## AN EXCITING YEAR

THIS is the last issue of 1967, and unquestionably the most exciting year since the Editor took over the journal just after the termination of the second world war. The year started in an atmosphere of uncertainty: there was the thrill of the Mancroft issue of the previous month, the uncertainty of whether there would be even a committee to direct affairs and the belch of criticism erupting here and there, adding to general unpleasantness. This criticism had a salutary effect. It resulted in boldness on the part of the committee in authorising in the first place 20 cover issues for 1967, which gave the Editor not only a more attractive paper but that extra space to improve the variety of contents.

The excitement reached a fever point at Nottingham. It became apparent during the momentous debate when only one side of the picture was revealed, against carefully prepared and unexpected speeches of criticism, that there was still an atmosphere of antagonism and that the improvements already introduced had in no sense silenced the opposition.

Already the census, the brain-child of Messrs. Beresford and Pipe, had been filled in, and this important document, from the Editor's point of view when analysed by July, gave an unexpected glint of encouragement showing that 70 per cent of the readers were satisfied with the issue that accompanied the census.

There was, however, an important minority of 17 per cent which was dissatisfied. While some of the ideas included in the return have already been introduced, the Editor could not ignore some of the accusations made against him:

*"The Ringing World is very dull. Get professional advice on presentation and circulation. I know of one ringer who is in Fleet Street; his opinion is unprintable here."*

Another reads: *"Standard deplorable—commission articles."*

*"Kowtowing to people who have been ringing for 50 years or more and who have inflexible views of life and ringing."*

*"Ruthless editing of turgid prose of some contributions and of the large number of vicious letters."*

*"More judicious editing,"* and, next breath, *"less editing of articles."*

*"Go back to the format of Trollope."*

Naturally there were desires for the replacement of the Editor and his failings were elaborated. The great advantage of all these criticisms, as far as the Editor was concerned, was that they were anonymous. Only Mr. Beresford and his assistants know who said this or that. The Editor has no desire to know; it would in some cases break his confidence in the average reader. But it is something that calls for humbleness in spirit despite a

lifetime in journalism, and the friendship with many Fleet Street newspapermen.

This denouncement called for greater vitality and variety in pages and contents. From Nottingham cover issues were the rule until August and then from the second week of September until the last two issues of this year. When the committee met early in 1957 it was thought that 20 cover page issues were the maximum that could be produced without incurring loss. Messrs. Beresford and Pipe wanted a shilling "Ringing World" forthwith. This was strongly opposed by the Editor, who regarded it as bad psychology to plan a sales drive and at the same time increase the selling cost.

But there was evidence, as month succeeded month, that more and more readers were being attracted to the journal, and taking advantage of this movement the Convener gave his sanction to continue covers from September onwards, even if a loss up to £250 was incurred. The gratifying thing for the Editor was that when the committee met earlier this month the hon. treasurer, in consultation with the auditor and Mr. Jeater, was able to announce that the accounts up to the third week of November indicated an estimated balance of over £150.

The main contribution came from an increase of £784 in postal subscribers. In 14 issues the sales had passed the 6,000 mark, the highest being 6,111 on October 27th. The Editor gave consideration as to means of promoting a sales drive and came to the conclusion that the best contact with potential readers was where ringers assembled—at meetings and other gatherings. District secretaries on the whole have co-operated splendidly in selling or disposing of copies and this has meant a substantial addition to sales.

In one case a friendly suggestion was made by placing copies in newsagents' shops on sale or return. The problem is that there are probably more newsagents than ringers. The percentage of returns to sales is limited and the amount of clerical work in checking and forwarding accounts would absorb much money and need a bigger staff. To deal with this work and to help with stencilling the Editor engaged a clerical assistant for eight hours a week.

Now there has been a lot of confused thought on the relationship between the Editor and "The Ringing World" committee. The committee is not an editorial committee going into the day-to-day details of the working of the paper and its contents—that is the responsibility of the Editor. There are times when he consults the committee and others on points that arise and technical problems; also members of the committee help in the contribution of articles and features, but the legal onus rests with the Editor. To suggest that the committee cut this or that article or left out a particular letter is wrong. There is, however, a loyalty on the part of the Editor to the committee—and if practical their suggestions are carried out.

