

OUR COVER PICTURE

St. Peter's Cathedral, Adelaide, South Australia

THE foundation stone of St. Peter's Cathedral, Adelaide, was laid on June 29th, 1869. It is fitting that the first Australian tower to appear on the cover of "The Ringing World" should do so in 1969, just a century later. The architecture is of the Gothic Revival period based on the plans of William Butterfield. Like many such buildings of the 19th century it took some time to complete, and the towers and spires were not dedicated until 1902.

It is the left-hand tower that holds the bells. Here, surrounded by his seven brothers, hangs Great Frederick, a fine bell of 41½ cwt. in C. Although bells are usually referred to in the feminine gender, the sole inscription, on the tenor, insists that these bells are masculine:

ME FRATRESQVE MEOS AD LAVDEM PATRIS ET FILII ET SPIRITVS SANCTUS DONVM DEDIT FREDERICKVS ALLEN LAKEMAN + AD MCMXLI

(Frederick Allen Lakeman gave me and my brothers to the praise of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost. 1941)

Mr. Lakeman was a warden at the Cathedral for many years and on his death in 1941 his will revealed a bequest of £10,000 to provide St. Peter's with bells. The war interfered with placing the order and it is not quite clear how such a heavy eight came to be ordered, but in 1946 John Taylor and Co. cast the 7½ ton octave at Loughborough. They were dedicated, and first rung by a team of Sydney ringers, on the patronal festival, June 29th, 1947, when the late Rt. Rev. B. P. Robin, then Bishop of Adelaide, performed the ceremony. The weights are:—

They are hung in two tiers in a very solid tower in a typical 5-3 split.

SOCIETY FORMED

The St. Peter's Cathedral Bellringers' Society was formed on December 22nd. 1946, and the band trained on the six at St. Andrew's, Walkerville (a nearby suburb), until the dedication the following June. The establishment of change-ringing progressed slowly and the first quarter peal, of Doubles, was rung on April 25th, 1950. The band suffered many changes and it was not until the late 1950s that a regular team capable of ringing good changes to eight bells was available. It is a matter of pride that the first peal was rung by the Sunday service band. A good 5,040 of Grandsire Triples was rung in 3 hours and 32 minutes on February 20th, 1963, in honour of a visit of Queen Elizabeth II. It was conducted by Enid Roberts, who on that occasion became the first woman ringer to call a peal in Australia.

Soon afterwards, on March 24th, 1963, the first peal of Major (5,040 Plain Bob) was rung in 3 hours and 36 minutes, when

George Pipe, who conducted it, became the first ringer to turn the 41 cwt. tenor in to a peal.

ENGLISH VISITORS

When the first party of travelling English ringers came to Australia in 1934 on the Great Adventure the only bells available in Adelaide were those at St. Andrew's, Walkerville, but in 1965 the octave at St. Peter's was one of the major attractions for the ringers visiting Australia and New Zealand on Great Adventure II. During their visit Pat Cannon turned the tenor in twice to peals. On September 12th, 1965, the first peal of Surprise on the bells was rung—Cambridge Major, in 3 hours and 41 minutes, conducted by Wilfred Williams. Pat Cannon had the honour of calling the 100th tower bell peal in Australia when, a week later, on September 19th, 1965, he called a 5,056 Plain Bob Major from the tenor. The only other peal on the bells was one of Grandsire Triples, called by Philip Gray, on March 28th, 1965, to mark the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Although by English standards we ring few peals, quite a number of quarters are rung and they have nearly all been rung by the teams that have kept the bells ringing twice a Sunday for services. The present band, of 13, regularly ring Stedman Triples and Bob Major and have almost reached the point of adding Cambridge Surprise Major to the repertoire.

Since 1948 the members of the Society have taken part each year in the Anzac Day ceremonies. The bells are rung half-muffled during the march which culminates at the Cross of Sacrifice in the gardens below the Cathedral. After the brief commemorative service the bells are rung open, often to a quarter.

Two annual general meetings of the Australian and New Zealand Association of Bellringers have been held in Adelaide, one in 1963 and the other in 1968.

