RINGERS throughout the world will give thanks for the life of George Frederick Coleridge, priest. His vigorous personality and clear mental faculties remained unabated throughout his long life of 92 years. Those who knew him as a young man in his undergraduate days at Oxford, where he was secretary and Master of the University Society, have passed over, but there are hundreds of ringers with us who knew him in the vigour of his years, and thousands who came under his influence when for nine years, from 1921 to 1930, he was the president of the Central Council.

Canon Coleridge was indeed a giant among men. His perfect physique was accompanied by an ever-alert intellect. He loved men, and of those men he loved ringers in particular. No one knew better than he the weaknesses and foibles of the ringing fraternity, and he scolded and chided them for their failures. But above all he was their champion. The rightful place of Church bells in the service of the Church was very dear to his heart. Bells, however, required to be rung properly; there must be nothing slipshod; good striking could only be achieved by constant practice, and the greatest contribution towards this was to be found in the peal.

The Canon enjoyed a peal; the silent camaraderie while ringing save only the voice of the conductor; the good fellowship afterwards and the joys of a ringing tour. The stories of the Canon and his humour and good fun are legion. How he enjoyed a joke! One of the happiest is told after he had rung a peal on a hot summer's day in his native county of Devonshire. After descending the belfry he received the congratulations of those who were listening. 'I bet you have a wet shirt,' commented one of the party. 'Indeed, I have not,' declared the Canon truthfully. And afterwards, as he told the story, he added, 'I didn't tell them that I took my shirt off!'

In his own diocese of Oxford he was Master of the Diocesan Guild from 1934 to 1946, and was a popular figure, attending meetings, encouraging and exhorting young bands and preaching the need of unity in tower, branch and Guild. For the service of the dedication of bells he was frequently asked to give the address or assist in the ceremony. He, however, made it a steadfast rule that he would not officiate at any such service unless the bells had been paid for. It was one of the many signs of his upright integrity that there should be no debt on anything given to the service of God.

Canon Coleridge was a member of 21 ringing Associations, Guilds or societies. Among them was the Ancient Society of College Youths, which he joined in 1879 and was the oldest living member with 70 years' membership to his credit. Mr. James George, who celebrated his 96th birthday last month, is older in years but not in membership. At the annual dinner he was an ever-welcome speaker, with his vast store of ringing anecdotes ready to entertain the company, and if necessary to point a moral.

It was at Crowthorne, the village he served so faithfully as parish priest for more than 50 years, that his funeral took place last Friday. From those present and the hundreds of friends who would have liked to attend the simple service came a prayer of thankfulness for his life and presence among us for such a long span of years. He has left with ringers the inspiration of his presence, and the art of change ringing will ever regard George Frederick Coleridge as one of the pillars upon which the Temple has been built.

Mr. G. H. Myers has circled St. Andrew's, Plymouth, by ringing the treble to a peal of Bob Royal. Last year Mr. Myers was very unwell, but now at 78 he has returned to peal ringing, and with a remark that he preferred a big bell; no doubt his mind went back some 40 years to when he rang Exeter 11th (then the 9th) to a peal, but he may well be proud that his mantle has fallen on his son Tom, who rang the tenor and called this latest peal, whilst William and Fred were also in the band. Truly a grand ringing family.

Steeplejacks have completed taking down 12ft. from the top of the spire of St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, and ringing has been resumed.

Thanking Mr. Oldfield for his information regarding Oxford and Kent Minor, Mr. E. C. Goby writes: 'Yes, it takes a bit of calling—about as much as Holt's Original.'

Four Silverton, Devon, ringers, with seven Somerset friends, defied the wind, rain and hail for a ringing outing on November 12th. Ringing took place at Poughill, Washford, Pyne, Shelbridge, East and West Worlington.

By conducting a peal of Stedman Triples 'in hand,' Alan Cattell has set up a record, being the youngest in the Leicester diocese to call a peal in the method from an 'inside' pair.

It was 'Wild Bells' when the Beverley and District Society met at Burstwick on November 12th in the teeth of a gale, and the Vicar (the Rev. R. W. George) concluded his sermon by quoting a few verses from Tennyson's poem. A tree blown across the road necessitated public transport making a detour with considerable delay. The party of 20 members and friends eventually got back to Hull, and, though wet, managed to get transport back to their homes.

BELFRY GOSSIP

Mr. H. R. Pink, who after the war revived the band at Fordington St. George, Dorchester, and started the fund for rehanging the bells, has moved to Swanage. Before leaving Dorchester he was presented with a 'Delight' ringers' record book, prepared by Mr. Will Viggers, in the frontispiece of which was an illuminated address recording his work for the bells of Fordington. His successor as captain is Mr. K. W. Hewitt. The presentation concluded with a service quarter, in which four ringers taught by Mr. Pink participated.