# How to Make Your Ringing Meetings Worth While

## Responsibilities of the Ringing Master

"Ringing meetings are a waste of time"—this is meant literally with the emphasis on the word "waste"—and can, I feel, be applied to very many meetings.

The interpretation of "waste" in this context is that the time spent is not being used as fully as it could be and Ringing Masters must take full responsibility for this state of affairs.

Too often meetings, while convivial occasions, leave ringers feeling dissatisfied. There are youngsters who have sat all the afternoon listening to the "experts" ringing advanced methods, and the experts who grumble—"all afternoon that wretched Ringing Master called for Plain Bob and Kent; we had only one decent touch of spliced and that was ruined by the treble, he missed every dodge in 5-6 down!"

### BALANCE

I accept that this is an over-generalised view of the problem, but its purpose is to isolate and bring into prominence the importance of "balance" in the selection of methods so that the time available is used as constructively as possible.

It is very easy to say that "balance"—which I define as being a sequence of ringing giving all levels of ability equal opportunity—is the "key," but obviously the major problem is how to attain it.

Broadly, one can say that "balance" may only be achieved if the Ringing Master knows the interests—I was tempted to say "desires," but this is open to misinterpretation!—and capabilities of the ringers present, and this knowledge may be classified as "communication."

Preplanning of ringing—meaning the prior consideration of the possible sequences of methods—whilst an attractive idea, has obviously only a limited value since usually one has little advanced knowledge of the numbers and abilities of people likely to be at a meeting.

### PERSONAL QUALITIES

Having briefly considered these two major factors in the organisation of ringing—namely "balance" and "communication," it is apposite to look at the personal qualities needed by the Ringing Master.

I do not subscribe to the theory that the Ringing Master should of necessity be capable of conducting Spliced Royal or even for that matter be able to ring it! Of more importance is that his ringing ability should command respect and for obvious reasons he should be able to conduct the standard methods. My personal view is that the "art" of conducting at meetings is in the delegation of this responsibility to others!

"Personality"—a popular and over-used word—is exhibited by the more extrovert of Ringing Masters, but this attribute is entirely unnecessary. The "control" of ringing should be as unobtrusive as possible, but this must not be confused with indecision.

On occasions it is vital that the Ringing Master should tactfully but firmly handle

problems without giving offence. These problems fall into many categories, but probably two of the commonest are:—

- (1) Inexperience of ringers—for example, the young lady ringer catching hold to ring a 20 cwt. tenor because "she rings the tenor at home."
- (2) The determination of the Ringing Master of what is an acceptable standard of ringing at any particular time.

### "PULLING TOGETHER"

One factor which emerges from this is that the Ringing Master should establish rapport between himself and the ringers—another term for this might be "pulling together." This reminds me of a story told of an annual District meeting where tower captains were reporting to the Guild president on the state of ringing in their particular tower.

One worthy climbed to his feet and—in a non-Yorkshire accent—declaimed: "Well, sir, we meets regular like, and our band be making progress and we pulls together"—at that point there came a voice from the back row: "Aye, and it b—well sounds like it, too!"

To summarise this section we have three key words dealing with the organisation of ringing: "Balance" by "communication" exercised by "control."

Having established this basic pattern for organisation we now look at the purpose of meetings and the various types encountered.

### POPULAR MEETINGS

Firstly meetings provide opportunities for social contact, personal advancement and the promotion of ringing generally. Secondly there are two main types of meetings, (i) the "popular" meeting as typified by the District monthly or Association quarterly, and (ii) the "practice" meeting.

The "popular" meeting needs a varied programme of ringing tailored to the usually continually fluctuating company of ringers.

Its organisation should be based on the following principles:—

- (i) The first piece of ringing in any period should be of the highest quality possible, commensurate with the ringers available, so as to set a standard of striking.
- (ii) The handling of ringing for the less experienced should be by rounds, call changes and plain hunting as appropriate, consisting of very short periods interleaved between the other methods at frequent intervals.
- (iii) As a basis, ringing should never take place on a less number of bells than there are in the tower—depending obviously on the number of ringers present. The only exception is probably a 12-bell tower where 10-bell ringing would be acceptable.
- (iv) Psychologically it is bad to follow a very good piece of ringing by a very poor performance of a similar type. For example, to follow an excellent course of Yorkshire by a poor course of Double Norwich (or vice versa!) gives an unfavourable impression, whereas call changes—although probably as badly struck—are acceptable because a high

standard, whilst desirable, is not expected in quite the same way!

