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IN EAST ANGLIA

WITH memories of the last Central Council held at Chelmsford, it is not unnatural that the 1957 annual report for the Essex Association should be of more than ordinary interest. All present will agree that Essex ringers were most hospitable hosts, and the visit cost the Association some £55. While not a wealthy Association, Essex started 1958 with a balance of £222. Two people are singled out for special praise in connection with the visit—Mr. A. H. Everett, who was mainly in charge of accommodation, and Miss Hilda G. Snowden, who arranged all the ringing. Nevertheless, we feel we should be neglectful if we did not add two names—Mr. Robert C. Heazel, the Master, and Mr. F. V. Gant, the hon. secretary and treasurer. 'This is only part of our duty as members of the Council and the great fellowship to which we belong,' concludes the paragraph in the report dealing with the visit. We can only add that it was duty well done.

The Essex Association has an ambition—to reach 1,000 ringing members; with 915 they are 'tantalisingly close,' and they would have been nearer but for two towers in the North Western District—Newport and Wenden—having dropped their membership. The Association is fortunate in having 220 honorary members. An interesting suggestion has been made regarding the Association's library, that towers might like to be responsible for the binding of old reports, generally in units of five, and to dedicate the binding to an old respected member who had 'passed on.' The same could also apply to copies of 'The Ringing World' which are purchased for the library.

The year 1957 was a vintage one for peal ringing, with 122 peals against 72 in 1956. In these peals 238 members took part, 16 scoring their first peal and 312 rang their first peal in the method. The conducting was shared by 40 members, with J. E. G. Roast leading the list with 17 and F. B. Lufkin—who during the year rang his 400th peal and 250th for the Association—with 16. The Association also established a record length of Minor of 18,000 changes in 25 methods rung at Stisted.

While smaller in membership than the Essex Association, the Suffolk Guild had a record year for peal ringing in 1957, with a splendid total of 135 rung in 63 different

towers. Over 200 members took part in these peals, and although rung on all numbers of bells, no peal of Cinques was recorded. Mr. Sedgley retired from the office of Ringing Master, a post he had held since 1923, and in recognition of his long service had been elected a vice-president. His successor, Mr. Leslie G. Brett, is the popular Framsdén conductor.

The Suffolk Guild have an officer not generally met with in these reports—a technical adviser. The holder of the office, Mr. R. W. M. Clouston, has already reported on the bells in 113 of the 500 Suffolk towers. The results, he writes, so far indicate the very poor state of many bell-fries, and in a number of towers containing up to four bells most unsafe conditions. Far too high a proportion of the bells are unsafely clocked due to decayed and insecure fittings. Mr. Clouston expresses his great disappointment that an order had not yet been placed to have the eight bells of St. Margaret's, Ipswich, overhauled. With the 12 at St. Mary-le-Tower in poor order, ringing in Ipswich, he writes, cannot be expected to flourish under present conditions.

Financially, the Suffolk Guild has assets of £177 16s., of which £40 is in the Restoration Fund. From this fund grants of £49 were made during the year. The annual report costs £52 10s. to print, against which peal fees amounted to £21 11s. A Guild badge was introduced during the year, and of a stock of 328 no less than 124 have been sold. The whole report indicates a very friendly atmosphere in Suffolk, with a resolve to make 1958 an even better year than 1957.

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KENT JUST MAINTAINS ITS THOUSAND RINGERS



IN spite of the cold weather, some 180 members and friends of the Kent County Association met this year at Ashford for their annual meeting on Easter Monday.

The officers met for preliminary business at 11 a.m. They enjoyed coffee, but not the company of the secretary, as he was unavoidably detained owing to an accident to the coach bringing the Maidstone District party. However, he arrived in time to give out the annual reports.

The service at noon in the Parish Church was conducted by the Rev. T. G. Williams, Rector of Willesborough. His address, appropriate to Easter, was much appreciated by the large congregation. The lesson (Colossians iii., 1-11) was read by Mr. J. Willis, of Folkestone, and Mr. G. N. Butcher was at the organ.

