rung
Sunday by Sunday, but one church can manage
Surprise Maximus for service.'

The answer to the first part is, of course, write to you, sir and claim to have kept all their bells ringing for every Sunday service over a period of years? I do know that for four years after the war, the eight bells at Barwell were rung twice every Sunday and for practice. It was to the credit of the local band that not once were there insufficient ringers to ring the full peal.

What a church can manage to ring and what in fact it does ring regularly is very much a question of attendance in a great many cases, and it is true that a good number of towers suffer the handicap of 'hangers on 'who attend when it is convenient to themselves, and feel that they are performing a great favour when the spirit moves them so to do.

How many times have I been to churches for a ring to be told that 'if they all came we could ring a touch of so and so,' and usually end up by ringing half the bells or none at all. That is why Guild reports are always mislead ing. The number of ringers shown as attached to towers very rarely gives a true state of the ringing actually accomplished. Several weeks ago I went to one church in the hope of having a ring before the service. There was, in the a ring before the service. There was, in the tower, a ring of eight. There were on paper 14 Guild members. We chimed six, and there were three other ringers, all choristers. It is all very distressing to hear Grandsire Doubles being rung from a 12-bell tower on Christmas Day for Mattins. I do not wish to imply that the method was less worthy for the occasion than Maximus—it was very well struck—but what I do suggest is that Leicester ringers would be the last to claim that they were on top of the world as far as Sunday service ringing is concerned. To believe so would create a further sense of apathy to a problem which is the concern of all conscientious tower captains and regular ringers, not only in this county but in every Guild and Association throughout the land.—Yours faithfully,

SPEED OF RINGING

Dear Sir,—In answer to Mr. N. F. Moxon's comment on the recent peal at Merstham in 2 hours and 33 minutes, I would mention that I rang another neal there in May 1054 I rang another peal there in May, 1954, in 2 hours and 34 minutes. The tenor measures 43½ inches in diameter so is probably very close to 14 cwt. In each case I had the same 5th ringer, Mr. Ralph Bird. Several times I have rung this weight of tenor in under 2 hours of minutes, and the main qualifications are fitness and a liking for hard work. In fact, I find it difficult to ring anything under 16 cwt. in over 2 hours and 45 minutes.

and when ringing at various six-bell towers amusually surprised that a peal by another band has taken longer than 2 hours and 50 minutes. In all cases we keep an open lead, but the faster six bells are rung the better they sound; 32-33 changes per minute is the speed of the Devon call-change competition ringing. Most of the fast peals of mine have been rung on bells hung in the 'old style' in wooden frames. With modern bells, hung in metal frames, and with the tenor well 'tucked up,' a fast peal is not so easy,—Yours faithfully,

6-5 AT BACKSTROKE

Dear Sir,-I doubt whether either Mr. Chant or Mr. Moxon have expressed an unbiased opinion on 6-5's at backstroke in Minor ringing. The latter seems to be concerned mainly or only with closed-lead ringing in his letter (page 63), where the objection to 6-5's at backstroke obviously does not arise. I cannot understand later that the 5th should give plenty of room to the tenor. If there is to be a 6-5 whether at hand or at back then the tenor strikes in at hand of at back, then the tenor strikes in 5ths and the 5th in 6th's place. The phrase 'plenty of room' implies striking the 5th in 6th or 6th's place. Is that what Mr. Moxon wants? If so, then he is bringing another factor into the argument, that of the interval between bells in 5th's and 6th's place, whereas the factor and other expensity of the 6.5th at Mr. Chant and other exponents of the 6-5's at backstroke theory argue only from the point of view of order of notes.

The argument put forward by Mr. Chant,

some hymn tunes and chants finish the half-verse with a 6-5 cadence, is hardly valid when applied to ringing. It would be all right we rang changes in groups of eight, say, and had our 6-5 at the end of the fourth change. But since most of using changes in twos and then have a name the only place for the 6-5 using his analogy, is at the end of the first change, that is, at handstroke. Let him listen to some really well-struck Minor (open leads, of course) runs at a brisk rate, and then say whether he honestly likes a 5-6 at handstroke followed by a 6-5 at backstroke.

Further, would anyone care to say what the incidence of 6-5's at backstroke in 720's of irregular (pace Chant) Minor methods is compared with regular ones.—Yours faithfully, WILFRID F. MORETON.

P.S.—To come to Mr. Cannon's aid. Mr. Moxon's argument that to ring seven blows every two seconds would sound awful is hardly acceptable. It would mean that to ring a peal of Major on a 14 cwt. tenor in 3 hours and 20 minutes is too fast. Most ringers would say that a suitable time for a peal on that weight is 2 hours and 50 minutes to 3 hours, and at that speed there would be approximately eight bells struck every two seconds (but there would be no 8-7's at backstroke). Speed of ringing depends partly on the sound of the bells (inside and outside the tower) and partly on the ability of the ringers to put the bells where they want to (and this depends on skill. where they want to (and this depends on skill, 'go' of the bells, draught of rope and, no doubt, pendulic swing) and partly on the whim of the conductor. I think that in some peals a lot of time is wasted through waiting or 'hanging up' for someone else who is slow.

OBITUARY

MR. CHARLES J. CANNS

By the death of Mr. Charles J. Canns at his home at Upton-on-Severn on January 21st, the Morcestershire Association has lost one of its stalwarts and one of its most esteemed officers. More particularly is this loss applicable to his home tower; for nearly half a century the name of Canns has been synonymous with that of Upton. Aged 67, his ringing activities had been somewhat restricted since an illness two years ago, but he was in the tower. illness two years ago, but he was in the tower on Christmas morning, although having to give up and rest after two very short touches. The news of his death came as a shock, his last illness only lasting two days.

news of his death came as a shock, his last illness only lasting two days.