ST. DAVID'S DIOCESAN GUILD The Master Leaving the Diocese

On September 13th the quarterly meeting of the St. David's Diocesan Guild was held at Tenby. Ringing commenced at 2.30 p.m. and continued until the service at 4 p.m., which was conducted by the Rector (Rev. L. Bowen). The organist was Mr. W. Gwyn Thomas, of Tenby.

An excellent tea was served in the Church House by Mrs. Jenkins (wife of Harry Jenkins, tower captain) and her band of helpers. These ladies were afterwards warmly thanked by Mr. M. E. Lewis, of St. Florence, on behalf of the Guild.

The Rector presided at the business meeting, when regret was expressed at losing the Master, Rev. R. W. Thomas, who is leaving the diocese. It is understood, however, that he is prepared to continue in office until the next A.G.M. and will do his best to be present at the meetings until then. The best wishes of the Guild go with him and his wife and family to their new parish at Newport, Monmouthshire.

After the meeting ringing (from rounds to Double Norwich) was resumed until 8.30 p.m.

THE NATION'S GIFT TO AUSTRALIA

A SMALL but representative gathering met at the Loughborough Bell Foundry during the morning of September 13th to see the newly-cast bells of the Canberra carillon assembled in their steel framework and now ready for an official inspection by representatives of the British and Australian Governments. The carillon will be erected in a white tower, 160 feet high, on Aspen Island, situated in the Central Basin of the man-made Lake Burley Griffin, on the shores of which are the Parliament buildings and the Australian War Memorial. The Lake stretches for seven miles, has a shoreline of 22 miles and an area of 1.740 acres.

The visit was arranged through the kindness of Mr. Paul Taylor, who personally conducted the party around the foundry. Although the carillon was the main attraction there was much of absorbing interest in the remaining area of the works, where many bells, newly cast or retuned, and bell fittings gave evidence of the industry and system of this busy firm.

One requirement of the specification for the Canberra carillon is that the frame containing the hells must not exceed 27 feet in height, length or depth, so within this cube is a remarkable arrangement of 53 bells, the smallest a mere 20 lb. in weight, with note B, and the largest a relative monster of just over 6 tons, with note F sharp. On this tenor bell is the main inscription, indicating that the carillon was presented by Britain to the City of Canberra in commemoration of the golden jubilee of the founding of the National Capital of Australia.

There are two separate claviers assembled, each within a specially selected natural seasoned oak cabinet, and both will be operated by using hands and feet. They are really identical to the extent of the spacing of bars and pedals and action, but one is a practice clavier producing its own unfled notes. Provision has been made for the middle three octaves of the carillon to be automatic, on which it is understood will be played the Westminster chimes each quarter-hour.

Before the end of our inspection it was quite evident there was a feeling of sadness

and disappointment that a ring of bells could not have been incorporated in this unique project, and we still wonder whether such a ring could not be provided and hung below the carillon. But to those of us who know the abilities of the St. John-the-Baptist Church, Canberra, bellringing band we realised the next best thing for the change-ringing fraternity would be to listen to Col. John Watch and his colleagues demonstrate their system of ringing the changes.

For the visitors the rest of the day was spent in a very short ring on the ten bells in the foundry campanile—in between attempts for a record length of Majoraring on the ten bells at Loughborough Parish Church and accepting a kind invitation to join in ringing with the Loughborough District of the Leicester Diocesan Guild at Oaks-in-Charnwood and Shepshed. Among the party, who wish to extend thanks to all who helped us and welcomed us, were one "single" Australian, one emigrant at present here on leave, one returned emigrant, five members of the Great Adventure II tour and other guests, T.J.L.

Primate Rededicates Bells at Appledore, Kent

THE Archbishop of Canterbury. Dr. Michael Ramsey, paid Romney Marsh his second visit in five months when he came to rehallow the eight bells, clock bell and sanctus at SS. Peter and Paul Church, Appledore, on September 14th.

The tower of Appledore Church dates from the late 12th century and is perhaps the oldest part of this fine and unusual church which, though it now overlooks the Royal Military Canal, was formerly beside the sea before that part of the Marsh was reclaimed. This is recorded in the fact that the present clock bell, cast by the London Founders' Guild c. 1450, is dedicated to St. Nicholas, and in that there is also a window to him; he was the patron saint of sailors. The tower was remodelled with later windows in the 14th century.