(v) Expect a high standard of ringing—you might one day get it!

Practically, the Ringing Master will spend his time asking individuals what they would like to ring, planning the programme accordingly and standing with anyone needing a watchful eye on his performance. Occasionally he may ring himself when the bands for a particular method are either one short or weak.

### SOLID HARD WORK

Practice meetings are very different. People have come either to practise particular methods or to gain tuition generally. Whilst a friendly atmosphere is essential, the whole approach should be one of solid hard work. As methods are rung, persons sitting out should not spend their time chatting to friends, but should be following the work of one of the bells or "putting the polish" on the methods they themselves have been learning at home.

Also ringers should be encouraged to overcome their natural diffidence in attempting methods which they may consider beyond their capabilities. It is a "waste of time" to ring Bob Major when a person knows the method and with encouragement and practical help can ring a plain course of Kent Major.

The sequence of ringing is not as critical as in the "popular" meeting, since of its nature the variety of methods will be limited. However, in accepting this approach, the Ringing Master should be flexible enough to ring a short touch of spliced for the core of ringers who may have travelled 40 miles to help the local area members to practise Plain Bob and Grandsire.

### THE ADVERTISEMENT

The advertisement of meetings is generally the secretary's job but, in the case of practice meetings, the Ringing Master should ensure that the methods for practice are included. Care in selection is necessary to attract the ringers at whom the practice is specifically aimed.

If one accepts that an Association should take responsibility for the promotion of ringing in its area, then the Ringing Master is in a unique position to take the initiative.

The opportunities of "popular" and practice meetings to give help can be extended by the organisation of individual help if it is wanted. This latter point is critical since, whilst many people may need help, it is only with those who want help that endeavours of this sort can succeed. Obviously direct help to towers has to be tactfully handled since any suggestion of interference or patronisation would naturally be resented.

All schemes of assistance should not be considered as being permanent—as experience is gained, the bands being helped should not only be able to "stand on their own feet" but be able to start helping others.

## AN EXCITING YEAR—continued.

From the beginning of January there is to be a wage increase in the printing industry; there is also an increase in the price of paper due to devaluation. As a first step towards getting additional revenue, the price of all notices will be increased with the next issue to a minimum of 5s. and 2d. a word instead of 1½d. beyond 30. The price of displayed notices at 7s. 6d. an inch will remain. The position will be reviewed at the next committee meeting in March.

Two things will enable a staple selling price to be maintained—the continuance of the present rate of circulation increase and donations accompanying peals and quarter peals. We have been warned about new postal charges. These will have to be passed on to postal subscribers, but it is to be hoped that the basic selling price will remain firm. Much, however, depends on the new production charge for wages and paper; that figure cannot be finalised until the economic position of the country is on a firmer foundation.

The letters received of late encourages the Editor to think that the improved paper has greatly increased the percentage of satisfied readers. The many new contributors have infused a freshness of outlook and we go forward into 1968 with a good heart, conscious that certain difficulties that shook "The Ringing World" and its Editor to the very foundations have been overcome and that those at the head are now braced up to meet the problems ahead.

The Exercise and its handmaiden, "The Ringing World," has been richly blessed in the past 56 years and it is with a thankful acknowledgment of the goodness of an unseen hand throughout the past years that we enter into 1968 with courage ready to fulfil the duties and responsibilities placed upon us as faithful servants of His Church.

## DORSET TOWERS

Dear Sir,—As the Rev. Peter Bond mentions a Dorset tower—Halstock, by the sound of it—in his letter (December 1st) appealing for news about bell restorations, here is a list of the "new" and "unringable" towers in that county:

Augmentations and restorations: Thorncombe, five to eight; Melbury Osmond, Milborne St. Andrew and Stourpaine, five to six; Halstock, rehung in new frame; Gillingham, rehung in existing frame; Beaminster and Yetminster, restoration in hand.

Bells at present unavailable for ringing due to state of fabric: Milton Abbey and St. Peter's, Shaftesbury, long-term; Frampton and Powerstock, short-term.

Bells unavailable for ringing due to bad or antiquated belihanging: Cerne Abbas, Corfe Castle, Hinton Martel, Mappowder and Sandford Ocas.