By trade a blacksmith and agricultural engineer, he had served the district—first with his father—for over 55 years. He was well known for his great skill and was of that type of country craftsman now, alas, becoming increasingly rare; the type who loved the craftsmanship and workmanship first, with the commercial angle a secondary consideration.

Of fine physique, he was never afraid to use his strength, and until later years was never happier than when on the tenor box; there were very few bells that he would not tackle. He rang his first peal some 47 years ago, and his 600th—and last—in March, 1955, both at his home tower. His peals run through the whole range, from Grandsire Doubles, numerous Minor methods, Spliced Surprise Major to Cinques and Maximus; 560 of these had been rung for the Worcestershire Association, of which he had conducted 187.

But it will not be for his peals that Charlie will best be remembered. Since 1929 he had been Ringing Master of the Western Branch, and it had been his ambition to complete 30 years in this office—unhappily not fulfilled. In that time no one could attempt to estimate the

and it had been his ambition to complete 30 years in this office—unhappily not fulfilled. In that time no one could attempt to estimate the time he gave and miles travelled in teaching and helping struggling and isolated bands. Indeed a large proportion of his peals were Grandstre Doubles, Triples and Plain Bob arranged for the same object. And at Branch meetings, too, his first duties were to the learners, while at his own tower he held and maintained a band by virtue of his own inimitable personality. He leaves a legacy which should be an inspiration to those who follow. As a committee man, he never aspired to

As a committee man, he never aspired to debate, but he had a shrewd assessment of any problems, and his remarks were always forthright and very much to the point.

A large congregation, representative of all walks of life in Upton and the district, were present at the funeral on January 24th. Over 40 ringers from the district lined the entrance to the church. Handbells were rung over the open grave and the tower bells rung muffled after the service. He is survived by one sister, with whom he lived, and to her goes our sympathy.

MR. GEORGE W. MOSS

We are sorry to report the death of Mr. George Moss, at the age of 77. He was a life member of the Essex Association, and with his warm and genial nature he must have made scores of friends in all parts of Suffolk and

Other highlights in his ringing career were a peal of Forward Royal at Chesterfield, in 1909, when his two brothers, Jesse and Harry, also took part, and a 7,238 of Oxford Treble Bob Major at North Wingfield, in 1906, when Arthur Knights, the composer and conductor, gave no forewarning that the peal was to be of an abnormal length. On November 22nd, 1905, George rang the ninth to a peal of 5,003 Grandsire Caters, to which he appended the following footnote: 'This peal was rung for the silver wedding of Mr. A. Knights, and will long remain in my memory, having to walk home from Chesterfield after ten o'clock at night, a distance of eight miles, in a drenching rainstorm.'

For 35 years he was a member of the Mistley band, where he rang many peals of Minor, some of them being conducted by his son, Stanley. His last peal was at Ardleigh, in 1954, rung in memory of a previous peal he had rung there exactly 50 years before in 1904 years before, in 1904.

In all he rang 175 peals, of which eight were on handbells, 52 were in Surprise methods, and he conducted 13. He used to say he was steeped in London, and if ever he needed a cure for insomnia he would say a course of London to himself and after a couple of leads he would be asleep.

In his retirement he took every opportunity to visit any tower in Essex or Suffolk where there happened to be a meeting, and he must have made many new friends in this way. He appreciated the social side and he often referred to the brotherhood of ringers. Once when en route to a meeting we passed a crowd coming out from a football match, he said: 'Look at all those poor fellows, most probably every one is a non-ringer!' every one is a non-ringer!

When in 1948 a new band was learning at Great Bromley he regularly cycled over once a week to instruct them, and he was a con-

a week to instruct them, and he was a consistent attendant at practice nights at St. Peter's, Colchester, and at Ardleigh. At all these places he will be sadly missed.

At the funeral many local ringers were present, and handbells were rung over the grave by A. Honeywood, E. P. Duffield and N. Foakes. After the service the Mistley bells were rung half-muffled, and on the previous Saturday a quarter peal was rung at Great Bromley, conducted by H. J. Millatt, Master of the N.E. Division of the Essex Association. A quarter peal of Bob Major was also rung half-muffled at Ardleigh on the day following the funeral.

He was deeply respected and was always very kind and helpful and a good one to take advice from. Arthur Young was a truly great six-bell ringer who not only took part in record peals of Surprise on the bells of his own beautiful church but also, before World War II., participated in many record peals of Minor in those great days of battle betwixt the rival bands of the Eastern Branch of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild and Cheshire some 20 years ago.

Moreover it was therein that Arthur Young showed his capacity as a ringer, and his courage and tenacity as a man, since not only was he seldom at fault when disaster befell was he seldom at fault when disaster beteil peal attempts, but also, as a result of grievous injuries received in World War I., he had one entirely artificial leg, which none the less did not prevent his cycling 10 or 15 miles each way for a peal attempt, foul weather or fine. Furthermore, he often suffered, uncomplainingly, too, bouts of ill-health, yet seldom did he miss his Sunday service, practice or peal ringing, all of which he undoubtedly loved. Quiet and retiring by nature, he was the friend of all and we who knew him well will always of all and we who knew him well will always treasure his memory and think of him with affection.