Until 1900 the church possessed a ring of six bells with a tenor of about 15 cwt., the oldest being the third, c. 1450, London, the tenor by Joseph Hatch, 1620, and the rest from John Hodson, 1685. The tenor was reported in 1887 as being cracked, and a photograph of the old bells in the tower shows this bell with a chunk out of its lip: this apparently occurred, so we are told, one Christmas Eve when three drunken ringers made a bet that they could set it up in three pulls! The old bells were inscribed as follows:—

Tenor. 10SEPHVS HATCH MF FECIT (H) 1620 Sanctus:—Uninscribed.

NEW RING OF EIGHT

In 1900, when things were probably much as Hodson had last left them in 1685, it was decided to replace the heavy ring of six with a lighter ring of eight. The then Vicar very laudably made successful efforts to preserve the pre-Reformation third bell, and this was kept at the church as a clock bell, the sanctus also being untouched. The other bells and the old framework were removed and from the metal of Nos. 1, 2, 4. 5 and 6 a new ring of eight with a tenor of 12 cwt. 15 lb. in G was cast by Messrs.

J. Warner and Sons, of the Cripplegate Foundry: they are good examples of their workmanship. Unfortunately no effort was made to reproduce the five old inscriptions and the bells are historically a rather uninteresting Doncaster-headed ring; the front six bear only their founders' name, while the seventh records that Mr. Thomas Chennell donated £100 and Mrs. Thomas Boon £50; the tenor bears the name of the Vicar, Rev. Clifford Berney Hall, M.A., and his churchwardens, Mr. J. G. Wright and Mr. E. B. Terry.

The bells were inspected by the writer in 1967, and he recommended that they be rehung with new gudgeons, bearings and pulleys and reconditioned clappers and wheels. He also discovered that the old third, now the clock bell, required turning and its cast-in crown staple drilling out, while the sanctus bell and its "Heath Robinson" frame were quite unsafe, and this little bell required all new fittings and framework. The work was carried out by the Whitechapel Foundry, the bell frame being cleaned and painted by many members of the Ashford District. The work

was completed in July of this year, and so came the great day of the Primate's visit on September 14th.

THE SERVICE

The packed church looked beautiful, with a fine array of silver on the altar. The congregation included some from the Methodist Chapel, who had postponed their harvest festival service to be there and whose minister was in the Archbishop's procession.

The Archbishop for his sermon took a text from Galatians vi, 14: "God forbid that I should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." That evening afforded him two special joys: first, that he was with them in a lovely church, the restoration of whose bells reflected both the dedication of those ringers who had given time and talent to the repairs, and in the skill of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry, under whose supervision the work was so well carried out. Secondly—and here the Archbishop spoke with obvious emotion—the presence of the Methodist local church showed how determined Anglicans and Methodists were to work together locally for Christian unity, "We greet you with our hearts," said His Grace.

Beside the St. Nicholas window in the church here was one with the motto (in Latin) "In the Cross is safety". This was because the Cross humbles human pride, and it is humility which brings us all to the Cross and so to God's great glory. The bells summon us to worship this great and glorious God; and in the changes they all work, as should ringers, together in fellowship. This is what Christianity is and means—working together, one family: ringers, Anglicans and Methodists; a family with no room for pride but glorifying in the Cross of their Lord.

TO WESSEX WITH WILFRED

N Wilfred Williams' tours everything is well organised to the nth degree—not only the peal towers, transport and accommodation, but also who rings what, and which bell. There is no argument, and none is necessary. Everybody likes it that way and it is probably the secret of why most of the ringing achieves such a high standard. Our leader (unlike one member of the party) is a man of few words, but his choice of words and his personality combine to bring out the best from everyone. Wales has more than one prince!

This year's choice of countryside was also a hit. Dorset in particular is a land of pretty villages with pretty names in delightful rolling countryside.

This year's party was the same as last year's, except for the return of Clifford Barron after an absence of 14 years! This "speed king" from Birmingham replaced David Rothera, who was conserving his resources for his impending marriage to Susan Jenkins. However, we were glad to have David and Susan with us for the first week-end.