Mr. A. H. Pulling, of Guildford, has rung handbells at the funerals of the three deceased Masters of the Oxford Diocesan Guild—the Rev. F. E. Robinson, the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn and the Rev. G. F. Coleridge.

Darley Dale ringers, who rang a peal at Winster, took with them four of their ropes as on a previous visit the ropes were found to be full of knots. Splices were made as a present to the Winster belfry. The ropes in this tower hang anti-clockwise and there are two full notes between the fourth and fifth bell.

Mr. C. E. Jeffries, of Bedford, directs the attention of the Cheshire band who rang a peal of Glasgow Surprise Major at Frodsham on November 11th to 'The Ringing World,' page 402, August 26th, 1949, recording a similar performance at Willesden on August 11th.

Probably the oldest bellringer in Suffolk, Mr. James Dye, of Grundisburgh, celebrated 65 years of married life on November 25th. Mr. Dye, who is 89, joined the Norwich Diocesan Association in 1879. Mr. and Mrs. Dye were married at Falkenham. Mr. Dye retired from ringing last year. He is also the oldest Cumberland alive, which Society he joined on Nov. 28th, 1879. He called Holt's Original at Helmingham in the 1880's, being the first performance of the peal in Suffolk.

THE PASSING OF THE REV. CANON G. F. COLERIDGE

A Leader of the Exercise

WE regret to record the death on Nov. 22nd of Canon George Frederick Coleridge, M.A., at Crowthorne, Berks, aged 92 years. Canon Coleridge had great hopes of attending the dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths on November 5th, and he had expressed his willingness to propose the toast of the Society. Early that morning he had a bad fall, and this necessitated his taking to his bed.

The news was received with deep regret and the secretary was instructed to express the condolences of the Society and their wishes for his speedy recovery. It was not to be. Change ringing has lost an outstanding personality who was known and beloved in all parts of the country.

Canon Coleridge was born at Cadbury Vicarage, Devon, on November 10th, 1857. His father held this living for more than 50 years and other relatives before him. On one occasion at the College Youths' dinner the Canon read extracts from a diary about 1827 which stated: 'The Rev. Dr. Coleridge read himself in to-day and provided plenty of beer for the ringers.'

He was educated at Ayshford Grammar School and learnt to handle a rope at Cadbury. He started ringing at the age of 17. Canon Coleridge decided to follow in the family tradition and went to Keble College, Oxford, and he took his B.A. degree in 1884.

While in residence as an undergraduate he came under the influence of several noted ringers and he held the office of secretary and later Master of the Oxford University Society. His first peal, Holt's ten-part of Grandsire Triples, rung at Kirtlington on June 14th, 1879, was the first peal in which the working bells were rung by university men. It was conducted by Rev. C. D. P. Davies and among the other ringers were men who were afterwards to be famous in the Exercise, viz., the Rev. F. E. Robinson, H. A. Cockey, W. S. Willett, R. E. Fiske and G. H. Phillott. The same years saw him admitted to the Ancient Society of College Youths, and this started a very long connection. There is no question that Canon Coleridge added lustre to the College Youths and his name was frequently recorded in the Society's peal book. Probably his first week's ringing tour was in Devon in August, 1883. At Sowton he rang a peal of Stedman Triples, conducted by the Rev. F. E. Robinson, and also in the same method at St. Sidwell's, Exeter.

In 1884 Canon Coleridge was ordained a deacon at Oxford and was appointed a curate at Caversham, Reading. In August that year he rang a peal of Stedman Caters at St. Laurence's, Reading, in which J. W. Washbrook and F. E. Dawe participated. This was conducted by the Rev. F. E. Robinson.

Soon after his arrival at Caversham he was appointed secretary of the Reading Branch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild, a post he held for 10 years until his preferment to Crowthorne.

WITH THE CENTRAL COUNCIL.

When the late Sir Arthur P. Heywood, Bart., in 1891, brought about the inaugural meeting of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, held at the Inns of Court, London, the Rev. Coleridge was one of the 74 delegates from 33 ringing societies who attended. He had remained a member of the Council without a break. In 1921 he was elected president of the Council and he held this office with distinction for nine years, when he was succeeded by Mr. E. H. Lewis.

In his own diocese of Oxford he did a great task in furthering the work of the Diocesan Guild. From 1923-1947 he was chairman of the Sonning Deanery Branch, and upon the death of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, of Caversham, he was elected Master of the Guild, a

post he held from 1934 to 1946, when owing to trouble with his legs and advancing years he felt that it was in the Guild's interests he should make way for a younger man.