That leaves Cheselbourne, where the bell-frame and fittings are in a state of total collapse; Folke, where the bells are still on the church floor; Kingston, where the clappers are (? partially) missing and supposed to be being overhauled locally; and Toller Whelme, a "chime" of five steel bells capable of being rung full-circle.

Branksea or Brownsea Church has four bells and not five, as given in "Dove."

This information is, to the best of my knowledge, correct and complete at the time of writing. I hope that it will be of use to anyone interested in Dorset or arranging an outing there.—Yours faithfully,

## DOUBLE MAJOR METHODS

Dear Sir,—The survey of Double Major methods by W. J. Cooper-Bailey introduces a series of methods with an interest of their own which has interested me for some time. As I obtained Table "a" in an hour or so a couple of years ago I expect the computer took only a few seconds! (other than programming, etc.).

I have found several interesting facts: Firstly, plain methods with right places only. (Remember there is one such Minimus method!) There are three R.P. Double Plain Minor methods and still three Major, while at the Royal stage only five, not a very large increase (excluding those with unusable l.h.'s).

There are no odd-bell Double methods with one hunt bell, as these contain an even number of leads and therefore both turning points must be together, i.e. at h.l. or l.e. However, as all right place plain even-bell methods extend to the next odd number by adding a hunt bell, we have the same number of Double methods as above, viz.: One Double Doubles method (out of three pure Doubles methods), three Triples (out of 11), three Caters (out of 32), five Cinques (out of 70-odd), etc.

Double Minor methods on the T.B. principle are not worth considering as 5ths place is necessary without the treble; also, a single change is necessary if the 2nds place is situated as usual.

Turning to T.B. type Major methods, there do not appear to be any right place Double methods in either the Treble Bob proper or Delight classes but I find two out of 20 Double Exercise methods.

Mr. Cooper-Bailey has covered the Surprise class in his Table "b" but I do not see any point in including those methods with more than two places either side of the treble, other than because two of them have been rung already.

The note on intrinsic falseness (Case II) and Table "c" would, I believe, be unnecessary without them. There are 31 perfectly good methods without them and once we allow two such changes per h.l. we will soon have methods with four or more! If one wants a stagnant method to splice in for variety or musical effect there are some perfectly good ones to choose from (e.g. Derwent) without having lots of places in a row. But that is only a personal opinion.

The extension of Double methods poses more problems, some of which appeared in "The Ringing World" of January 6th, 1967 (which would appear to uncover a loophole in the Central Council report on extension) and which the compiling of tables of methods greatly helps to solve.

Anyway, I will leave further tables for the computer people to compile!—Yours sincerely,

## TREATMENT OF VISITORS

My District chairman was on holiday in Plymouth, Devon, and was made welcome and rang in all the method towers he visited in the city; however, he went to the only call change tower and was completely, repeat completely, ignored, and at 9.15 p.m., when the bells were lowered, the company left with no "goodnight"—not one word! He has been a peal ringer for 23 years, conducting as well all the way up the scale. Exquisite rudeness!

My Deputy Ringing Master was sure a friend would manage to arrange for him to ring at Westminster Abbey; he has rung at most of the London towers. His friend was told by the tower captain that the rule was that "no visitors in any circumstances" and added "Please don't turn up, and avoid any embarrassment." Visitors are not countenanced by this exclusive band but, strangely enough, visiting bands may ring on their own if fortunate enough to get the chance, which is a problem rarely solved. ## THE SECRET IS BELL CONTROL

Dear Sir,—I do appreciate the straight words of the Leicester Guild Ringing Master. He is one of the few of our fraternity who take a view and dare to state it. I am with you, sir, and may I say that the Leicester Guild is not unique in itself for, believe me, there are others.

We have read a lot about bell control, which I think is one of the biggest factors in campanology, and this is the reason for my letter. I feel that 75 per cent. of our fraternity have not given this enough thought. Many times I have seen ringing and heard the sound of bells and I imagine that had there been an egg attached to the back stroke rest in very many cases it would still have been there as whole as ever.