A GOOD START

To start a peal tour on a ring of bells like Ditcheat's (Taylor's best) helped to put everyone in a good mood. The main party, who had converged on the Dolphin at Wincanton with the customary convivial greetings the night before, were now joined by Ralph Edwards, who brought Tudor Edwards and Giles Galley (How's your Irreverence') from Bristol, and a good peal of the same name was rung in the brisk time of 3 h. 7 m. Wilfred celebrated his 64th birthday (two days late) on the 24 cwt. tenor, when most people of that age are satisfied with moving the lawn (slowly) for exercise! A cautionary rhyme for Pat Cannon's benefit was displayed in the tower: "Ears open—eyes wide—feet together — TONGUE TIED." But he didn't

But he didn't finish reading it.

A good lunch, a drive past Queen Camel (happy memories) and we were in Yeovil to greet Peter Border, the man of iron, to complete the party. We were met by Mr. Trevor Marks and Gordon Rendell, and the bells soon settled to a good peal of London Royal, with Peter treating the two-ton tenor as though it were one ton! Meanwhile the Air Commodore (Stan Mason), the Hot Air Commodore (alias the Big Gun) and one or two others went to Lyng to ring on the new six dedicated that afternoon (see "R.W.", page 578).

From Somerset to Dorset, On the Saturday night we arrived at our first H.Q.—the Greyhound. Bridport, and soon discovered that we were in good hands with the management there. It was also handy for an early morning dip. A lovely Sunday morning awaited us and we drove to Axminster (Devon), where Mr. J. Board kindly allowed us to ring for an hour before service on the fine "old style" Mears eight of 1898 vintage (tenor 25 cwt.). A sermon on straightforwardness by the Vicar, a good lunch-break in Axminster, and we were all set for two peal attempts in the afternoon. Unfortunately, owing to a misunderstanding, we were not allowed to ring a peal at East Budleigh. So we rang for half-an-hour, had tea in Sidmouth and then, with the kind co-operation of the Vicar of Sidbury, we rang on the full-throated eight there.

No. 2 band meanwhile rang a successful peal of Rutland at Withycombe Raleigh (near Exmouth). All met up again for beer and scrumpy at East Budleigh (birthplace of Raleigh).

LISTEN, WATCH AND LEARN

Bridport has a good Mears eight, but the eight who attempted a peal of London there were obviously not on form. Perhaps as a punishment for his contribution to the breakdown, our great stamp collector got left behind (by mistake) while the others went over to Lyme Regis. The successful band had been ringing Bristol on the beautiful little Taylor eight there with Cuthbert Powell. After a phone call to the hotel, Stan and the Chaplain left the Pilot Boat and came back to collect the wanderer and then proceeded along leafy lanes to Ottery St. Mary to listen to (and watch) the peal of London which was engaging the rapt attention of the many tourists who seem to visit this grand church, modelled on Exeter Cathedral, where you ring on the ground floor under the south transeptal tower in full view. A good peal was scored, with no interruptions!

After a demonstration of bar skittles by Mr. T-Ball we all went over to Whitchurch Canonicorum for the fortnightly evening practice and to meet George S. Morris and many other local enthusiasts. This was in a sense a limbering-up for our peal there the following morning, which turned out to be a good one, albeit slow and stately. The back bells here were cast by Purdue. They make a very satisfying eight.

EVIDENCE AVAILABLE

If any reader cares to satisfy himself of the quality of our ringing on this tour, he should see Bob Dennis, John Gipson or Stan Mason, all of whom brought their tape-recorders, each of the same make, each producing the same evidence—and taperecorders reveal everything!

Thorncombe village can take some finding, but as W. W. says: "What do you need a map for?". There's no village pub, but one local inhabitant had found her remedy for that, even if she couldn't find the remedy for her dislike of bells, but there is a good eight, augmented from a heavy five in 1963. Introduced to Mr. Farley, the local captain. Cliff was thought to be a member of the Barron Bell Trust (who made a donation here)! We lost 8-spliced after 2½ hours.