Lunch was held at the Ashford School for Girls. Afterwards letters of apology were read from the Archbishop of Canterbury (president of the Association), the Bishop of Dover, a vice-president, Miss Lilian Brake, O.B.E., one-time ringer and former headmistress of the school, and the chairman of the Ashford Urban District Council, who all regretted they were unable to attend as guests. The Rev. H. O. Albin, Vicar of Bethersden, speaking on behalf of the guests, thanked the Association for their hospitality, and said he would try to learn to ring. The Rev. T. G. Williams also spoke, but made no rash promises.

Mr. Willis presided over the business meeting with his usual good-humoured efficiency. The minutes, the secretary's report and the treasurer's report, which had been previously circulated, were taken as read and adopted. The auditor's report was read by the treasurer (Mr. B. W. May), who added that he was much happier about the state of the Association's finances this year.

24 FIRST PEALS

The peal secretary (Mr. T. Cullingworth) reported that 154 peals were rung during 1957, an increase of 38 over the previous year. Twenty-four members rang their first peal. There were 38 conductors (including 13 non-resident conductors who called 43 peals) and two 'first as conductor'.

The Association officers were thanked for their services and re-elected en bloc.

Discussion on the printed report revealed that an imposing but anonymous list of service touches should have been credited to Egerton,

and that Ospringe appeared to have changed Districts.

Mr. R. L. Sills (Maidstone District secretary) said that arrangements were in hand to hold the annual dinner at Maidstone in October. Mr. C. T. Hillis, secretary of the Ashford District, urged members to be punctual in their applications for tickets. He pointed out that 20 per cent. of those present had not notified the treasurer by the specified date. Consequently there was a shortage of beer.

The Association secretary (Dr. E. S. J. Hatcher) informed the meeting that subscriptions were received from 45 fewer practising members. A four-figure total of 1,006 was only just maintained, but it was heartening that 180 new members had joined. There was a net increase of two affiliated towers. He spoke with pleasure of the restored ring of ten at All Saints' in the county town of Maidstone.

NO CONFIDENCE

The main topic discussed was the work of the committee. Dr. Hatcher said that in 1957 this body had the disquieting experience of having two of its recommendations reversed at the annual general meeting. In politics this would have been a vote of no confidence.

Mr. W. A. J. Knight said this implied resignation.

The chairman pointed out that the committee did resign automatically each year, and had been re-elected on his (Mr. Knight's) proposition. Mr. Knight had confidence in the officers.

Mr. R. J. Carlton, while appreciating the work of the committee, maintained the rights of democracy.

Dr. Hatcher said that the committee had no wish to dictate, and explained more fully its function of government. He only pleaded that members should not act precipitately in reversing the considered recommendations of their elected committee.

Speaking on behalf of the Association, Mr. E. A. Barnett (secretary of the Central Council) thanked the Rev. T. G. Williams for taking the service; Miss M. Nightingale (headmistress of Ashford School for Girls), for so kindly lowering the meeting to use the premises; Mr. G. N. Butcher (organist of the Parish Church); incumbents and tower captains who had made their bells available; the Mothers' Union, for providing tea and cakes; and Mr. C. T. Hillis and his helpers, for making all the arrangements.

The bells of Ashford, Bethersden, Biddenden, Charing, Little Chart, Sellindge, Tenterden, Willesborough and Wye were available at various times throughout the day.

WORCESTERSHIRE & DISTRICTS ASSOCIATION

THE 75th annual meeting of the Worcestershire and Districts Association was held, according to custom, on Easter Monday at Worcester. The service, at All Saints, was conducted by the chaplain, the Rev. L. J. Birch (Vicar of Hanbury). The new Dean of Worcester, the Very Rev. R. L. P. Milburn, read the lesson, and the Blessing was given by Bishop Stuart. The ten bells of All Saints' were rung before the service, making a suitable introduction to the day's activities of worship, business, ringing and the renewal of old and the making of new friendships.