To all our people I mention this feature, for the sooner the pupil can control his bell at hand and back, the sooner your statement of the many people interested in self-glorification will fade away, for they would greatly appreciate the value of it.—Yours faithfully,

Dear Sir,—I would like to congratulate Mr. P. Amos on his article concerning coins on bells. His mention of Haselbech Church was of great interest to me as it was here in 1905 that I learned to handle a bell on the old four. I was then a garden boy at Haselbech House, where there were three gardeners living in a bothy. As it was a very quiet place we were glad to join the ringers, who were under Mr. Bert Faulkner and a younger brother.

We also stoked the boiler to heat the church and sat around the fire in the stokehole playing ha'penny nap. At times we had a quart of "black and tan" stout, costing 4d., and a packet of Woodbines for 1d. Sometimes we all went to a practice at Naseby (a heavy five with a tenor reputed to weigh half a ton). They had a call change band and used to play simple hymn tunes like "Now the day is over" in whole pulls. I have never heard that done since. The very good sixes at Kelmarsh and Maidwell were also visited.

When the bells at Haselbech were augmented to a ring of eight I was head gardener at Donningham Priory, Newbury, Berks, and a ringer at St. Nicholas', Newbury. In that year (1933) the ringers at Newbury raised funds to pay for the two trebles to augment the old Wells eight to the lovely ten. I wrote to Miss Ismay, of Haselbech Hall, and told her what we were trying to do at Newbury and received a cheque for 10s. I raised £10 10s. towards that fund and carved the memorial tablet because we had no funds to buy one. — Yours faithfully,

**HANDBELL PEAL IN MONMOUTHSHIRE**

Dear Sir,—Mr. Brian Woodruffe's letter regarding the extension of Cardiff into Monmouthshire in 1937 is misleading.

The Bill was strongly opposed in the House of Lords by Lord Kagan, whose pro-English sympathies were very well known, because he did not want any part of Monmouthshire to be brought within any future "Home Rule for Wales" arrangement. Cardiff's counsel argued that there was very little in this point since, historically, Monmouthshire had always been claimed as a part of Wales, but to overcome the difficulty a clause was inserted providing that "nothing in this Act shall alter the boundary between the county of Glamorgan and the County of Monmouth." In other words, although Rumney is administered by Cardiff for the sake of convenience, it remains a part of Monmouthshire.

That this is still the position has been shown only recently. Commenting upon the traffic chaos after the snow, and quoting a Monmouthshire County Council spokesman, the "South Wales Argus" reported that "two of the County's major roads were completely impassable for several hours, the main road between Newport and Cwmbran and the Newport to Cardiff road at Rumney Hill." The spokesman continued, however, that the trouble at Rumney Hill was not the County Council's responsibility and was being dealt with by Cardiff City Council.—Yours faithfully,

**SUFFOLK VETERANS MEET AT LEISTON**

**W**HAT more appropriate venue for the annual get-together of Suffolk worthies than St. Margaret's, Leiston! For nearly 40 years this tower made history in name and deed—Gabriel Lindoff, Richard Stannard, the remarkable eight Bailey brothers, Jim Rumsey, Charles Sampson, George Wilson and a host of others. Surprise Major at its very best under that extraordinary conductor Charles F. Bailey, who apart from calling 100 consecutive peals of Surprise on Leiston bells, accompanied many of Stedman Caters and Cinques with his own brethren.

And so on Tuesday, December 12th, with peal boards recording those vintage years from 1888 to 1928 looking down on us in Leiston belfry, ten of Suffolk's veterans met for their annual ring, tea and reminiscences. And how they enjoyed themselves! Stedman and Grand-sire Triples, Double Norwich and Oxford Major, with an average age of over 79 years.

Tea was taken in a quiet room ("We don't want any o' that Rock 'n' Roll") decorated for the festive season and lit by lamps and candles—just right for the old 'uns to relax and chat about bygone days. Tales of famous ringers who had visited Ipswich and surroundings over the last half-century; ringing in London; our own men who had passed on: the Catchpoles and the Motts, Tillet, Brundell, Garrett and Souter, Winney and Grimes, the Borretts and the Wightmans and a score of others.

Gilbert Goodship produced the menu of the 1932 Croydon ringers' gathering, covered with autographs of great names of the Exercise, College Youths, Cumberlands and provincial Guilds alike. There were photographs in that delightful sepia colour of the camera's early days, and George Symonds' imitation of John Rogers calling Grandsire Cinques at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields 60 years ago. "His chest started to swell when the Tribble was in sixths place; by the time she was in 4ths he'd got his wind and then . . . 'Boooooorr . . . BBB' to turn the big bells!"