We soon forgot our failure when Peter Border and others entertained us with their attempt to blow the coaching horns at the Birdsmoorgate Inn (after a demonstration by the landlord). Pat promised drinks all round to bribe us to visit the heaviest six in Dorset. Powerstock is also one of the prettiest villages in Dorset, Mr. Sykes, tower captain, kindly gave us permission to ring. Pat nearly cancelled the drinks when he found himself kept off the tenor!

A BIG DAY

A good peal of Lincolnshire at Bradpole on the Wednesday morning enabled Melvyn Hiller (of the local band) to score his first College Youths peal, and he rang very creditably. We finished in time to hear the first team bringing round a jolly good peal of London at the imposing tower of Beaminster, with Ralph Edwards doing his stuff

on the tenor. George Pipe joined us for this peal—just to keep an eye on his father?

After lunch we went off to tackle Sherborne, with the heaviest eight in the world, Three of us had already rung the tenor to Surprise Major, and stood out. With Peter Border on the tenor we rang Bristol in 3 h. 47 m. (fastest of Surprise there), These bells go well, but the tenor is over-clappered, with the result that inside the ringing chamber the noise is terrific, nothing short of a series of explosions. However, a good peal was rung and enjoyed by several people outside, including Tom Setter and other Dorset worthies (and talent!) who joined us for a drink later. A footnote to today: at the Greyhound, Beaminster, the landlady came from Surrey. She asked Cannon: "Do you know the Old Gun in Dorking?".

Thursday found us at Cattistock, where the bells were burnt out in 1941 and are now a beautiful Mears eight (1950). Bristol was rung. The Rev. C. E. C. Brinkworth is the ringing Vicar and met us after the peal, as did Arthur Scott (of Maiden Newton) beforehand, with a local ringer. Stan Mason and Giles Galley, followed later by John Gipson and company, went down to Abbotsbury to inspect the Swannery, which is a fascinating place.

At Dorchester we were met by Mr. R. H. Duke, captain of the ringers, beside whom even Peter looked small! Peter's rope came untucked after a while, but with skilful handling he prevented it coming right out and we scored London on this Warner eight.

We then moved into our second H.Q.—the Crown at Blandford Forum, where they had a very sweet receptionist called Miss Williams. At Wincanton someone asked: "Which is the big 'un?". Wilfred's quick reply caused a laugh, as did the early 19th century charity board, which showed that the churchwardens were G. Baker and J. George! At a Barronial pace (2 h. 36 m.!) Watford was scored. This was too fast to get the best out of these bells some of us felt.

TWELVE INTO TWO and the sum: TWO HUNDRED

After lunch at the Dolphin we appeared to be short of transport and Wilfred had to do a shuttle service for Pat's benefit. Meanwhile with a good, steady beat, a peal of Cambridge was rung on the fine old style eight at Milborne Port (Somerset). Real transport problems now arose. Cliff Barron left us and Stan Mason went to fetch his wife from home and we were left with two cars to take 12 ringers. Fortunately Peter's estate car has ample room for seven so we reached home intact.

On Saturday morning a first-class peal of Yorkshire was rung at Wareham. Everything is perfect here: good acoustics, circle and ventilation. The bells were rehung and retuned in 1959 by Taylor's and the tenor is by Warner's.

We had curry for lunch to warm us up for the grand Taylor eight at Kingston, near Corfe Castle. Wilfred rang the tenor and a good peal was rung. It was the 200th peal rung on Wilfred's tours since they began in 1953 (an average of 11½ peals a year). Jim Pipe was delighted with the day's work, as he has proved that once

again he is fit enough to ring two peals in a day and hopes to be "up on the box" soon.

The local at Kingston offered farmhouse wines in addition to the usual beverages for restoring the tissues. Win (Mason) was with us now, having arrived with Stan in good time before the peal. Two non-pealers visited Stourpaine for practice (five: one bell cracked) and met Mr. Cross, tower captain of Blandford, who kindly arranged for us all to ring at Blandford for the 9.15 a.m. service on Sunday—which we duly did before our breakfast! The church is a delightful miniature version of St. Philip's, Birmingham.

