MR. AND MRS. BIRMINGHAM

TODAY, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Walker celebrate their diamond wedding, and the congratulations and good wishes of the whole Exercise will be extended to the happy couple on this unique occasion.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker were married at St. Andrew's Church, Taunton (Mrs. Walker's home town), on December 12th, 1898. He was 22 years old, having migrated to Taunton when his father's employment took him from Birmingham. Whilst in this town he became interested in ringing, and learned to ring, together with the late James Hunt, in 1895, at St. Mary Magdalene Church, where the conductor was Thos. W. Radford. It was mainly at the suggestion of his fiancee, as she was then, that he took up the Art; and he rang his first peal on February 1st, 1896. This was Grandsire Triples. He was elected a member of St. Martin's Guild in 1897. On his return to Birmingham about 1900, a rather sorry state of affairs confronted him. There was a band capable of ringing Stedman Cinques but they had no conductor, and had to be content with ringing plain courses.

This did not suit Albert, so he commenced studying conducting, and in 1904 he called his first peal of Stedman Cinques; and from that day Birmingham never looked back. Between 1904 and the present time he has taken part in no less than 553 12-bell peals, conducting 239. Seven were non-conducted, the most outstanding being Stedman Cinques on handbells, when the six ringers drew for a pair of bells out of a hat held by the umpire, James George.

Albert called the first peals on 12 at St. Mary's, Taunton, in 1923, Exeter Cathedral in 1924 and Buckfast Abbey in 1930. He called the first peal of Cambridge Maximus in Birmingham, being the first on the bells, by the Guild, and by all the band. He has taken part in peals on no less than 45 12-bell towers, including St. Paul's Cathedral, London. Another noteworthy performance was the first peal of Stedman Sextuples on handbells, which he conducted. He organised a 12-bell week, when six peals in different towers were planned. Five were successfully accomplished, but a broken rope at Wolverhampton brought one failure. His total peals number 850, of which he has conducted 346.

Albert Walker's life has been one of loyal service to St. Martin's Guild and the Exercise generally. He served as Ringing Master from 1906–1910, and 1921–1935. In 1944

he was elected Master and, because of his insistence that the office should go round, served for three years. However, in 1949 the Guild again elected him as Master, when he served two years, resigning to give place to Ald. A. P. Smith, who was in 1950 Lord Mayor of Birmingham. The Guild once again elected him as Master in 1953, and he served for another three years. He has been tower warden and Sunday service Ringing Master at St. Martin's for more years than he can remember, and is held in highest esteem by Canon Bryan Green, the present rector and successor to about a dozen rectors under whom Albert has served.

Naturally, a man of such outstanding ability would find his way to the Central Council, and in 1932 he was elected an honorary member, and has served on the Standing, Literature and Broadcasting, Carter Ringing Machine and other committees with distinction.

For all these efforts Albert has been encouraged, helped and sustained by Mary, his wife, or spouse, as he calls her sometimes. She is as well known to ringers as her husband, and those who enjoyed her wonderful hospitality when they lived at 81, Baker Street, will long remember her kindliness.

To many ringers up and down the country, Albert Walker is Birmingham, and Birmingham is Albert Walker. Very many owe to him their grateful thanks for giving them the opportunity to ring their first peal of Stedman Cinques. Also quite a number, including the writer, have him to thank for his willing and patient help when they were trying to master the mysteries of calling Stedman. During the whole of his married life he has never spared himself any trouble in helping those with less ability than his own, and he has so many friends and admirers that it is certain his name will go down in ringing history together with other great men associated with Birmingham, such as Thurstans, Lates, Johnson and Carter.

Contemporary with Carter's later years, Albert Walker was among the first to see the value of Carter's compositions, and was the first to conduct the more complicated efforts which he produced, many of which would never have been rung but for Walker's enthusiasm. It is fairly safe to say that he put Carter on the map. Such is his modesty, however, that he would never lay claim to such distinction, and it is left to the writer to say what ought to have been said long ago. Walker saw the evolution of

Peal boards commemorating peals in which he rang, conducted by Mr. M. Wood and Mr. Attwater, still hang on the walls of this rather uncared-for ringing chamber, but the bells still 'tell a tale' in this East End backwater.

Would the former 'admirers' of Mrs. Elisabeth Bowden please note that the printing of her name in a half peal on November 8th at Wotton-under-Edge as Elizabeth Grime does not denote that her marriage did not really take place at all last February, but was a lapse on the part of the conductor, for which he is humbly apologetic. To make amends he called Lis and Dick Bowden a 'wedding' peal at Cheddar on November 29th.