At the business meeting, which was held in the College Hall, Worcester, the Ringing Master formally welcomed the new Dean, and hoped that he would continue to fulfil the traditional office of president of the Association. Beck, and Mr. Charles Camm, who had been Ringing Master of the Western Branch for 28 years. All the retiring officers of the Association were re-elected, and an especially appreciative vote of thanks was made to the secretary of the Association. They are: Master, Mr. W. B. Cartwright; chaplain, the Rev. L. J. Birch; general secretary and treasurer, Mr. J. D. Johnson; auditors, Messrs. G. J. Hemming and F. Hyde; Central Council representatives, Messrs. W. B. Cartwright, B. C. Ashford and D. Beacham; librarian, Mr. C. W. Cooper.

The secretary informed members that the annual dinner would again be held in the Guildhall, Worcester, and this year it would take place on October 18th. The dinner committee was asked to consider the possibility of changing the form of that occasion, when branches had reported their observations in the matter.

In the afternoon ringing of varying quality took place in the towers of St. John's, Worcester, Hallow and Kempsey. At the latter tower, where the bells are hung anti-clockwise, a touch of Grandsire Doubles caused some amusement. The conductor had a 'back seat' prompter, half the band had helpers standing by, and the six-score was brought round with the help of five additional conductors, none of whom was ringing! Perhaps the best ringing of the day was a touch of Spliced Surprise at St. John's (Cambridge, London and Bristol). It was almost faultless, and a fine example of Major ringing in a packed tower. After tea the Cathedral bells were rung to rounds, Stedman Cinques, Grandsire Caters with a fine course of Bob Royal on the back ten, followed by an equally good course of Bristol Surprise on the back eight.

The thanks of the Association were accorded to the incumbents and towerkeepers for their ready co-operation.

PEALS ON SMALLER NUMBERS

Dear Sir,—I am a little grieved to hear of a breath of suspicion by a very eminent ringer against the validity of 5,040's of Minor and Doubles to qualify for true peal status, though this suggestion is, of course, a very old one. Nobody disputes the facts of the case, that each change in 5,040 Doubles, for example, is bound to appear 42 times. To suggest that this reduces it to a 'performance' is bandying terminology and stressing the theoretical aspects of ringing at the expense of the practical.

What was the original motive of fixing the extent of Triples as the qualifying length for a peal? This number has no special magic excepting in that it is long enough to require a certain measure of skill and competence in composition and performance and of physical and mental determination in completion. Thus, though it is a number based on theory, it is meant to be a measure of practical attainment.

Viewing peals of Minor and Doubles from this standpoint, they are, in my view, well worthy to be classed as peals, as weight for weight and intricacy for intricacy, they are much more exacting physically and require much more mental concentration and determination.

For example, if I rang a peal of St. Clement's Bob Royal, conducting from a 20-cwt. tenor, I should expect to finish fresh and relaxed, but if I rang the same method on five (St. Simon's), again conducting from the tenor of a 20-cwt. five, and making probably about 300 calls, I should probably finish in a state of physical and mental exhaustion. Which is the more notable performance to deserve the honour of being called a 'peal'?

Even conducting 5,040 Bob Minor I shall need to transpose for about 150 calls if I am to keep a safe check on the ringing, but in J. Pritchard's well-known 5,056 of Major the figure is only 68. In my view, therefore, there is more conducting merit in the Minor. Is the inevitable repetition of having to ring seven extents in the process to be so weighty in the view of the theorists that they cannot regard the Minor as worthy of the 'peal' title? —Yours faithfully,

MECHANICAL GRANDSIRE TRIPLES IN HOLLAND

Dear Sir,—While in Holland recently on a short holiday, I visited the English Church at Rotterdam (St. Mary's). The chaplain, the Rev. W. Popham Hosford, who is also Rural Dean of the Netherlands, very kindly told me all about the new ring of bells installed in his church.

In November, 1957, a ring of eight bells made by a Dutch firm—Messrs. Eijsbouts Lips of Astén—and costing about £1,500, was blessed by the Bishop of Fulham. As the present tower is very small the bells were hung dead and a mechanism fitted so that, at the push of a switch, three leads of Grandsire Triples could be rung, preceded and followed by two whole pulls of rounds. By means of another switch the tenor can be swung and chimed for services.

The chaplain made them ring for our benefit and the effect is very pleasant. The bells, made of cement basically, and lined with metal, are the finest of this kind to be made by the Dutch. They sound very musical, especially outside, being tuned electronically.