Some then went to ring at Cranborne and we all arrived in good time for lunch at Southampton. We were sorry to miss Rev. Ken Felstead and not to ring on his bells. We were equally sorry that we failed to do justice to the bells of St. Mary's, where we lost London Royal. After strolling around the docks and parks and cafes we rang for Evensong and returned to Blandford. Passengers in one of the cars had a hair-raising experience on the way home when their driver failed to make places in 5-6 and ran through! Which reminds us that we should record our thanks to all our drivers for safe and comfortable driving (with the odd exception) in grand style. Stan's Sunbeam Rapier and Ralph's Austin 3-litre were much admired.

THE LAST COURSE

Wimborne Minster bells were not available, but on Bank Holiday Monday we rang a splendid peal at Wimborne St. Giles. It was St. Giles's Day, appropriately enough, and a less saintly Giles was in the band. George Thoday made a masterly job of calling 8-spliced, as did Wilfred of ringing the tenor. Cannon didn't know spliced could sound so good. (Wareham was his idea of Heaven on Earth—an 8-spliced band in front of him ringing a good peal in a simple method on tip-top bells.) Wimborne St. Giles Church was rebuilt by the Shaftesbury family (after being burnt out) in 1910. The bells are good (Llewellyn and James, with two trebles added in 1928 by Taylor). An amusing visit to the great house nearby, home of the tenth Earl of Shaftesbury, whose father, the ninth earl, was a member of the College Youths and attended the tercentenary dinner, was enjoyed by those not ringing. The bells sounded beautiful from there and it was fitting that this peal was rung for the Ancient Society and that the treasurer of the A.S.C.Y. should be inspecting the ninth earl's painting during the peal.

Downton (8, 22 cwt.) bells are a good old style ring, but after an hour-and-a-half of London a shift appeared. Our tenor man was not sorry. Our bellhanger discovered afterwards that the tenor clapper was badly out of adjustment, which explained its falseness. He promised to come back and put it right.

Once again our tour was over: 16 peals were scored—out of 20 attempted. Everyone enjoyed themselves, including Leslie Barry, who didn't ring a peal this year but made up for it in other ways. We have not mentioned Ken Hesketh, but he did distinguish himself in one or two belfries in one way or another! "Oh! Hesketh!" Our very grateful thanks to all incumbents and local tower captains. And last but not least. Our thanks to Wilfred for his usual efficient management of the whole tour.

HOSTELS IN THE HIGHLAND

COLLOWING a successful tour of Eire last year, Richard Youdale decided to organise one to Scotland in the first week of September, inviting rather more than less of the same company. As cars are permissible at Youth Hostels in Scotland, this was the obvious form of accommodation.

While the organiser remained on Tyne-side for the "weekend" peal, most of the party reached the most northerly outpost of English ringing (Bamburgh) for a peal of Plain Bob Major. This was Andrew's first peal, and rung despite the churchwarden climbing through the belfry window and down the stairs halfway through. He made up for this intrusion by very kindly inviting us to drinks afterwards.

Two more members were outside Edinburgh Y.H., and without waiting for two out of three carloads, which had got "lost", they went to St. Cuthbert's for a short ring, where they were joined by two Richards straight from Waverley. The kirk was visited again on Sunday morning when we rang with the local band. Because the ring-ing was being recorded at Leith, it was therefore not what it might have been, but we were able to do better at the Episcopal Cathedral, where Cambridge Royal was rung on the old-fashioned ten.

ANOTHER INVERARAY PEAL

After being woken up at Glasgow by Peter, who had driven overnight, we struck further heights by ringing a course of London Royal at the Cathedral. Glasgow was left for Paisley, although we had to

wait an hour on the grass outside before we could ring there. Supper that evening was eaten on the pier at Inveraray in readiness for the peal attempt the next day. Although Royal had been suggested. Stedman Caters was decided upon—a composi-tion being chosen "for its ability to survive Fortunately it did not need this, although during the last hour everyone became tenser, with a corresponding drop in the standard of ringing, fearing that a rope might break. That of the eighth had broken while it was being pulled up, and repair of this was only part of the large amount of work put in by Rowan, Clarke and Bill, the last two staking pints on the ropes they had provided to make the peal possible. Everyone was impressed with the bells, and the peal was enjoyed by all (of our party at any rate) inside and outside the tower

That night was spent at Glen Nevis, and after our man from Taylors had had to be discouraged from climbing the Ben, which, as most of the other higher mountains, was covered in mist, a variety of routes was taken to Inverness. Some "grabbed" the ski-lift at Aviemore, while others continued up the Spey valley to Nairn. arrival at Alltsaigh advantage was taken of the considerable proximity of Loch Ness. Fortunately only John was bitten by the monster, although Dale tried to catch it on his rod, and by breakfast the next morning all except three of the girls had taken the plunge—with one bikini to go round four, discretion (or modesty) was the better part of valour.