When Mr. Ernest Morris rang in a quarter peal at South Wigston on Remembrance Sunday his memory went back to November 11th, 1918, when, as S/Sgt. E. Morris of the District Purchasing Office of Supplies, R.A.S.C., he rang the 54½ cwt. tenor in York Minster to 1,260 Grandsire and also conducted the quarter. The tenor then went badly.

Although capable of ringing this and other methods 'inside' (often round the heavy end), she modestly chose to ring the treble. She is probably the first Leyland lady ever to take part in a peal, and to show their pleasure and appreciation the male members of the Leyland band presented her with a brooch.

Two-and-a-half hours after the start of a half-muffled peal to the memory of the late verger at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, on November 19th, the lights were switched off at the mains by an intruder. It was the first time for some years that the emergency gas lamp was not lit prior to a peal attempt, and the ringing came to an abrupt conclusion. A churchwarden came up to the ringing chamber some minutes before to watch and had left the vestry door open.

RAILWAYMEN'S GUILD

As it was now too late for a further attempt the ringers retired, not too gracefully, for tea and to commiserate with Mr. Stenson, who was in 'the band.'

Despite no positive results after three hours' ringing, the visitors enjoyed and much appreciated the ringing and companionship, and arranged to come again in the New Year. Thanks were accorded to Mrs. Stenson for her kind hospitality.

MEMORIES

Dear Sir,-I would very much like to thank Mr. W. G. Wilson for his article on the old ringing paper 'Campanology' and its pro-prietor, William Bedwell, whom I knew well and rang with over 60 years ago, in your issue of November 28th.

Mr. Bedwell came to Lewisham from Essex some time in the late 1880's, and when I knew him he was in charge of that tower. as Mr. Wilson states, secretary of the Lewisham District of the Kent County Association, and District of the Kent County Association, and he was District secretary when I was elected a member in January, 1897. I am now the only ringer left in the District who knew and remembers him. I well remember, too, Mr. Bedwell publishing his paper, and until last year when they had to be cleared out for restoration work there were several copies in the clock room above our ringing chamber.

My memories of the paper are that if Mr. Bedwell had been a journalist and not a printer it would probably have flourished. Its failure to do so forced him into bankruptcy, his health gave way and he died a comparatively young man not long after. Much of the editorial work was done by the late F. W. Thornton, of Greenwich. He was mace bearer, toastmaster and personal attendant to the mayors of Greenwich. He was a fluent speaker and was equally gifted with his pen.

There are still some of us left who remember the late Mr. A. T. King, whom Mr. Wilson also mentions. Mr. King was the founder and first secretary of the Middlesex Association as we know it today. He was a civil servant and was chief of the National Debt Office. He was also a lay reader in the Diocese of London, and was one of the first laymen in London to occupy a pulpit. Mr. King had a great effect occupy a pulpit. Mr. King had a great effect on London ringing and was a kind friend of ringers generally. Many of the London clergy had been at Winchester with him and were his personal friends, and as such he was able to open many London towers (especially the 12-bell ones) to the Middlesex Association which had hitherto been the prerogative of the very select few. He was always 'at home' to any ringers at his office and pleased to see them at any time, and if they had any personal prob-lems would help them if it were at all possible. My memories of Mr. King are very happy ones.

But we may guess that Mr. Bedwell's printing business in Lewisham High Street had to be negative which he was doing the job of a Dislected while he was doing the job of a District secretary of the local branch of the Kent County Association, indulging his hobby of ringing on every possible occasion and at the same time trying to run a weekly paper on a personal basis. You, Mr. Editor, will agree I am sure, that a weekly paper, if you are responsible for everything, is a full-time job on its

If in trying to pick out interesting items for these notes I have laid most emphasis on London and its ringers, there are two reasons for this. One, of course, was that the Editor was a Londoner and gave, perhaps unconsciously, a greater proportion of his space to the Metropolis, as he called it: the other is, of course, that I too am a Londoner.

What is perhaps really surprising is how little difference there is between the format and contents of 'Campanology' and that of 'The Ringing World,' considering how much all else has changed in the same period.

And now these 26 issues of the paper must be returned to that locked how in St. Margaret's

be returned to that locked box in St. Margaret's ringing chamber, with thanks to Mr. Hewett for keeping them so safely and (however doubtfully) for letting me borrow them. I wonder what else he has in that box!