Everyone made a little speech and the youngest, Leonard Last, thanked Jim and George Pipe for making the arrangements for the afternoon and providing the tea. Jim (who qualifies himself in eight years' time!) expressed his privilege at being able to organise such a pleasant annual gathering and read good wishes from four who were unable to be present—James Bennett, Ernest S. Bailey, Charles Beecroft and Charles Fisher.

Handbells were enjoyed and concluded a happy afternoon.

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## OBITUARY

MR. ERNEST H. SIMPSON

The Exercise is very much the poorer by the passing of Ernest Simpson, of Saltaire, Bradford, who died in St. Luke's Hospital, Bradford, on December 8th, aged 85 years. Although completely deaf he continued ringing right up to the end and was only in hospital a matter of hours. His wife predeceased him in July last, a blow from which he hardly recovered, as they had been very happily married for almost 56 years.

Ernest commenced his ringing career in the Lavenham district of Suffolk and came to Bradford prior to the first world war, settling down in Shipley and ringing at St. Paul's Church, where he was tower captain for over 40 years until the bells were declared unsafe for ringing. He then joined the Cathedral band at Bradford and continued there until about 1959. By this time he was becoming very deaf and as travelling was rather difficult he joined the nearby tower at Bingley, where he continued right up to the end—although by now he was completely deaf.

He was a very able conductor and rang most methods. His peal list includes many Surprise methods and he was just as at home on twelve bells as on six. He will be particularly remembered for his interest in young ringers and was never happier than when putting them through their first 720's and, later, their first peals. He must have taught many hundreds to handle a bell and always gave them encouragement and an urge to tackle new methods.

After serving in the Army during the first world war he came back to Shipley and was a great source of strength to most of the towers in the area, where he attended practice nights on many nights during the week. Surprise methods were just becoming popular and Ernest did sterling work in helping many to master the intricacies of Cambridge, Superlative, London, etc.

Now another of the "old school" has passed on, but he will be fondly remembered by many for a long time

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## Three Peals in Northern Ireland

**A** LREADY the details of the three peals in Northern Ireland by Jonathan S. N. Porter's party during their week-end in November have been published, on page 880.

A month after the event G. E. T. tells the story of this second visit to Ireland this year, the previous trip being last April. Seven of the band assembled at Hendon, a sea crossing from Heysham being planned. An incident en route was the stopping of Martyn Jordan's car by the police—not for speeding, but for the waste paper throwing by his passenger!

### HANDBELLS UPSET CONCENTRATION

Only three berths had been secured by Jonathan. Lots were cast and the lucky ones were Dave Roberts, Bob Dennis and Martyn Jordan, the remainder settling in the lounge. It was a calm crossing, the last leg being through Belfast Lough, where handbells were brought out. Only a half-course of Stedman Triples was accomplished when the captain sent word that his concentration was being disturbed. And no wonder! The four concerned had chosen the "bridge" of all places as a ringing room!!

After docking at 7 a.m. there was a picturesque train journey to Bangor. The afternoon attempt that day was at Holywood, where John Lindsey, of Carrickfergus, joined the party, and a successful peal of Rutland Surprise Major was conducted by Jonathan. A disturbance towards the end was later discovered to have been caused by an enthusiastic organist trying to gain admittance to the church. At Bangor that night Mr. and Mrs. Porter kindly entertained the band to supper,

and the B.B.C. Symphony Orchestra provided the final entertainment of the day.

Saturday dawned bright and we arrived on time at Dundela, where Harry Brown, "a Yorkshireman in exile," joined up for a fairly fast peal of Cambridge Royal. For Harry and John this was their first of Surprise Royal, and they performed very well. Later, over a Chinese meal, the Archdeacon of Bangor extended his good wishes.

### RACE AGAINST TIME

The peal at Bangor (Spliced Surprise in eight methods) could not be started until after shopping hours. There were just four hours in which to ring the peal and travel 13 miles to catch the boat in Belfast. At the end of the first part there were anxious looks. It had taken 33 minutes, and at that speed the boat would have been missed. However, Jonathan speeded things up and the peal was finished in under three hours. The journey to Belfast was not without excitement; seven were packed into a land rover and it was not long before a puncture was discovered. A lightning wheel change enabled the boat to be caught with five minutes to spare.