John gave us a route to Dundee round the Devil's Elbow, with stops for coffee and lunch, forgetting that he drives faster However, we all arrived to ring at the Old Steeple and St. Paul's Cathedral. The evening was spent ringing handbells or playing bridge.

WINCHESTER MAN AT FETTES

After crossing the Tay and Forth Bridges we were greeted by the headmaster at Fettes College. It was a change to ring on the tiny five after the heavy bells, and we were able to get on to the roof to watch the bells. To those who had learnt at the other school with bells in the chapel it was

especially interesting.

We had to do a few repairs to the clock chimes before ringing at Dunblane, and then joined the Alloa ringers for their practice, spending the night in the seventeenth-century hostel at Stirling. Two Richards and Katharine had to be put on 'Flying Scotsman", as the other Richard was staying in Edinburgh for the Festival and completely upsetting the transport arrangements, but the remainder were able to ring at Ripon and Knaresborough on the way south before reaching Notting-ham where Stedman Cinques was to be

attempted the next day.

Thanks must go to Richard Youdale for the apparently perfect organisation, to the priests and local ringers for letting us ring, to the drivers for getting us there, to Chris for managing the catering, to Mrs. Inglis for putting us all up afterwards.

Ringing & Conducting Standard Methods

PART III CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE

(Continued from page 704)

(b) CONDUCTING

WHEN I dealt with the conducting of Kent and Oxford Treble Bob I pointed out that if the method had been studied properly when learning to ring it then the step to conducting was not a very great one. That statement is true when dealing with more complicated methods (e.g., Cambridge Surprise), but it should also be appreciated that with such methods there is more to be committed to memory because the rules for ringing the method are not so obvious. By practising a method at every opportunity one becomes familiar with the way in which certain bells are encountered during ringing and features of a method, not immediately apparent from the figures, become important signposts both for ringing and conducting the method.

An example of such a feature, not immediately obvious from the figures of Cambridge Surprise, is that the bell coursing next-but-one in front of the bell in question makes places up in the next position above that bell, i.e., in Cambridge Maximus the 11th makes places up in 5-6 when the 7th (coursing next-but-one behind) makes places in 3-4 up. If the 7th bell tries to move further up than 3-4 he will be in the way of the 11th and may be informed (in no uncertain terms, generally) where he should be. An experienced ringer, therefore, rings Treble Bob until such time that one of the rules indicates otherwise, e.g., the ringer of the 7th would know to stop for 5-6 places up, if he could see the 11th ringing 7-8 places up. I will say more about such practical rules at a later time. but we must now consider again what are the basic responsibilities of the conductor.

- 1. To call the bobs (and/or singles) in the correct places.
- 2. To correct mistakes before they become too serious for ringing to continue.

Let us now consider how the above aims can be achieved when ringing a simple touch of Cambridge Surprise which is applicable on six or more bells. There are only two places in Cambridge Surprise Minor at which the tenor will not be affected. ted by a bob and these occur when it is about to become a 5ths place bell (called the WRONG) or when it is about to become a 6ths place bell (called the HOME). The effects of calls being made at these positions are exactly the same as they are for Kent and Oxford Treble Bob, because each of these methods is a regular method. (A regular method produces Plain Bob lead ends; an irregular method produces non-Plain Bob lead ends.) If a bob is called at the home position the bell which would have made 2nds and then ring the second half of the slow work runs out to become half of the slow work runs out to become a 3rds place bell at the lead end and naturally proceeds to the full back work. The bell which would have dodged 3-4 down to become a 4ths place bell runs in to 2nds place and then rings the second half of the slow work. The remaining bell affected by the bob makes 4ths instead of dodging 3-4 up to become a 4ths place bell at the lead end and follows this by ringing 3-4 places down. The net effect on this bell is that 3rds and 4ths are made alternately from meeting the treble in 3-4 up to meeting the treble in 3-4 down.