The tenor is probably about three to four cwt. The mechanism was arranged so as to (Continued foot of next column)

TWO LEAD METHODS OF DOUBLES AND RECOGNITION

Dear Sir,—Regarding the late controversy about 120 Treble Bob Doubles, this is not completely impossible, but unfortunately we have to go against another rule, that no method should have less than three leads. The method I have composed has two leads. We could have a three-lead method by changing the P.L. with the B.L., but this would mean having an unsymmetrical method. However, looking through the preface of the 'Collection of Doubles' I find no mention of the fact that a method must be symmetrical.

To come to Saturn Treble Bob Doubles and all the false sheep following it. How one can possibly claim that they are methods I cannot understand. I always understood that the idea of change ringing was that we rang all the extent of a method without repeating a single change. If one writes out a list of changes and finds one cannot produce a six-score one will in all probability find a 240 is possible. Imagine all the stupid 'methods' coming up to the Central Council, the smallest extent being a 240 or 360. Just because a method looks pretty you cannot accept it ignoring the fact that it is false. Why not write a method on this principle:—

It is no worse than Saturn Treble Bob Doubles because 240's can be made from it. Surely the only time a 12-score should be made is when a six-score can also be made from the same method, even then I am not in favour of it because I see no art in ringing a 240.

However, back to a method where a six-score is possible. I find no reason why this method should be turned down just because it is a two-lead. One can understand when the Central Council turns down methods with ten changes in a plain lead, but this is a method which is already one-third the changes of the full extent.

On studying the two-lead method it will be found that there are two courses, both the same except reversed, two bells having one course, two the other. I should think that the effect of the bob in this method would be more interesting to ring than a four-lead method, because one has to know whether they are in reverse course or plain course.

Is it possible the Central Council can accept a two-lead method with 40 changes or over, or accept an unsymmetrical three-lead method?

As our own little tower has not been named and holds a Doubles record, may I suggest the method be called 'Stanwell Treble Bob Doubles'?—Yours sincerely,

LEICESTER CHURCHWARDENS OBJECT TO BELLS

The bells of St. Mark's, Leicester, a ring of eight (tenor 22 cwt. 3 qr. 24 lb. in E flat), had not been rung since 1927 until February 15th this year.

The notion to get them ringing again came to Mr. John B. Bennett, Ringing Master of Cosby, and former ringer of St. Margaret's, Leicester. The Vicar of St. Mark's (Canon Stevenson) gave permission to inspect the bells, and on the first visit the fourth was pulled up, only three bells having ropes on them. The bell loft has been taken over by the pigeons, so one is left to imagine its condition.

Arrangements were duly made to visit and patch up the bells on Saturday, February 15th. Ringers from Wigston, Sapcote, Anstey, Stoney Stanton, Cosby, Loughborough and Leicester were recruited.

The wooden frame is in very good condition, but the wheels on the second, fifth, sixth and seventh had little or no flange, so hard-board was nailed on. Most of the wooden sliders were in the floor (amongst the pigeon droppings), the sixth was missing altogether, but the treble was the only bell without a stay. The bearings (and John E. Cooke) were washed with paraffin, oiled, and fitted with ropes (the latter doesn't apply to Cooke), after which they were pulled up one by one, while the writer stood on the frame, which proved to be very firm.

Half a course of Bob Major was rung before the sixth rope slipped wheel, taking our temporary flange with it. Darkness having descended, making further work impossible, we had to content ourselves with Triples on the remaining seven.

Taking things into account, the bells went well and are of good tone. Perhaps not up to St. John's standard, but certainly better than St. Mary's. The tower itself is perfect, with about 25 to 30 feet draught of rope.

While all this work was going on aloft, some of our party were having trouble below with the vicar's warden, who was making known his dislike of bells in general and ringers in particular, in no uncertain terms. Arrangements had been made to continue our work there the following week, but after the churchwarden had conferred with the Vicar, a halt was called.

A meeting was arranged between ourselves and the churchwardens the following Thursday. No further progress was made; both wardens were against the bells being rung but would offer no reason for their objection.