OBITUARY

MR. GEOFFREY CARTER AN APPRECIATION

Geoffrey Carter was never a very highly skilled ringer. He rang perhaps a dozen peals, but as a descendant of John Carter he had ring-ing in the blood. Geoffrey was the ringing companion par excellence. Whilst some parties of ringers may have been complete without him non was ever incomplete that included him. He did not miss many University of London Society functions, but when he was not there it was never quite the same. The party was not complete—it never will be again. He was a part of us in a way that no other member has been, and in the 13 years that the Society and Geoff were together we grew round him from the time that he was one of only a dozen members in all

that he was one of only a dozen members in all and much the most senior.

He was invariably late, and those who weren't would be looking to the door for that little figure with the queer, stooping, springy walk, the shock of unruly, curly hair, the clothes that none but a bachelor would be allowed to wear, the inevitable pipe and the cough. When he came all knew him and he knew us all. He called us affectionately 'Old Boy' or 'My Dear,' but none ever used these phrases with more genuine affection nor received it in return. There was always much to talk about with Geoff—music, literature, travel, friends, bells, his job in I.C.I., our jobs, and many more topics of which he had such an exhaustive knowledge. He was never ill at ease talking to anyone nor they to him. they to him,

He had his faults: he was an abominable correspondent, but then Geoff wasn't the sort of person one corresponded with; he was a poor week-ender-invitations to stay for the weekend somehow never came to fruition; he never learnt to dodge his bell properly, he simply stared you between the eyes and rang over and under-but how well he could do this when the ringing had a beat.

We remember Geoff trudging the Somerset lanes in 1946 ('Two pints to the mile, old boy'); we remember, too, some story about losing his way in the women's dormitory of a youth hostel the same year; we remember him complete with crash helmet and hair flowing out complete with crash helmct and hair flowing out round the sides on the back of David's Vespa or tucked down in the other David's 'bug'; we shall remember him in the hurly-burly of practice night at Gospel Oak. We shall re-member him, too, in Somerset again this sum-mer, a painfully sick man but still enjoying it all with that chuckling little laugh, playing with the children and one little toddler of 16 months offering him her hair brush. We shall remember his annual renderings of 'Buttercup Joe' and his fund of stories. You indeed sowed a rich harvest for us, Geoff.

MR. FRED SEAR

Mr. Fred Sear, who passed away after a long illness on November 20th, was a member of the family of Sear of Bletchley, so well known in Midland ringing circles in the first part of the

A railwayman all his working life, he was first employed at Rugby, and then became sta-tion master at Steeple Claydon. During his period of service here he was instrumental in getting the bells restored and ringing again. In 1920 he moved to Melford in Staffordshire, but still kept up his interest in ringing at Bletchley, often travelling there for peals, etc. Two more often travelling there for peals, etc. Iwo more promotions, to Armitage in 1926 and Rugeley in 1933, kept him in the same area of Staffordshire, where he was a frequent visitor to the belfries at Lichfield and Rugeley, until the ban on ringing in 1940. In that year he retired, and went back to Bletchley until 1946 when he moved again to Rugeley to be near his daughters.

Although his new abode was on the out-skirts of the town, he came down to the belfry at Rugeley very frequently, being always a wel-come visitor, ever ready to help with the train-ing of the young band there.

After a few years, however, his health pre-vented him travelling in so often, but he always

came whenever possible, until a serious opera-tion put a final stop to his ringing. He still kept up his interest in the Exercise, and was always glad to receive a visitor and talk about

He was buried at Rugeley on November 24th. The local band was represented at the funeral, and a half-muffled quarter peal was rung to his memory in the evening,

MR. EDWIN BISHOP, Jun. Mr. Edwin Bishop, who died on November 30th, had been a valuable member of the St. Denys', Rotherfield, Sussex, band of ringers for nearly 50 years. It was a great shock to everyone, as the previous afternoon he had been watching the local football team playing at home. He passed away peacefully in his sleep at the age of 66 years.

A quiet, lovable, unassuming character, he was always most regular in his attendance for Sunday service ringing and practice nights; he was always ready to help learners, and Frank H. Hicks, now of East Grinstead, and the writer of this are just two who benefited from his help.

The wooden tower of Cowden houses a Warner six, which go well in damp weather. The last two towers were the best of the day— Edenbridge with its fine Gillett eight, which are rung from a gallery (a good course of London here), and finally the heavier ring at Westerham, spoilt by a loud third.