I have made particular mention of how the bob affects the bells concerned as a number of people have requested that I should do this. The most important thing to realise is that a bob only alters one row, and it is the position that the bells fall in at the lead end that determines what they subsequently do. If when learning any method all the starting points of all the bells are memorised (and I suggest in the natural sequence in which they occur), it does not matter whether the bob is made in 4ths, 6ths, 8ths or 10ths position. This makes method ringing much easier, as one knows what position one should be in at the lead end should a trip occur. It is also imperative that one does this if or when one reaches the stage of ringing Spliced Surprise, so why not do it at the start?

To return to our original theme, we have noted which bells have been affected by a bob at home: those in 2nds, 3rds and 4ths positions, the same as for Plain Bob and Treble Bob and the coursing order of these bells becomes 243 instead of 324 in exactly the same way. It follows, therefore, that any touch of Plain Bob or Treble Bob will come round if called to Cambridge Surprise; it does not follow that they will be true to Cambridge Surprise, for the following reasons.4

- (i) The lead ends produced by the methods follow a different sequence, i.e., leads may be repeated in their entirety.
- (ii) The nature of the rows (considered in my earlier article on Plain Bob) may occur in such a way as to produce false rows in two leads, which would appear to be completely different, from inspection of their lead ends (or heads if you prefer).

Above, we defined the basic responsibilities of the conductor, and we can now assess how far we have gone to fulfilling

The calling positions are given the same names as for Plain Bob and Kent Treble Bob, and although the leads occur in a different order there is nothing new to re-member here. The transposition of cours-ing orders is again exactly as for Plain Bob and Kent Treble Bob; we should remember that this serves the dual purpose of checking that the bells are working correctly in relation to each other and also as

EPITAPHS THAT OFFENDED A BISHOP

Mr. Gordon W. Rendell, of Montacute, Somerset, writes: For some time now I have been trying to ascertain the following facts and at last have been successful. I now forward them to you for publication if at any time you have space and think they would be of interest to "Ringing World" readers.

These following epitaphs appear on three tombstones in Montacute churchyard, Many years ago the headstones were placed facing the south wall of the churchyard because their inscriptions offended the Bishop of that time, and it was the Rev. C. F. Powys, 1885-1918, who had them turned around to be made readable. Although badly eroded some of the verses are still decipherable. The first is to a huntsman, John Scott, in the employment of the Phelips family of Montacute House circa late 18th century.

"Here lies John Scott, it was his lot A huntsman long to be. He ate no meat, he was no cheat. But liked his can to see, Frolick and free in mirth and glee. He ran his destined race, And in the field to few did yield The foremost of the chase,

And now, for wot, he has paid his scot And here is run to ground."

The second is to an old nurse who died December 3rd, 1788.

"Here lies an old nurse, no better no worse, Hannah Mitchell the name that she bore. Her years as were numbered made more than a hundred



Drills and Exercises. Over 60 of these have been developed and applied successfully. The drills are movements carried out with a "dead" rope, "D", i.e., bell in lowered position, or even independently of rope; while exercises are mainly on a "live" rope, i.e., with bell raised. In the list that follows all exercises prior to No. 52 are "silenced", and all "live" ones are indicated by "L/". "L/S" means live but silenced, and "L/O" means live but open. Limited space here prevents detailed description of each and every drill and exercise—this is given in "Manual I" referred to previously; but here, in some cases, the title together with outline description is sufficient to enable a competent and experienced ringer to interpret the reference, and introduce the work, checked by the list of faults mentioned later.

Note.—Drills 15 to 19 are particularly useful for nervous pupils. The real benefit is that all rope movement can be simulated in absolute safety, and as slowly as desired. Able pupils proceed from 14 to 20 direct.

ing sally and pulling off.)
21. Handstroke pull and release. (Pupil using dummy rope-end and instructor the real rope-end, and catching sally.)