In 1904 he was appointed Vicar of Crowthorne, a village he served with great faithfulness for 53 years. From 1912-1928 he was Rural Dean of Sonning, and in 1917 he was appointed an Honorary Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford.

HIS PEAL RECORD.

Canon Coleridge learnt to handle a rope in his native village of Cadbury, Devon, in 1874. At Oxford as a member of the University Society he made good progress, being in company with other well-known clerical ringers, including the Revs. H. A. Cockey, W. S. Willett, J. F. Hastings and C. D. P. Davies. His first peal was rung at Kirtlington, Oxfordshire, on June 9th, 1879.

In all the Canon rang 273 peals, the last being on August 9th, 1932, a peal of London Surprise at Bridgwater. His career as a peal ringer was terminated by an injury to his knee when mounting a bicycle on a dark mid-winter morning.

He rang many peals with the late Rev. F. E. Robinson, among them being the first peal by eight clergymen on October 2nd, 1884, Stedman Triples at Drayton, Berks. In the same tower he participated in an uncompleted peal of Stedman Triples and was also in the band when the Rev. F. E. Robinson rang his 1,000th peal, being the first ringer to achieve such a distinction. Canon Coleridge rang the treble to a peal of Stedman Caters at Warwick on October 11th, 1910, which was the first peal on ten bells by 'ten priests of the Church' and was conducted by the Rev. C. D. P. Davies. He was also in the first clerical Surprise peal, Superlative Surprise Major at Prestbury, Glos., on April 22nd, 1912.

Another interesting 'first' in which the Canon participated was the first peal on Exeter Cathedral bells—Grandsire Caters on October 6th, 1902, in 3 hours and 52 minutes, which

was conducted by Mr. George Williams. The Canon was on the tenor with Mr. Ferris Shepherd strapping. He was also in the first peal on the bells at Plymouth—5,006 Stedman Caters.

Another of his heavy bell performances was at Wells Cathedral on October 4th, 1894, a peal of Grandsire Caters in 3 hours 44 minutes for the Oxford Diocesan Guild. This at the time was the heaviest peal ever rung single-handed by ten men.

He was a member of the band that rang the first Freemasons' peal, one of Grandsire Caters at St. Clement Danes' on December 4th, 1919. This peal was for the Ancient Society of College Youths. Canon Coleridge was a Past Master of the Heather Lodge No. 3131 and Past Prov. Grand Chaplain for the Province of Berkshire.

The Canon had a number of long length peals to his credit. These included 8,800 Superlative Surprise at Loughborough, 6,720 Double Norwich Court Bob Major at Caversham, 7,392 Double Norwich at Chiddingfold, 12,096 Double Norwich at Boyne Hill, 13,054 Stedman Caters at Cheltenham and 15,041 Stedman Caters at Appleton.

The last-named peal was rung on December 31st, 1888, in 9 hours and 16 minutes. This held the record for 20 years, when it was supplanted by a peal of 18,027 at Loughborough in 1909. Finally came the 21,363 at Appleton on April 22nd, 1922. In his notes the Canon wrote: 'I was too old to take part in this, youth prevailed, but I listened to it for several hours.'

His first peal was one of Stedman Triples at St. Giles-in-the-Fields on February 7th, 1925, when all the members of the band were 6ft. or over. The Canon was the tallest, his height being returned as 6ft. 4½in. This peal was called by Mr. A. H. Pulling, and among the participants were Messrs. Cyril F. Johnston, Frederick W. Rogers and George W. Fletcher.

AT LUNDY ISLAND.

The Canon regarded his peal at St. Helena, Lundy Island, on August 23rd, 1905, as his most venturesome. In his notes he wrote: 'This peal was made possible by (a) Mr. Bowen, Parish Clerk of Ilfracombe, who chipped the rust off the bearings and saturated them with oil. (b) The generosity and hospitality of the Rev. H. G. Heaven, Lord of the Manor, owner of the island, donor of the church and bells. His wonderful array of oysters will never be forgotten. (c) The Rev. Coombes, chaplain to the Missions to Seamen, who kindly conveyed the party, who had been dubbed "madmen," to and from the island in the mission ship, 'The Irene,' on the usual monthly voyage to the many lightships in the Bristol Channel. The ship was known for its "roll," and this, together with a raging sea, made the journey somewhat unpleasant for some, but left more oysters for others.'

'We recovered either from seasickness or oysters by ringing a peal of Stedman Triples at Minehead, the following day.'

The Editor would welcome letters of appreciation of Canon Coleridge's great services to ringing and memories of those who participated in his peals.