Our intention had been to ring the bells on the occasion of the visit to Leicester of H.M. the Queen on May 9th, the royal route having been scheduled to pass immediately by the tower.

We had also hoped it would be possible to teach a Sunday service band there, drawing our recruits from St. Mark's flourishing youth club.

A Guild of Ringers Without Bells

The peal of Plain Bob Minor, rung at Brentford on April 12th, is of special interest, as five members of the band taking part were from the Church of St. Matthias, Richmond, and belong to its Guild of Ringers. This may not sound very unusual until it is made known that there are no bells at St. Matthias' (although the very fine tower was designed for a ring of 12), and the ringers believe they are the only band in the country attached to a church with no bells. It is particularly significant that this is the centenary year of the church, and if moves going on to secure a ring for the church are ultimately successful, the old objection of 'no one to ring the bells if we get them' would be invalid.

With no bells, the Guild have had to rely on the kindness of other churches for the use of their towers, and they have been fortunate in securing the use of Brentford tower for 6-bell practice, and Mortlake for eight bells. It is hoped to celebrate this centenary year with a peal of Major (there are actually ten ringing members in the Guild), but it is not likely that it will be possible to ring it at Richmond, the mother church of the parish.

All the ringers in the St. Matthias' Guild take part regularly in Sunday service ringing at other churches.

DEDICATION

Hucknall Torkard

Hucknall Torkard is rather a drab urban district of some 23,000 people in the Nottinghamshire coal field but it has two things of which it is justly proud—its association with the poet, Lord Byron, and its ancient Parish Church of St. Mary Magdalene.

And it is to the latter that our thoughts and footsteps turned on April 5th, when a new ring of eight bells was dedicated by the Venerable H. L. Phillips, Archdeacon of Nottingham.

The site of the church has been hallowed for 12 centuries, the first Early Saxon church being founded in the eighth century. A fine 14th century porch with massive weather-beaten roughly-hewn oak timbers from Sherwood Forest is a feature of the church. Lovers of Byron see in the church a shrine to the great poet, who is buried in the family vault beneath the chancel.

But on April 5th this lovely church put on its festive garb for Easter and for the dedication of the new ring of eight bells given in memory of Henry Morley Raynor by his widow. A huge congregation consisting of parishioners, the chairman and members of the Urban District Council and scores of ringers from many different counties, with Mr. Paul Taylor and members of the Loughborough Foundry, joined in a cheerful service of praise and thanksgiving, conducted by the Vicar of Hucknall Torkard, Canon Kenneth Thompson. During the service the bells were dedicated by the Archdeacon of Nottingham.

In his address the Archdeacon took as his theme 'To the Glory of God,' and reminded his congregation that everything in the church was dedicated to the glory of God, as also was the ringing of the bells.

The bells are a light ring with a tenor of 12½ cwt in F sharp by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., and the 'go' and tone are both excellent. The ringing chamber has been tastefully decorated in pastel shades and has been much improved by boarding in the rough-cast walls. Too late, many of the entrants to the ringing chamber must have thought of the couplet:—

'Each entering mortal
Beware this low portal!'

The dedication rounds were rung by the new band recently recruited by Mr. Herbert Lewin and his family.

After the service, tea was provided for the congregation in the commodious Church Hall and the bells were then thrown open to visiting ringers, who put them to excellent use until late in the evening. The only criticism that can be made is that the bells are rather noisy in the vicinity of the church, but judicious boarding-up will mitigate any nuisance.

The new local band is fortunate in having a nucleus of experienced ringers, and under the leadership of Mr. Herbert Lewin rapid progress should be made.

The three previous bells, which have all been recast, were founded by George Oldfield and Thomas Hedderley, of Nottingham.

Let this brief report end in a note of praise from one of the hymns used in the service:—

'All ye who ring in England
Rejoice with us this day,
Our bells shall ring through Hucknall
In sad times and in gay.
So let us ring together
As one united band,
That we may swell the praises
In that Eternal Land'

OBITUARY

VEN. H. E. FITZHERBERT

We regret to announce the death of the Ven. Henry Edward FitzHerbert, Archdeacon Emeritus of Derby and president of the Midland Counties Guild since 1949. He was also president of the Midland Counties Association 1939-41, when, owing to war restrictions of the 'black-out' and suspension of ringing, he was most helpful in keeping things going by his enthusiasm and encouragement.