It was again a calm journey, and after breakfast at Lancaster, through the good services of Mr. Rainford, the ten bells at the R.C. Cathedral were sampled. An extra peal at Worsley, arranged by Jeff Brannan, came to grief through a broken rope. Delays were experienced on the M.1 through several multiple crashes, and Hendon was not reached until 10 p.m.

Our thanks to Jonathan, incumbents and Irish friends for making the party so welcome.

## ST. LUKE'S, "CHELSEA", OUTING

Perhaps St. Luke's, Chelsea, is a misnomer, as the party organised by Mr. Frank Udall on September 16th included ringers from other towers such as Battersea, Clapham Common, Deptford, Isleworth, Putney and Rotherhithe.

The tour was one which appealed to ringers and non-ringers alike. First tower was St. Thomas of Canterbury, Salisbury, and, while ringing under the supervision of Michael Wycherley took place, there was ample time for others to visit the Cathedral or wander around the city, which is still largely medieval. The bells were described by different enthusiasts in the party as "mellow," "husky," "meaty" and "grand." Ken Rider looked after the ringing, which included a good half-course of Yorkshire. We were late arriving at Alton, but under Bob Cooles' direction several methods, including Bristol, were rung in the limited time available.

To all in all it was a thoroughly successful day. To all who helped to make the outing such a success, especially Frank, the coach driver, the clergy and those who welcomed us, our sincere thanks.

### STEDMAN CINQUES AT MANCROFT

The St. Peter Mancroft Guild are very pleased to report a peal of Stedman Cinques rung by an all-resident Mancroft Guild band.

Stedman Cinques at Mancroft has been rather a rare event during the last 50 years. The first peal on the bells after rehanging in 1925 in an all-metal frame was Stedman Cinques (November 10th, 1925). The band consisted of all Mancroft Guild members, but the ringer of the fourth was Egbert Borrett, who, according to the annual report of that year, was at that time a non-resident member living in Valparaiso.

The next peal was in 1935, when only six of the band were resident Norwich Association and Mancroft Guild members. It is interesting to note that both these peals took 3 hours and 52 minutes.

Following this peal there were only two peals of Stedman Cinques until the present one. These were in 1961, when John Chilcott led an all-visitors band, and in 1962 by a band led by Frank L. Harris; this latter peal had two local members in it.

## SINGLE CHANGE MINOR METHODS

By THE PROFESSOR

THERE seems to be a growing practice of using these methods in Spliced Minor ringing as an easy means of tacking on one or two extra methods. Although I do not pretend to extol the virtues of these retrograde methods there is a danger that if they are not correctly used falseness is liable to occur, and I hate to see ringers expending their energies on false peals. Falseness (i.e. repetition of rows) is particularly likely to happen when splicing plain methods and I would like to point out where the danger lies and how to avoid it.

There are ten single-change Plain Minor methods, viz.:

All these methods may be, under certain conditions, spliced with ordinary standard methods but it would take much time and reams of foolscap to explain all the possibilities. Owing to the apparent ease with which the pairs Pinehurst (Westcot) and Buxton (Rodbourne) will join with Double Oxford (London Bob) and St. Clement's (College), respectively, I will content myself for the time being with these methods.

Because of the nature of the rows within the lead it should be noted that ordinary 3-lead splicing cannot be used, and that in order to avoid falseness we shall have to rely on cross-splicing, i.e. certain leads on both sides of the single (in- and out-of-course) must be changed simultaneously.

A minimum of two leads may be changed (one each side of the single) with the same bells on the front (i.e. 2nds and 4ths place bells), that have the same bell as pivot at the half-lead, e.g.:

## (DOUBLE OXFORD (LONDON BOB))

(a) 23456 and 26453 (2 and 4 on front, 5 in 5ths).

(b) 64523 and 63524 (5 and 6 on front, 2 in 5ths).

Or any similar pairs of leads.

## (ST. CLEMENT'S (COLLEGE))

(a) 23456 and 26453 (2 and 4 on front, 5 in 5ths).

(b) 64523 and 63524 (5 and 6 on front, 2 in 5ths).

Or any other similar pairs of leads.