THE FUNERAL

The funeral service was held at Crowthorne Church on Friday, which was unable to accommodate the many parishioners, friends and ringers who came to pay their last respects to one so widely loved.

There were approximately 40, robed clergy with the Bishop of Reading, who waited to receive the coffin. The Vicar (the Rev. A. C. Nugee) took the service. Psalm xxiii, was chanted and the hymns included 'The day Thou gavest, Lord, is ended.' The committal sentences at the graveside were said by the Bishop of Reading, and then followed a course

OBITUARY

MR. FRANCIS MILES.

The passing of Mr. Francis Miles, of Bredons Norton, near Tewkesbury, Glos., on November 12th, at the age of 42, was received by his many friends with deep regret. He had been a member of the local band for 28 years and a chorister for the same length of time; for the last 11 years he was also sexton.

Mr. Miles was a very capable ringer and rang about 40 peals, many of them in the little tower at Bredons Norton. He was a member of the Worcestershire and Districts Association for more than a quarter of a century and for many years he was a member of the Tewkesbury Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Association.

The interment took place at Bredons Norton on November 16th, and the service, which was conducted by the Rev. Kirk Duncan, was attended by a large number of friends, many of them ringers. Newbury 6; and in the evening muffled ringing also took place at Kemer-ton, a neighbouring village, where Mr. Miles often helped the local band.

The repairs cost £257 and St. Paul's is grateful to all who have helped the work by their generous subscriptions. There is no outstanding debt on this account.

RECRUITMENT OF RINGERS

A REPLY TO MR. BOTTRILL.

Dear Sir,—In reply to Mr. W. Bottrill, may I say that ringers should be recruited from persons who are already members of a church, because bellringing is part of the Church's work. If people who have no interest in the Church are recruited merely because they are interested in campanology alone, then the whole purpose of their ringing becomes a farce.

If, as Mr. Bottrill suggests, people subscribe to the cost of bells for no other purpose than that of giving the ringers something to amuse themselves with, then they are very different from those with whom I have come into contact.

People give because it is part of the life of the Church, and if you took away the Church, the response would be very much different. I have organised many efforts for bells and I know that the majority of people give or support these efforts because they are, first of all, for the Church.

Mr. Bottrill should not generalise by saying that 18,000 ringers only ring to preserve their halo of religion, because I feel sure that in not one case has he individualised to prove this. After condemning this mass of ringers he goes on to blow his own trumpet by admitting he is indeed a pretty good chap since he walks two miles each Sunday to ring rounds on six. I wonder how long this has been going on, because surely if he is such a good fellow they should be able to ring some sort of method by now, unless, of course, he is one of the 18,000 who he says 'have no zeal for the art.'

I hope Mr. Bottrill will soon be able to write to our journal and tell us that his ring of six has been augmented to a ring of eight through the generosity of his fellow church-people who have appreciated his kindness in teaching their ringers to ring for the glory of God.—Yours faithfully,

HANDBELL MUSIC

Dear Sir,—Most handbells are rung by ear, but the surest way is for the instructor to have a card with numbers and indicate the order in which the bells should be played (he must watch his knuckles too). To see whether a tune can be played, look at the printed music in the treble stave to see if all the notes lie between the highest and lowest notes if you have eight bells. If the melody needs extra half tones (flats, sharps or naturals), it cannot be rung properly.

Tunes which can be rung on eight bells are: 'First Nowell,' 'Hyfrydol,' 'Innocents,' chorus of 'Bells of St. Mary' (with an octave 'twist' on two notes), 'Drink to me only.' Useful additions are No. 9 (for 'Land of my Fathers' and 'While Shepherds Watched'), one between 2 and 3 for 'Good King Wenceslas,' one between 4 and 5 for many well-known melodies in the scale of G major. Two extra trebles for 'Way down upon the Swanee River,' etc.

Dear Sir,—If Mr. Pink cares to spend five minutes with pencil and paper he will discover that the false course-ends for Wordsworth are as shown in 'The Ringing World.' What, however, he will find much more interesting is that, despite the apparent serious falseness of the method, if you take your plain course as one of six leads with bobs at M B W you will get a true course in the same way as you do in Rutland and (presumably) in Kendal.

As for the composition of the peal, it is given in the Central Council collection of peals (No. 22 of Double Oxford) as being by Mr. Trollope, and so can hardly claim to have been composed by Mr. Cashmore except in so far as he discovered that it was true to Kendal (by no means obvious).

As a matter of interest it is merely a peal by John Reeves applied to a course in which M B W is called. The same Q-sets at H are bobbed and the corresponding Q-sets at M and W are plained instead of bobbed.—Yours faithfully,