During the last two years illness and infirmity prevented him from taking an active part in the affairs of the Guild, but his interest continued until he died at his home, the Old Vicarage, Quarndon, on April 3rd, aged 75 years.

Archdeacon FitzHerbert was a member of one of the oldest county families of Derbyshire and for many years a prominent personality in the Derby Diocese. He was the fourth son of the Rev Sir Richard FitzHerbert, fifth baronet, of Tissington Hall, Ashbourne, who was Rector of Warsop.

After holding several appointments he became Rector of Netherseale with Overseale on 1930 and remained there eight years, during which time he was responsible for the restoration of the church and rehanging of the bells at St. Peter's, Netherseale, and did much to encourage the art of ringing by his kindness and enthusiastic interest in his ringers. Whilst at Netherseale he was appointed an Honorary Canon of Derby Cathedral—1936—and was Archdeacon of Derby from 1943 to 1952. His wife, the Hon. Mrs. Margaret Elinor FitzHerbert, was the only child of the third Baron Heytesbury, and she died suddenly in March last year.

Hundreds of mourners, in every walk of life, including the Bishop of Derby and the Lord Lieutenant of Derbyshire, paid tribute to a 'beloved friend' at the funeral service at Derby Cathedral. In his address the Bishop paid a deep tribute to the Archdeacon's memory and said he was devoted and selfless and ready to help in any good cause.

As a last tribute to his respected memory the bells of St. Matthew's, Overseale, were rung muffled on Sunday following the funeral to a quarter peal of Doubles in five methods by: N. Cotton 1, Joan Cotton 2, J. W. Cotton 3, P. W. Grice 4, W. H. Carson (conductor) 5, H. Shaw 6, and it was regrettable that a muffled peal arranged at St. Peter's, Netherseale, was lost after two hours' good ringing.

HERTFORDSHIRE SIX-BELL TOWER LOST BY INCENDIARISM

At 4 p.m. on Thursday, April 17th, villagers at Aston, Herts, noticed smoke and flames issuing from the 12th century tower of the Parish Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Several fire brigades rushed to the scene but were unable to prevent the timbers in the interior of the tower from being completely gutted, together with part of the nave roof.

It appears that vestments in the base of the tower had been deliberately ignited by a person as yet unknown to the police, and the flames quickly seized the wooden gallery and spread up the tower.

That it was a case of fire-raising was borne out by what Mr. John Welch, of Walkern, president of the Hertford County Association, discovered when he arrived with his daughter, Frances, at the neighbouring Church of St. Peter, Benington, at 5.45 p.m., followed shortly by the remainder of a peal band. He found lighted candles and burnt hymn books and linen in various parts of the church placed so as to start a further conflagration. The timely arrival of the peal ringers may well have saved Benington Church. The peal was postponed.

At Aston, however, a scene of destruction was revealed. Broken fragments of two smaller bells were found at the foot of the tower, forming part of an inscription 'Miles . . . Made Me. 162 . . .'. The crown and clapper of the other bell were still attached to the charred headstock aloft, where two other bells lodged as they began to fall. It appears that the four bells still in the tower are cracked or otherwise damaged by the intense heat, and a complete recasting and restoration is almost certainly necessary. The stonework of the tower appears comparatively unscathed.

Aston bells were a six with a tenor of 11 cwt., which were restored, and augmented by the addition of a tenor, many years ago, by the Whitechapel Foundry. In 'Church Bells of Hertfordshire, 1886,' the details are as follows:

Treble and fourth: 'Rev. Mr. Ellis, Vicar. Wm. Wollatt, Churchwarden. John Callen, overseer. Thomas Mears, Founder, London, 1840.'

Second, third and fifth: 'Miles Graye Made Me. 1629.'

A large tenor was later added, which tended to overpower the lighter bells. They were rung from a curious, stepped gallery, the tenor ringer standing well below the others. This has now been destroyed.
